North Union High School: Evan Bollinger, Pre-Med at Iowa State University.


United South Central High School: Arianne Schaper, Psychology at University of Minnesota.





Five Mayo clinics not to reopen

After an in-depth evaluation, Mayo Clinic Health System has decided not to reopen its clinics in Armstrong, Iowa, as well as Lake Crystal, Sherburn, Trimont and Truman, Minnesota. These clinics are now permanently closed. Mayo Clinic Health System continues to focus on finding the most viable solutions to serve rural communities over the long term.

These part-time clin-

ics had been temporarily closed since March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Staff who had been providing care at these clinics prior to COVID-19 were redeployed to Mayo Clinic Health System in Fairmont, Mankato or St. James, Minnesota, and they will continue their employment. Patients will continue to see their care provider at one of these nearby clinics.

Summer Learning Support Grant for ECI, CER

Fairmont Early Childhood Initiative (ECI) and Fairmont Community Education & Recreation (CER) received a special Summer Learning Support Grant of \$20,000 from the Southern Minnesota Foundation Initiative (SMIF) to provide young learners (ages 0-8) and their families a variety of opportunities learning this summer.

This SMIF grant was awarded to support early childhood development

The Rhubarb is ready!

The rain we received was enough to revive my flowers and rhubarb! We only got 1/2 inch so hope we get more this week. My foxglove are in full bloom I love them, and the birds are keeping us busy refilling the feeders. Love the sunshine mornings and all of the activity in our back yard! I often make a coconut impossible pie so I was anxious to try today's recipe, I liked it, hope you do too.

Impossible Rhubarb Pie

2 1/2 cups rhubarb, cut up

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup Bisquick

1 tsp. cinnamon

3/4 cup milk 2 eggs

2 Tablespoons butter, melted

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Streusel topping:

2 Tablespoons firm butter

1/2 cup Bisquick

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 cup chopped nuts

Arrange rhubarb in a greased 9-inch pie plate. Mix remaining ingredients in a blender and blend for 2 minutes. Pour over rhubarb, let set for 5 minutes. Combine streusel ingredients and sprinkle over top. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes or until a knife comes out clean. Serve warm or cool.





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

529 plans: More versatile than ever

If you have children or grandchildren, you may already be somewhat familiar with the 529 plan, a popular education savings vehicle. But you may not have kept up with some recent changes in the plan's capabilities and in the educational environment in which the plan might be used.

Let's start with the learning environment. During the COVID-19 pandemic, colleges and universities

switched to online classes, or at least to a hybrid of inperson and online. And even before the pandemic, many schools offered remote classes, though obviously not to the same extent. But after COVID-19 subsides, it's likely that the online component will remain an important part of higher education. What does this "new world" mean for you, when you're saving for college? Will a 529 plan still be relevant?

In a word, yes. First of all,

a 529 plan can offer tax advantages. Earnings in a 529 plan are federally tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified educational expenses. And if you invest in your own state's 529 plan, your contributions may be tax deductible. (Withdrawals used for expenses other than qualified education expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes as well as a 10% penalty.) Because tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, you'll want to consult with your tax

advisor before investing.

Online learning costs are eligible for a 529 plan's tax benefits just as much as those incurred from inperson classes. Tuition, textbooks, supplies, computers and services - all of these should qualify, assuming the school meets certain criteria. Also, students enrolled half-time or more don't have to live in a dorm for room and board expenses to be covered by a 529 plan - they can live in off-campus housing. However, these roomand-board costs typically must equal the cost of living on campus. Some schools identify a specific cost for "commuters" or "at-home students," so you will need to contact the college directly to determine qualified room-and-board costs.

Now, let's take a quick look at what some changes

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in the rules governing 529 plans over the past few years might mean for you. Eligible expenses from your 529 plan

include the following: • K-12 expenses - Parents can withdraw up to \$10,000 per student, per year, from their 529 plan to pay for tuition expenses at elementary and secondary schools. So, if you intend to send your children to a private school, this use of a 529 plan might interest you.

• Apprenticeships - 529 plans can be used to pay for fees, textbooks, equipment and other supplies connected to apprenticeship programs registered with the Department of Labor. These programs, typically offered at a community college, combine classroom instruction with on-the-job training.

• Student loans - Families

can withdraw funds from a 529 plan to repay the principal and interest for qualified education loans, including federal and most private student loans. There's a lifetime limit of \$10,000 for student loan repayments per each 529 plan beneficiary and another \$10,000 for each of the beneficiary's siblings.

All of these newer uses of 529 plans may contain additional guidelines and exceptions, and state tax treatment varies, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor before taking money from your account. But it's valuable for you to know the different ways you can put a 529 plan to work.



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United States flag facts and handling etiquette

The United States flag was first imagined after the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The Continental Congress authorized creation of the first national flag on June 14, 1777. It was decided that the flag should have 13 stripes, alternating red and white, to represent the original 13 colonies, and that the new union be represented by 13 white stars in a blue field to signify a "new constellation." Francis Hopkinson, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, is most often credited with the original design.

Today there are 50 stars on the flag to represent the 50 states, while the 13 stripes still represent the 13 British colonies that became the first states. While this may be common knowledge, Public Law 94-344, known as the Federal Flag Code, may not be as widely known. The code

dictates that the flag is to be treated with respect and proper etiquette. The code is extensive, but the following guidelines can help private individuals interested in displaying their flags do so in accordance with the law.

- Flags should only be displayed in public from sunrise to sunset, unless the flag can be properly illuminated during darkness. In this instance, it may be displayed at all times.
- When displayed with other flags, such as on a single staff or lanyard, the U.S. flag should be above all other flags. If flags are displayed in a row, the U.S. flag goes to the observer's left.
- State and local flags are traditionally flown lower than the American
 - During marching

ceremonies or parades with other flags, the U.S. flag should be to the observer's left.

- The flag should be displayed at every public institution and at schools during school days.
- When displayed vertically and not on a staff, the union should be on the left when observed. It should be suspended so its folds fall freely as though the flag were staffed.
- The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- The flag is often displayed at half-staff on days of mourning, including Memorial Day. The flag should first be hoisted to the peak for an instant, then lowered to half-staff position, which is half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff.

· On a vehicle, the U.S. flag should be displayed from a staff firmly fixed to the chassis. It should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle.

- The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise. It also should never have anything placed on it.
- A flag in poor condition should be destroyed with dignity, preferably by burning. Most American Legion posts and local Boy Scouts troops will have the resources to retire flags accordingly. Many will host annual flag retirement ceremonies on Flag Day.




