## WHAT'S COOKING

#### Summer is here!

We are having typical Minnesota weather, chilly one day and steamy hot the next! It seemed like it was too warm for the birds, there weren't as many at our feeders yesterday! I don't blame them, I would stay in the shade of trees too if I were them. Todays recipe comes from my friend Helga Anderson, everyone who tries them gives them rave reviews. I am writing the recipe as it was written but Helga uses 3/4 cup butter in the glaze and says they freeze well.

#### **ZUCCHINI FRUIT BARS**

- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt 2 eggs
- 2 cups grated zucchini ( do not press liquid out)
- 1 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, do not drain

#### Glaze:

1 cup butter ( Helga uses 3/4 cup)

1 1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup evaporated milk 2 tsp. vanilla

chopped nuts

Topping: coconut

Combine bar ingredients in a large bowl; beat. Pour into a greased jelly roll pan. Sprinkle with coconut. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-27 minutes.

While bars are baking prepare glaze by mixing all ingredients in a sauce pan, except for the nuts. Bring to a boil and boil for 2 minutes. Remove from heat and slowly spoon hot glaze over hot bars. It will seem like a lot of glaze but the bars will absorb the glaze. Sprinkle nuts on top!

Herman Robert "Bob" Fast always believed in upward mobility. On Saturday, June 5, Bob received the ultimate call of upward mobility. Bob's Lord and Savior Jesus Christ called Bob, and without hesitation, Bob gladly went to heaven.

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## FATHER'S DAY GIFT WRAPPED UP IN 'PACKAGE DEAL'

Cade and Beth Hartwig laugh - a lot. They also finish each other's sentences - a lot.

Armchair analysis might reveal that they finish each other's thoughts because raising four children while juggling nontraditional work schedules keeps them too busy to generate an entire sentence on their own.

The laughter probably stems from the happy chaos of raising those four kids.

"I remember one conversation we had," Beth

said. "He said, if you would have told me six months before we met, that I would be in love with a girl with three kids..."

"I would have said you're nuts. It's not happening," Cade finished.

Beth's first husband, Brandon Byers, passed away in 2009, leaving her a young widow with three young children, ages 6, 2 and 8 months. About a year later, Beth saw Cade, who is a funeral director at Lakeview Funeral Home, coming out of a restaurant.

"I said, 'Hey, you're the funeral guy," she recalled.

She asked a mutual friend about Cade. Eventually, they struck up a friendship that grew into a deeper bond.

"When I moved in, the kids were 7, 4 and 2. I didn't know what I was biting off," Cade said, eliciting waves of laughter from Beth.

He remembers standing

in line with McKayla, the oldest, at a concert at the fairgrounds. She turned to him and asked, "Why are you here?"

"I was kind of questioning that myself at the time," Cade laughed, his wife joining him.

They married in 2012 and added a fourth child, Gavin Hartwig, now 7, to the family.

Before the two became a couple, Cade had spent his off-work hours tinkering on snowmobiles, riding his Harley or hanging out with friends.

"Now there's responsibility. There's soccer, school. I went from buying parts and restoring old snowmobiles and riding the Harley to this," he said, grinning as the four kids burst into the house after a weekly visit to their grandparents, Jay and Barb Byers, Brandon's parents.

"With Gavin, Brandon's folks are Grandma and Grandpa too," Cade said. "You know, you're scared how the other family is going to react if you remarry and have other kids," Beth said.

"But they welcomed me in. They're awesome," Cade said of Jay and Barb.

The three oldest children, McKayla Byers, 17, Hailey Byers, 14, and Carter Byers, 12, don't call Cade Dad, but they do refer to them as Mom and Dad in different situations.

"I'm not trying to replace him (Brandon)," Cade said. "I always said from the beginning that it's my duty to make sure they remember who he was."

"Twice a year, on Brandon's birthday and the anniversary of the day he passed, we always go out to the cemetery, and Cade's right along with us," Beth said.

Finding time for the entire family to be together can be challenging. Beth's job at True Value has her working into the early evening hours, and Cade's job at the funeral home finds him often called out any time, any day.

But that is something they have dealt with since the beginning of their relationship.

"When Cade and I first started dating, the very first time we all went out as a family, we went to lunch. He ended up getting a call from work, and his dad had to come pick him up," Beth said.

Adding to the challenge is Cade's service as a member of the Fairmont Fire Department.

The very first fire call after they started dating lasted more than 10 hours.

"I thought, is this how it's going to be? And I still married him," Beth said. "I understand his workload."

Their last family vacation to the Wisconsin Dells was about four years ago, and it doesn't look like there will be another any time soon. Beth said with the oldest child preparing to go off to college and the youngest in early elementary school, it's almost impossible to find a balance and a destination that will make everybody happy.

But the family still strives to spend time together.

"It doesn't have to be anything big. Sometimes, we're just sitting by the campfire or sitting on the porch or watching a movie in the living room," Beth said.

"Most nights end up with all of us sitting in the living room," Cade said. "I might be watching a movie. The kids might be on their phones, but we usually tend to end up in the same spot."

Occasionally, if Beth is working, Cade will load the kids in the van and head out for ice cream and a drive around the lakes.

"It's not the big vacations. It's the little moments in time that are important," he said.

"When Cade and I first met, you don't know how it's going to end up. You just don't know," Beth said. "But it seemed like it all just fit. I don't know how to explain it, but everything just seemed to fit perfectly.

"Like my mom said, he had to fall in love with me first, and then he'd fall in love with the kids. That was true. It wasn't just me. It was me and the kids."

"You said that from the beginning. It was a package deal," Cade said.

#### Father's Day gifts ... for your kids

Tf you're a dad, you Imay be in line to get some nice gifts on Father's Day. But your greatest gift may be your ability to help your children. One way of doing that is to get them started in the world of investing - and making a few investments on their behalf.

#### Here are three possibilities:

• 529 plan - If you in-

vest in a 529 education savings plan, your earnings can grow federally tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified educational expenses. (Withdrawals not used for these expenses will generally incur taxes and penalties on investment earnings.) If you invest in your own state's 529 plan, you might receive some state tax benefits, too, depending on how your state's tax laws apply to 529 plans. State-by-state tax treatment may vary, so you'll need to consult with your

your situation.

Provided you stay within certain limits, you can also use a 529 plan to pay for qualified K-12 expenses and registered apprenticeship programs. And you can even use it to repay certain qualified student loans, within limits.

A 529 plan can affect financial aid, but its effect allow a wide range of inis generally lower than vestment choices. Howevthat of other assets. And as the account owner, you have control of your 529, so, if one child decides not to go to college or pursue further education, you can want with it. switch beneficiaries.

• UGMA/UTMA account - When you establish a special type of custodial account known as either UGMA (Uniform Gift to Minors Act) or UTMA (Uniform Transfers to Minors Act), you are providing financial resources that can be used for education or another purpose that benefits your child, such as summer programs.

One potential benefit of an UGMA or UTMA is that some of the earnings will be taxed at the child's rate, which is likely lower than your own. Plus, UGMA/ UTMA accounts typically er, once children reach the age of majority (typically 18 or 21) they gain complete access to the money and can do whatever they

• IRA – A child with any

taxable compensation, such as money from an after-school job, is eligible to fund an IRA. You may want to open one on your child's behalf - and you can "sweeten" the offer by matching some of their contributions. You can't directly invest in the IRA, but you can give your child money for that purpose. Keep in mind, though, that the total amount contributed can't exceed your child's taxable compensation for the year.

An IRA is a great introduction to the world of investing. For one thing, your child can make small contributions throughout the year, so investing in an IRA doesn't seem burdensome. Also, since an IRA can be invested in different types of securities, your child can learn about various investment vehicles - stocks, bonds,

mutual funds and so on. Plus, you can point out that, with a traditional IRA, taxes won't be due on the earnings until your child starts taking withdrawals decades from now. (And with a Roth IRA, withdrawals are tax-free, provided certain conditions are met.)

On Father's Day, you can show your appreciation for whatever gifts you receive from your children. But by investing in their future, you can gain some longer-term contentment.

#### **Bluebird blues**

Keith Radel of Faribault maintains 175 sites for bluebird nest boxes and told me bluebird numbers in those boxes were down 53% from last year. Many of his birds winter in Arkansas, Texas or Oklahoma and winter storms were hard on them. The best year Keith has had fledging bluebirds was in 2012. A nasty spring here dropped that number 53% in 2013. The availability of houses has led to double the number of chickadees nesting in them this year. He has two chickadee pairs nesting 10 feet apart and has noticed no disputes among them.

Theodore President Roosevelt was one of the most powerful voices in the history of American conservation. After becoming president in 1901, Roosevelt established 150 national forests, 51 federal bird reserves, four national game preserves, five national parks and 18 national monuments on over 230 million acres of public land. He identified 91 bird species he saw or heard on

When the Spanish first encountered hummingbirds, they called them resurrection birds-believing something that shining must die each night and be reborn the next morning. Spanish missionaries used hummingbirds to explain the resurrection. Male Anna's hummingbirds dive at speeds of 385 body lengths per second according to a study in the U.K. journal "Proceedings of the Royal Society B." Mayan legend said the first two hummingbirds were created from small feather scraps left over from the construction of other birds. Hummingbirds are attracted to the color red. That includes parked cars, lipstick and hats.

#### Guy wires

Bob Janssen of Golden Valley told me he and Ray Glassel were birding years ago when they found 978 dead birds (including two yellow rails) near a communications tower by Lewisville. Guy wires can be bird-killers in a fog.

#### Q&A

"What is your favorite raptor?" I think the American kestrel is the most beautiful. The northern harrier, once called a marsh hawk, kept me company when I was a mere stripling along Mule Lake. The peregrine falcon because its TV channel kept me entertained when I was hospitalized. And the merlin because I can't help but watch one when I see one. My least favorite is a Toronto Raptor.

"Does any bird have a beak longer than its body?" The sword-billed hummingbird is the only bird to have a beak longer than its body.

"Will barn swallows reuse nests?" They may use nests from previous years, but avoid those heavily infested with mites or other parasites. When reusing nests, they clean out old feathers and add new mud to the nest's rim. They put their cup-shaped nests on upright surfaces like docks, bridges, barns and the eaves of other buildings. The nests are built of mud reinforced with grass and lined with feathers and fine grasses.

"How many nests does

a cardinal have each year?" Cardinals (Cardinalis cardinalis) commonly raise two broods in Minnesota. When the first brood fledges, the father takes care of the fledglings as the mother builds a second nest, and lays and incubates eggs.

"Do dragonflies many mosquitoes?" Not nearly as many as I wish they did because adult dragonflies and mosquitoes can keep different hours, but the carnivorous dragonfly nymphs devour mosquito larvae.

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


by making their own pudding snack. One participant commented that, "My favorite part was making an irrigation system.' 4-H Summer Fun



#### Fairmont council pushes community center ahead

A wide range of topics, from the possible sale of the aquatic park to camping inside the city limits, were covered at the regular Fairmont City Council meeting on Monday, June 14, but the proposed community center took the

Amy Long, representing the Fairmont Community Center Committee, told the council it could choose between two paths: Give city staff direction to finalize the dollar figure for the facility which would take the concept to its final plan or say no which would result in the YMCA withdrawing its participation in the project and the dissolution of the committee

Long said the committee, which supports inclusion of an ice component in the facility, was not asking for additional funds for the project. In December of 2019, the council committed \$14 million from the city's local option sales tax money to construction of the \$20 million community center contingent on the committee raising the remaining \$6 million from private donors.

On May 24, the council held a work session to hear presentations from the Fairmont Community Center Committee on the status of the project and the Fairmont Hockey Association's desire to include ice in the project.

Long said the addition of an ice component would raise the cost to \$29.9 million, based on financial numbers from 2019. Construction would begin when the committee secured the \$6 million from donors while simultaneously getting commitments for the

extra \$10 million. The center would be built on Johnson Street directly west of Mayo Clinic Health System and would include a field house, fitness center, pool, meeting rooms, class space, locker rooms

City Administrator Cathy Reynolds said there will be a meeting on Thursday, June 17, to get an estimate on the design and updated costs. She added that all the work done by the committee has been under their contracts, but the city has to be in compliance with government contracting prac-tices which would involve the city

securing those agreements. Councilor Randy Lubenow made a motion to give city staff the ability to move forward with the project as presented by the committee, and it was seconded by Bruce Peters, who initially had opposed the project.
The motion passed by a 3-2 vote with

Britney Kawecki joining Lubenow and Peters in the majority and Wayne Hasek and Michele Miller voting no. In another matter, the council unanimously approved purchasing an automated payroll and timekeeping system for city employees. Currently, the city uses paper timecards which then have to be hand entered into the  $accounting \ system.$ 

The city evaluated several systems before settling on one from Press Gold Group. The new system will handle time and attendance for city employ-ees which belong to three different

Implementing the system will cost \$3,500 with an annual cost of about \$30,000, which is paid monthly based on the number of employees using the system. The cost for 2021 will come out of reserves because the amount was not included in this year's budget.

Kawecki requested several items to be included in the council's agenda for discussion: curbside pick-up for citywide clean-up, the city hiring or contracting for structural engineering services, time limits for the public comment period at council meetings, the rental ordinance, sale of the Fair-mont Aquatic Park, camping inside the city limits and security at city hall.

Kawecki said curbside pick-up during the citywide clean-up would assist the elderly, disabled, those with no vehicles and others who have difficulty hauling items to the county shop site or to Prairieland in Truman. Peters called the city's most recent curbside pick-up in 2014 a disaster, and Mayor Debbie Foster recalled out-of-towners dumping off items for collection.

The council shared a general consensus that city staff should coordinate with service clubs and volunteers willing to help those in need of assistance in discarding unwanted items. A hotline or dedicated number would be set up for people to call.

Kawecki suggested contracting with a construction engineer instead of replacing a retiring building inspector on city staff. Reynolds said that having only one remaining building inspector would lead to delays in project inspections and that providing structural engineering services would leave the city liable for any project.

The state requires input from a construction engineer on many projects, but none are available in Fairmont, which makes it a challenge for residents. The council agreed to create a list of qualified engineers available as well as investigate how other communities handle the problem.

The mayor currently maintains a three-minute time limit for speakers during the open discussion period at council meetings, but Kawecki felt that five minutes was more appropri-

Foster defended her three-minute rule, saying the time period was adequate to explain an issue and that the conversation often continues during the days after the meeting.

Hasek noted that the council mem-

bers' phone numbers and emails are on the city's website and are widely publicized so people can contact them any time, not just at council

meetings. Lubenow suggested the council monitor the public comment times over the next couple of months and then revisit the issue.

In regard to the rental ordinance, Reynolds said city staff currently is researching and updating the existing code to eliminate loopholes. Once the work is finished and reviewed by the city attorney, an updated ordinance will be presented, and a public hearing will be held.

She hoped to have the project completed by the council's first meeting in September and stressed that the intent was not to create an undue burden on landlords

Citing the financial losses the city taxpayers cover each year for the Fairmont Aquatic Park, Kawecki lobbied to put the facility up for sale. She called the move a win-win.

But Foster disagreed, stating that the move, if the pool would sell, could result in a big increase in the current admission fee.

Kawecki said that if the pool were privately run, wages would be different. She also wanted the facility open longer hours, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., compared to noon to 5:30 p.m. it is

On a motion by Kawecki and a second by Miller, the council unanimously voted to put the facility for sale. Reynolds said she would put together a request for proposal on the state website as well as the League of Minnesota Cities website and see what happens. Peters suggested not spending a lot of time on the issue. Kawecki also advocated allowing camping within the city limits, claiming it would attract revenue to the city. Camping within the city limits is governed by three ordinances. Revnolds explained. One prohibits using a camper parked in a public right of way for more than six hours. The second allows primitive camping at Cedar Creek Park for up to three days at a time or in an RV with a permit during special events, such as a disc golf tournament. The third also allows RV camping at the Winnebago Avenue Sports Complex with a permit during special events.

In other business, the council approved:

An event permit for the Fairmont Lions Club annual fly-in breakfast from 7 a.m. to noon Sunday, June 27, at the Fairmont Airport.

- An event permit for Fairmont Community Education and Recreation to hold a multicultural festival and vaccination clinic from 2-6 p.m. Saturday, June 26, on Downtown Plaza. There will be food truck vendors, musical groups and events for children.

- A one-day temporary liquor license for the Pheasants Forever banquet on Aug. 28 at the Martin County Fairgrounds.

A change order for \$47,350 with Barr Engineering to cover the delays in the Dutch Creek Habitat project. The delays on the project resulted from work required for land acquisition, boundary changes and delays in the schedule, the costs causing an increase in the original \$300,000 agreement. The funds likely will come from stormwa-

ter utility funds.
- Purchase of a used 2012 Case dozer for \$75,000 from RDO Equipment Co. of North Mankato to replace a 1987 John Deere model. The equipment will be used primarily at the yard waste recycling site (tree dump) as well as other city projects.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISING CHAPTER 9, TAXING DISTRICT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL SERVICE AND URBAN SERVICE DISTRICTS

The City Council of the City of Ceylon has adopted Ordinance 2021-01 on the 8th day of June 2021.

This ordinance establishes separate taxing districts for the purpose of all municipal taxes, except those levied for the payment of bonds and judgments, and interest thereon. Separate districts shall be known as the "Rural Service District" and "Urban Service District". Properties designated as Rural Service District properties are identified in this ordinance and the ratio of benefits to land within the Rural Service District compared to land of like market value situated within the Urban Service District shall be 25 percent.


