complete blood panel done. I was absolutely shocked when the E.R. doctor came in and said "You're in renal failure, and this is serious! Where do you want to go?" I ended up at the University of Iowa Hospital in Iowa City. Mayo was doing their EPIC changeover and did not have a nephrologist on call. I was comfortable with U of I, they saved my life in 1970. I had a malignant Wilms tumor on my right kidney, which they removed. I have lived 50 years now with one kidney.

I was admitted that Saturday with Tod and Brandon by my side, one sleeping on the floor, the other in the chair. The next morning the team of doctors came in and asked me lots of questions - the one that really struck

me was "Have you had pneumonia lately?" I said "Yes, I have." Little did I know that was a sign to them. After lots of tests I was diagnosed with Multiple Myeloma, a cancer that starts in the bone marrow's plasma cells and can affect your bones if not detected. My PET scan showed no bone invasion.

My "Angel Sister" Shawnya (a nurse) was by my side in the hospital too. She was with me for my first bone marrow biopsy which was done right in my room. Her hand will never be the same after I about squeezed it right off her. I thought I can't do this my whole life. but I have had 9 so

far and I am actually getting used to them. Shawnya shows me a picture of the Savior on the cross and I say to myself if He can do that, I can do this!

It is so important to me to share how does one really survive living with cancer and lessons I've learned

Fall Colors!

This fall we don't have to drive out of town to view beautiful fall colors, we have them right here in our own Fairmont! Our front yard's ash tree has the most vibrant yellow leaves and the neighbors have two maple trees with vibrant red leaves! Tree colors are beautiful all over town, maybe at my age I am just more appreciative of what we have right

I still have fresh basil and tomatoes too so this is one of my favorite recipes to use both!

Basil Cream Chicken

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

1 # boneless skinless chicken breast: 4 halves

3 Tablespoons butter

1/2 cup chicken broth

1 cup heavy cream

1 can (4 oz.) pimentos, optional

1 cup diced tomatoes or 1 can diced tomatoes

1/4 cup fresh basil, minced

1/2 cup parmesan grated cheese

1/2 tsp. pepper

Heat skillet over medium high heat. Place milk and bread crumbs in separate shallow bowls. Dip chicken in milk, then coat in bread crumbs. Add chicken to skillet with 1/2 of the butter, about 5 minutes. Add remaining butter flip chicken and cook another 5-10 minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Remove and set aside. Add broth to skillet to bring to boil over medium heat. Stir in cream, pimentos and tomatoes; boil and stir for 1 minute. Reduce heat, add parmesan cheese, basil and pepper, cook and stir until heated through. Add chicken back into the sauce. Serve chicken, covered in sauce with rice or pasta.



During my hospital stay my blood pressure was extremely high due to renal failure. I always had very low blood pressure. I was put on blood pressure meds. I started having migraines, then vomiting. I could actually feel my heart beat in the base of my head. I was miserable. I had a head CAT scan. After 3 days of misery the blessing of an allergic reaction to the blood pressure medicine was diagnosed. I thanked the Lord for no cancer in my brain!

hematologist came into my room and sat at my bedside for a good chat. I asked him if I do nothing, how long do I have to live? He said 2 months - boy, that road looked so good to me after all the misery I had just went through! I was actually entertaining the idea!

My hands and feet became so swollen I thought we needed to cut off my wedding ring, it hurt so bad. I had lymph nodes removed in my right arm when I had breast cancer in 2004, so I can't have needles or blood pressure cuffs used on it. My left arm was so swollen from renal failure and the constant poke from needles. I asked them if they could use my feet, which they did. After 8 days in the hospital we were excited to get home. The trip is around 5 hours so you can about imagine how swollen my feet and hands were by the time we arrived home. I was in extreme pain! Before I took a shower I said a prayer to the Heavenly Father to please help me, my ring was so tight I couldn't stand it! So very painful! I wasn't in the shower more than a minute and my ring came off my finger - I just sobbed and started yelling for Tod to come and see. We couldn't budge that ring for 8 days in the hospital, then add the 5 hour trip home! I learned that day the of our lives - some prayers are answered immediately, some come later. He knows our needs and He answers accordingly! I just need to ask Him for His help. Remember the picture of Jesus standing at the door knocking - there is no door knob for him to open I have to open the door for him - he does not force himself on me. I have my agency here on earth to choose. I made the choice to choose His path, one that has a bright future - one that has challenges to help me grow, learn, stretch my abilities, overcome my fear, bridle my passions, help my fellow man, try to live my life so I can be an instrument in in His hands, magnify the gifts and talents He has given me to help others on their journey here. I had to learn to completely trust Him! He knows what I stand in need of. He is my super hero and He wins in the end - I take comfort in that! A lot going on in our world right now - I'm so grateful His laws and standards never change. He is the same yesterday, today and forever. I know what He stands for and I try my best to follow His example. I find joy and peace with Him. He

I truly miss attending church each week, there is strength in numbers! Church is a hospital for sick people. We all fall short each week. When we attend church we can recharge our spiritual battery and try to be a little better each day. By going to church we show the lord we are trying to become who He designed us to be. We need His help, and He usually sends that help through other people in our lives. We learn truths at church, we learn about others and listen to their perspectives. We also learn to be very careful about judging others. everyone here grows and overcomes things in their lives on very different time lines and in different

is the sure foundation

on which I stand.

We don't know their mission here. We need to keep an eternal perspective thinking about Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ often, praying for guidance, loving others, forgiving others. These truths have sustained me when everything in my life has changed in one moment's time: healthy to sick - working to disabled - active to isolation - energy to exhaustion - hair to bald - hugger to no hugs - (I never realized people who are compromised that wear masks should never give hugs). I love hugs! I have found I get sick if I take that chance Life has slowed way down for me. I'm grateful for that, now I "see" and "recognise" the blessings of each new day.

A big challenge during this journey was money. I was self employed so if I didn't work, no money was coming in. I would ask my myeloma doctor when can I return to work. His answer was always "not yet." I had to sign up for disability. They turned me down the first time (I guess 2 months from dieing wasn't sick enough) so I applied again. This time they approved it, but said they would start it from the time I had my stem cell transplant in October, so first payment came the third week of April, 2019, three weeks shy of a year from when I got sick. The Lord blessed me during that rough time - my church relief society, friends, family, brought meals out almost every day. I received cards and letters with money, the Aspire girls sold tshirts and had a rummage sale and raffles for me.

My daughters set up meal train for me. A classmate whom I haven't seen in 35 years send me a check for \$500, a direct answer to my prayer. My children, Josh, Sara, Dani Scott, Spencer and Madi came and took great care of me. Brandon, when home, took me to appointments in Iowa City which allowed Tod to work, which was peace of mind for him. I was so sick. Now Tod works from home which is a blessing for

Stem Cell A true miracle hap-

pened the end of

September 2018. The morning we were to leave for my stem cell I received a call from my nurse telling me my stem cell had not been approved. I was devastated! I pleaded with her not to cancel me. I knelt by my bed and petitioned the Lord for His help. I called the insurance company and asked them "What the holdup? was They said I needed records from 1970 when I had kidney cancer and hadn't received them from the U of I Hospital. It just so happened I have a cousin Jerry that worked in dialysis at U of I and retired 5 years ago, so I called him. He told me he had just had dinner with my nephologist's secretary the night before and would call her for help. She ended up faxing my 1970 records to my insurance company that very day - "incredible" although the insurance company still needed time to evaluate my records. I called the nurse at the insurance company in charge of my case and pleaded with her to please help me, so she said she would put my files

My sister came to my home at noon that day and said let's go -I said I haven't been approved yet. She said "you have faith don't you?" I said I sure do! So we left, still not knowing if I was approved. The next morning from my room at Hope Lodge I called the insurance

in the doctor's desk.

appointment was at 9 a.m., to ask if I had been approved. She said I was approved. Many tears flowed that morning. I knelt by my bed and thanked Almighty God for my miracle!

My sister had to give me a series of shots each day for 10 days to boost my stem cell production. Then I could start harvesting my own stem cells to be stored and used later. So this process can take up to 10 days. The first day of harvesting we started at 8 a.m. A tube was placed in my neck, then hooked up to a machine. I started cramping up in my fingers then my calves, so I had to eat Tums, as many as I could stand. It was so uncomfortable I ate the whole bowl they gave me. Thank goodness my sister is also a massage therapist too. We finished the day around 3:30. They said they would call me that night to tell me how many stem cells I collected, and also what time to be back in the morning. The goal was 20 million stem cells. That night we got the call that I didn't need to return as I had harvested all 20 million in 1 day! Another blessing from above!!

In the last year I have struggled with a lot of charlie horses - they attack my feet, legs, hips, back, hands, neck and lips. They have brought me to tears and awakened me in the night. I prayed for relief. My blessing came. We picked up a couple with truck problems not far from our home. On our way to their company at 8 a.m., my house the lady asked

me how I was doing. I said good, all but the charlie horses I get. She said, "I used to get those, and my Dr. said to drink tonic water. It has quinine in it. So I decided I would try it - what a miracle!!! 1/4 cup each night gave me my life back! (Canada Dry Tonic Water). I tried other brands and they didn't work. This couple was an instrument in the hands of God, sent to help me! This wasn't happenstance. This was inspiration! Another direct answer to my prayers.

When our lives come to a cross road which happens a lot, we do have to make a choice. Battery Cables and Terminals - Make sure the battery terminals and cable ends are free from corrosion and the connections are tight.

Drive Belts - Inspect the underside of accessory drive belts for cracks or fraying. Many pentine" belts are made of materials that do not show obvious signs of wear; replace these belts at 60,000-mile intervals.

Engine Hoses - Inspect cooling system hoses for leaks, cracks or loose clamps. Also, Battery and Charging squeeze the hoses and replace any that are brittle or have an exces-

Tire Type and Tread - In areas with heavy the best winter traction. provided they have adequate tread depth. Replace any tire that has less than 3/32-inches of tread. Uneven tire wear can indicate alignment. wheel balance or suspension problems that must be addressed to prevent further tire damage.

Tire Pressure - Check tire inflation pressure on all four tires and the spare more frequently in fall and winter. As the average temperature drops, so will tire pressures - typically by one PSI for every 10 degrees Fahrenheit. Proper tire pressure levels can be found in the owner's manual or on a sticker typically located on the driver's side door jamb.

Air Filter - Check the engine air filter by holding it up to a 60watt light bulb. If light can be seen through much of the filter, it is still clean enough to work effectively. However, if light is blocked by most of the filter, replace it.

Coolant Levels Check the coolant level in the overflow tank when the engine is cold. If the level is low, add a 50/50 solution of

coolant and water to maintain the necessary antifreeze capability. Test the antifreeze protection level annually with an inexpensive tester available at any auto parts store.

Lights - Check the operation of all headlights, taillights, brake lights, turn signals, emergency flashers and back-up lights. Replace any burnt out bulbs.

Wiper Blades - The blades should completely clear the glass with each swipe. Replace any blade that leaves streaks or misses spots. In regions where snow is common, consider installing winter wiper blades that wrap the blade frame in a rubber boot to reduce ice and snow buildup that can prevent good contact between the blade and the glass.

Washer Fluid - Fill the windshield washer fluid reservoir with a winter cleaning solution that has antifreeze components to prevent it from freezing.

Brakes - If there is any indication of a brake problem, have the system inspected by

a certified technician to ensure all components are in good working order.

Transmission, Brake and Power Steering Fluids - Check all fluids to ensure they are at or above the minimum safe levels.

Emergency Road Kit Carry an emergency kit equipped for winter weather. The kit should include:

Mobile phone preprogrammed with rescue apps and important phone numbers including family and emergency services, and car charger, Drinking water, First-aid kit, Non-perishable snacks for both human and pet passengers, Bag of abrasive material (sand, salt, cat litter) or traction mats, Snow shovel, Blankets, Extra warm clothing (gloves, hats, scarves), Flashlight with extra batteries, Window washer solvent, Ice scraper with brush, Cloth or roll of paper towels, Jumper cables, Warning devices (flares or triangles), Basic toolkit (screwdrivers, pliers, adjustable wrench).



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Car Battery Maintenance

Today's high-tech vehicles make more electrical demands than ever before, and your car's battery helps meet those demands in a variety of ways. The car battery supplies electrical current for the starter motor to crank the engine, and it provides power to electrical accessories when the engine is off. During vehicle operation, when electrical loads exceed charging system capacity, the battery steps in to provide any needed extra current. And throughout all this, the car battery acts as a voltage stabilizer for the entire electrical system.

Do-it-yourself preventive maintenance can play an important role in maximizing the life of your battery. It is also important to have an automotive service professional, such as those found at AAA Approved Auto Repair facilities, test your vehicle's battery, starting and charging systems annually. Early detection of weak components can save you time, money and inconvenience.

Battery Safety Although batteries seem uncomplicated, they can be hazardous to service if you are not careful. Batteries, and the corrosion that forms on their terminals, contain sulfuric acid that will cause chemical burns and can damage most surfaces it contacts. To avoid injuries, observe any warnings on the battery and in your owner's manual, then follow these additional precautions:

Always wear eye protection, gloves, and old or protective clothing.

Avoid squeezing or tipping the battery in any manner that could cause acid to spill out. In the event of a spill, flush the area immediately with water.

Take special care not to drop the battery. Batteries are heavy and can cause personal injury. In addition, the battery case may crack, creating an acid spill.

Never smoke when servicing a battery, or expose the battery to a spark or open flame. Charging batteries produce hydrogen gas that can ignite and cause an explosion.

Remove all jewelry.

A ring, watch or other metal object that creates a short between the positive battery terminal and ground can cause explosive sparks or serious burns. For the same reason, never place metal tools near, or on top of, the battery.

Always wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water after handling a battery. This will dilute and neutralize any acid with which you may have come in contact.

Battery Inspection & Service

Whether you have a battery with removable vent-caps or a sealed "maintenance-free" battery, regular inspection and service are required to ensure the battery works safely and effectively. Note that some "maintenance free" batteries do have vent caps that can be removed for service.

Clean/Inspect The

The simplest battery maintenance procedure is keeping the case clean. Dirt and oil residue on the case can cause a current drain on the battery. Clean the case by wip-

Check The Electrolyte

The electrolyte solution in your battery is a mixture of sulfuric acid and water. If the battery has removable vent caps, check the electrolyte level at every oil change. The level in each cell should be above the top of the battery plates and even with the bottom of the "well" beneath the vent cap. If the level is low, add distilled water as needed, being careful not to overfill the cells. Tap water is contains mineral deposits that will shorten the life of your battery.

Inspect/Clean The Terminals

Inspect the battery posts, terminals hold-down hardware for corrosion buildup and loose or cracked connections. If corrosion is present, clean it away using a 50/50 solution of baking

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with a small, stiff brush. tergent solution. Once After removing corrosion, rinse the battery thorinspect it for cracks and oughly with clean water. Catch the contaminated water in a suitable container - a plastic drain pan works well - and dispose of it properly.

Remove/Install **Battery**

If the battery terminals or hold-down hardware are severely corroded, it may be necessary to disconnect the cables and remove the battery to properly clean the components. Loosen each battery cable clamp and spread its ends to remove the cable from the battery. If the clamps are frozen in place, use a suitable puller to remove them from not recommended as it the terminal posts. Never

pry a cable clamp off the terminal post as this can damage the battery's case and internal connections. Always remove the cable from the negative battery terminal first, then the positive terminal. Reinstall them in the opposite order, positive cable first, then negative. There are three basic ways to distinguish the positive and negative terminals:

Color-code: red for positive and black for negative (not all cables match this code).

Symbol: + for positive and - for negative (usually molded into the battery case).

Size: on post-type terminals, the positive post is usually slightly larger in diameter.

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Disconnecting battery on a modern vehicle will erase various onboard computer memories. This makes it necessary to reprogram features such as radio station presets, and it may also result in minor driveability glitches until the powertrain control module can "relearn" the vehicle's operating characteristics. On a few cars, disconnecting the battery will require a dealer visit to reprogram certain functions. To avoid these issues, consult your owner's manual before disconnecting the battery, and connect an alternate "memory keep ment. Underhood heat increases the rate of chemical degradation in the battery. To combat this heat, some cars have a heat shield that fits over the battery. If your vehicle came with a heat shield, make sure it is properly reinstalled following battery service or replace-

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battery that is suitable for every vehicle. Physical size, terminal location, and cranking power are all important factors in ensuring the proper fit and function of your battery. In fact, choosing the wrong battery can adversely affect the entire electrical system of your vehicle. For maximum convenience, AAA's Battery Service (available in most areas) can install a proper replacement battery in your vehicle at home or at work.

Battery Selection Tips: Replacement batteries are usually selected based on "Group Number" and "Cold Cranking Amps" (CCA) rating. The Group Number (for example, Group 24) is an industry standard that defines the battery's

physical size, its holddown configuration, and the type and location of its terminals. Cold Cranking Amps (for example 650 CCA) is an electrical measure of how much current the battery can provide for 30 seconds at a temperature of 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

Select a battery with the same Group Number as the original equipment (OE) battery. This will ensure a secure fit, proper clearance, and no cable/terminal issues. Here are some additional

If your vehicle uses a non-standard battery (one without a Group Number), use an OE replacement or take special care to ensure a non-OE battery will not create problems.

If your car's OE battery is equipped with a protective heat shield, make sure the shield will fit properly over the replacement battery.

Never install a battery with a CCA rating lower than that recommended by the vehicle manufacturer. A higher-rated battery will work effectively if it fits properly, but a lower-rated battery may cause electrical system problems.

Purchase your battery from a high-volume seller with fresh stock no more than 90 days old. Most batteries have a three- to five year life from their date of activation. You don't want a battery that has already lost a good portion of its service life sitting on a shelf.

Look for a battery with an extended full-replacement warranty. Top quality batteries offer this type of coverage for three or more years. Battery warranties that are prorated after a short time provide significantly less protection.

Jump Starting

When a battery has been discharged to the point where it will no longer crank the engine, a battery boost, or "jump start," can get you back on the go.

Jump-Starting Precautions:

While jump-starting may appear to be a simple procedure, special care must be taken to ensure the safety of the people and vehicles involved. Before you begin, review the "Battery Safety" information earlier in this brochure. In

Inspect the battery for low electrolyte level and top up with distilled water as necessary. If the electrolyte loss was caused by leakage from a cracked case, replace the battery.

In low temperatures, look for a bulging case or ice in the cells that indicate the battery has frozen. If necessary, remove the battery and allow it to

thaw in a warm location before proceeding.

Never attempt charge or jump-start a battery that is frozen or low on electrolyte. The battery may rupture or explode!

Jump-Starting Vehicle:

The jump-start procedure below is generic in nature. Always check your owner's manual for vehicle-specific instructions and precautions before attempting to boost a battery. Jump starting is not advised for some newer cars, and on others certain fuses need to be removed protect electronic components.

Position the two vehicles so their batteries are within jumper cable distance of one another, but do not allow the vehicles to touch.

On each vehicle:

Remove the key from the ignition. If either vehicle is equipped with a keyless ignition system, make sure the "smart fob" is at least 10 feet away from the vehicle before connecting the jumper cables.

Set the parking brake. Turn off all factory electrical systems such as the lights, heater fan, radio, etc.

Disconnect any aftermarket electrical accessories such as cell phones, radar detectors, stereo amplifiers, etc.

Identify the positive

and negative terminals on the discharged battery and the booster battery.

Refer to the diagram below and connect the jumper cables in the following order to the speci-Your fied locations:

> Install one end of the positive jumper cable (red clamp) to the positive terminal of the discharged battery.

> Install the other end of the positive jumper cable (red clamp) to the positive terminal of the booster battery.

> Install one end of the negative jumper cable (black clamp) to the negative terminal of the booster battery.

Connect the other end of the negative jumper cable (black clamp) to a ground point on the vehicle with the discharged battery, such as the engine block or an accessory bracket, as far from the battery as possible. To prevent damage from sparks, never connect the negative jumper cable to the discharged battery.

Try to start the vehicle with the discharged battery. If the engine seems to be turning too slowly, stop cranking and start the other vehicle to avoid draining both batteries. Try to start the discharged vehicle again.

Once the vehicle starts:

Allow it to run at a high idle for 30 seconds or more.

Turn on the headlights and heater blower motor to provide an electrical path for any voltage spikes that may occur when disconnecting the jumper cables.

Remove the jumper cables in the reverse order of installation.

Turn off the headlights and heater blower motor.



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Tire Safety and Maintenance

Vehicle's Tires

Your tires are the only part of the car that has direct contact with the road. Tires affect your vehicle handling, ride, braking, and safety. For optimum performance, tires must have the correct air pressure, tread depth, balance and the wheels of the vehicle must be properly aligned.

Checking your tires on a regular basis is an important step in protecting your safety and your automotive investment. Ideally, tire inspections should be performed monthly. If you drive over potholes and debris in the road, live in a cold climate, or drive long distances regularly, then you should inspect your tires more often.

Always inspect your tires before a long trip. The more often these inspections are performed, the easier it will be to find a small problem, such as a

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Understanding Your nail in your tire, and fix it before it becomes a more expensive and time-consuming issue.

Signs of Tire Wear:

Poor tire maintenance can lead to premature tire wear, a flat tire or even a blowout. Factors other than tires themselves also can affect tire wear. Worn suspension parts and wheel alignment both play a direct role in tire wear and performance.

Tire Problems to Look For During a Visual Inspection:

Over inflation: Too much air pressure causes mostly the tire's middle section to contact the road. This creates wear primarily in the center of the tread, with less wear at the tire's edges.

Under inflation: Too little air pressure causes mostly the tire's outer edges to contact the road. This creates wear primarily on both edges of the tire tread, with less wear in the center.

Tread wear on one edge of the tire: This typically occurs when the wheels are out of alignment.

Erratic tread wear: This is often called cupping, and may mean the wheel other suspension components need to be replaced.

Raised portion of the tread or sidewall: May to it.

However, the same truck has a stopping distance 122 feet shorter if it passes the quarter test with a simple tread depth instead. This is a 24 percent difference in stopping distance, and the equivalent of six or more car lengths.

The Tire Rack also reported that tires passing the quarter test exhibited better grip on the road

under other driving conditions as well. Given these facts, AAA suggests you put that penny back in your piggy bank and instead use a quarter to check tire wear and determine when it is time for replacement.

Tire Inflation Inspection:

Keeping your tires properly inflated is one of the easiest ways to help maintain good gas mileage and extend the life of your tires. Check your car's tire pressure at least once a month with a quality gauge, that measures pressure in pounds-per square inch (psi). Three types of tire pressure gauges are available at most auto parts stores: digital, dial and pen/stick types. The digital and dial designs tend to be more accurate and easier to read, although a good pen/stick gauge will do the job as well. Pressure gauges built into air hoses at gas stations are often abused and frequently inaccurate.

Recommended tire pressures are for cold tires. Therefore, tire pressure should be checked at ambient temperature before the vehicle has been driven. Checking tire pressure on a car that has warm tires can result in a pressure reading of up to 5 psi higher than the recommended pressure. The recommended inflation pressures for your car's tires can be found in the vehicle's owner's manual or on the tire information decal attached to the driver's door jamb. On older cars the decal may be in the glove box or inside the fuel filler door.

Checking Air Pressure: 1. Remove the tire's

valve cap. 2. Place the gauge over the tire's valve stem and press firmly so that no escaping air is heard. The tire gauge will indicate how much pressure is in the tire.

3. Adjust the tire's air pressure as needed. When adding air, push the air hose into the valve firmly, until the air stops escaping. Check the pressure every few seconds to help judge the amount of air going into the tire, until you reach the recommended air pressure. If the tire's pressure is greater than it should be, use the nipple on the tire gauge to press the center of the tire valve stem and release air.

4. Replace the valve cap.

5. Repeat the process for the other tires. Don't forget the spare tire.

Tire Maintenance:

There are several tire maintenance procedures that automotive repair professionals should do because they require special tools and knowledge. However, understanding these procedures will help you feel more confident in dealing with a repair provider.

Tire Rotation

Tires on the front and the rear of vehicles operate at different loads and perform different steering and braking functions, resulting in unequal wear patterns. To gain maximum life and performance from your tires, it is essential to rotate your vehicle's tires. Refer

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to your vehicle's owner's manual for mileage recommendations. Usually tire rotation is performed between 5,000 and 7,000 miles. Common on performance cars are tires designed to rotate in a specific direction; these can only be rotated frontto-rear, and if different tire sizes are used on the front and rear axles rotation is not possible.

Tire Balancing

tires help minimize uneven wear and extend their life. When tires are balanced, small weights attached to the wheels to limit vibration of the tire and wheels as they turn. Newly installed tires should be balanced, and thereafter whenever a vibration is noticed. Balancing is also called for whenever a tire is removed from the wheel, for example to specific wheel alignment settings. If any alignment measurement falls outside the specified range, uneven tire wear can result, vehicle handling may be affected and fuel economy can be diminished.

You should have the wheel alignment checked and adjusted characteriswithout drifting or pulling to either side. A drift or pull can be caused by problems other than just alignment, so a thorough inspection should be

performed by a qualified shop to determine the exact nature of the problem before an alignment is performed.

Lead For Minnesota

Hey folks, my name is Alex Young-Williams and I'm new to the Fairmont community! The purpose of this article is to introduce myself and explain my work to all of Fairmont, but first I'd like to give an overview of the organization I'm working for, Lead For Minnesota.

Lead For Minnesota seeks to recruit, train, and place young leaders in two-year paid fellowships across rural, tribal, and economically distressed urban communities. They focus on places with bold visions lacking the capacity to attract and retain the next generation of leaders to create a more unified Minnesota.

Lead For Minnesota's Fellowship program recruits and trains young leaders to return to their hometown or home state to address critical community challenges through placements in local government and nonprofits. Fellows are tasked with full-time work on a key public challenge, and also work

to recruit other young people to the region over their two-year term.

Lead For Minnesota is an AmeriCorps Program that allows eligible Fellows to serve as AmeriCorps Members within their placement. Another advantage of the program is the wide range of resources each Fellow has already connected with; during the initial training for the work, we met small-town mayors across Minnesota, representatives from statewide funding organizations like the Bush Foundation, as well as from regional groups, such as the Region 9 Development Commission.

I was born and raised in the Washington, DC area; my father works for the civil service and my mother is currently a freelance writer and translator. I enjoy golfing, hiking, and being outdoors in general. I'm passionate about mental health and economic insecurity in particular. I moved to Minnesota for the first time four years ago to attend Macalester College up in Saint Paul. I really enjoyed my time as a student, and as I became more involved in existing community networks, I began seriously considering staying in Minnesota beyond graduation. During this time, I also became more interested in local organizing and changemaking.

My placement in Fairmont, with the official title of Community Activator, is due to the work of a few different local organizations in collaboration with the executive director of Lead For Minnesota, Benya Kraus. They were able to draw up a project scope that shapes my work.

While Project 1590 in particular has helped to find funding sources for my work and is guiding me, I see my role as being an advocate of the Fairmont community as a whole, not only certain segments of the population. My main focus is on downtown revitalization, with additional emphasis on issues of economic development, affordable housing, and childcare. In order to most effectively address these challenges in Fairmont, I am currently conducting a listening tour with many different community leaders and stakeholders. The work that I pursue will be primarily based on the information, opinions, and ideas I continue to receive. My intention with this project is to bring Fairmont residents together in a community visioning process that imagines what Fairmont could look like in the future without any limitations, and, over time, build a strong, inclusive, and healthy community identity.

I hope that this op-ed helps to clarify my role here in Fairmont. I'm so excited to get to work on many of the great projects and initiatives that are already underway here!
