

Carolyn Drevlow is a Certified Nurse Practitioner who will be working exclusively at the Truman Clinic. Drevlow grew up in Truman and currently re-sides there. She has been a Nurse Practitioner in the area since 2003, and most recently worked at Dulcimer Medical Center in Fairmont and Ecumen Hospice in Owatonna. Carolyn will see patients of all ages at the Truman Clinic. She will provide care for acute illnesses and minor injuries, chronic disease and medication management, immunizations, well-child care, sports physicals, adult physicals and preventive health care.

Lauren Schofield is a Registered Nurse (RN) who will also be working exclusively in Truman. Lauren lives east of Truman with her husband, Will, and their children. She is a graduate of New Ulm Cathedral High School and attended the University of Minnesota, Duluth and Presentation College for her RN degree. She worked ten years in long-term care and seven years in public health prior to joining Madelia Health. In addition to her RN role, Lauren will also be doing some on-site laboratory tests for patients.

Ashley Holm will be working in Patient Services at the Truman Clinic. She recently moved to Truman from Madelia. Ashley has been working at our Madelia facility for four years.

In August, Madelia Health signed a five-year lease with the City of Truman to open the Clinic. It is attached to the Heartland Senior Living facility location, formerly occupied by Mayo Clinic Health Systems. The inside of the building has been fully remodeled

with new flooring, paint, furniture and decorating. Outside new landscaping and signs will be completed soon, if weather permits.

Parmesan crusted pork chops

4 boneless pork chops

1/3 cup grated parmesan cheese

2 tablespoons Italian bread crumbs

3 tablespoons olive oil

1/2 tsp. garlic powder

1/4 tsp. paprika

1 tsp. dried parsley

1/4 tsp. pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Coat glass baking dish with cooking spray.

Drizzle pork chops with 2 Tablespoons olive oil, both

In a shallow bowl, combine grated cheese, bread crumbs, garlic powder, paprika, parsley, and pepper. Dredge pork chops into mixture until coated. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a skillet and saute'pork chops, 5 minutes each side. Place in baking dish and cook for 24-30 minutes, longer if chops are thick.







I've always lived where five months of the year came with cold weather and snow; in a word, winter: Montana, South Dakota, Iowa, Wisconsin, and now Minnesota. I like

snow and always have. As a kid, we'd listen intensely to the radio station impatiently waiting for the morning disc jockey to speak those four glorious words: "School is canceled today." When he finally said it, we'd jump up and down celebrating. Cheers echoed through the house as the word "There's no spread, school today." It was as if our favorite team had just won the championship game in overtime against a detested rival.

With this news, some of my brothers and sisters went back to bed, while others scrambled to find boots, hats, scarves, gloves, and of course, extra socks.

Mom had a large wicker basket of mismatched socks. If we didn't have snow boots, we'd put on two pairs of socks, then slip a plastic bread bag over our foot, followed by another sock, then the shoe. Even though our shoes would get wet, the plastic kept our feet dry so that we could stay outside longer.

When gloves or mittens weren't available, a pair (or two) of socks on your hands worked just as well.

There was a lot to be done on a snow day:

- We'd hurry outside to the undisturbed, new snow.
- Standing with our backs to the fresh snow, we'd put our arms straight out to our sides and fall backward.
- Sweeping arms and legs simultaneously, we made snow angels.

After making snow angels, we might take our snow shovels out to clear a few walks and make a few bucks - or keep playing in the white magic.

He was a friend known since grade school. He and I grew up together, were in the same class, played the same games. and graduated at the same time. However, like most of the youth of that time, we went our separate ways. I went into college and he went

ing me once in college. He had driven his brothers' large milk truck to my college town to have some large tires installed. He got the truck stuck when he tried to drive under a railroad underpass. Then it happened! I remembered that he had been in the army. Had he been buried in Fort Snelling National Cemetery? I also remembered his middle name. He was Richard Anthony Carroll. I contacted the cemetery and was told that, yes, he was buried there. How could someone get a sense of relief about finding a gravesite?

We were in Minneapolis yesterday. We decided to visit Fort Snelling and try to find his grave. We had only seen the lines of white markers from the road in the past. It was hard to believe that each marker represents a person. We entered the main gate and stopped in the information center where a large kiosk panel faced me. The directions on the front asked for information. I inserted Richard Anthony Carroll and it happened! It printed a grave location map. We drove to the right section of the cemetery, parked, and looked at the line upon line of named markers. It was while we waited that a service person of the cemetery drove up in a service vehicle. I asked him if he maybe couldhelp me find a certain numbered grave. His smile gave

the answer! He asked me to walk with him up the hill. He would stop periodically and check the number on a grave. He moved down the line and waved at me. He had found Site 4426 in Section X. I walked to the grave and saw the name of Richard Anthony Carroll! I could feel it come as I touched the white stone marker. I had paid the needed tribute!


