## Changes in Federated's annual meeting

Attend Federated Rural Electric's 85th Annual Meeting Wednesday, August 5th; vote on candidates for the Nominating Committee, directors and Bylaw amendments.

The Annual Meeting will convene at the Martin County Fairgrounds in Fairmont from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. to allow for drive-in voting; then it will resume at the Jackson County Fairgrounds in Jackson from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Federated's Bylaws do not allow for mail-in or online ballots for candidates. This is one of the reasons for the Bylaws' amendments and drive-in voting, considering that large groups may not be allowed under the pandemic. Members will stay in their vehicles the whole time.

Instead of a meal for Federated members, registered members who come to vote will receive a \$20 Federated electric bill credit on their September bill. In addition, members will receive a wall charger with USB ports for tablets and cell phones with an outlet as an attendance gift.

### The Federated Bylaws amendments:

- clean up language to be gender neutral;
- remove language about membership certificates since they are no longer issued;
- clarify that a member's eligibility as a candidate for their district is determined by their residence;
- allow mail-in or online voting for future Annual Meetings;
- allow ballots cast in an election to count toward the quorum; and
- clarify payments on wholesale power capital credits and updates capital credits language to follow Minnesota state law and publishing unclaimed cap-

ital credits listing.

Federated members received the July Connections newsletter that outlined all of the proposed Bylaws' changes and candidates' biographies. This newsletter can also be found on Federated's website: [www.federatedrea.coop/connections](http://www.federatedrea.coop/connections). Federated members should bring along their July Connections newsletter, which includes their barcode registration card for faster registration; onsite registration will also be available.

Members will also elect two Board directors for Districts Three and Four. District Three director candidates are David A. Hansen, Jackson; and Chris Winter, Alpha. Candidates for District Four are Harold Knutson, Jackson; and Scott Thiesse, Welcome. Pending the Bylaws amendments passing, their terms would start after December 31, 2020.

The Nominating Committee candidates for District 1 are Gary Madsen, Okabena; and Mark Runge, Lakefield; the District 2 Nominating Committee candidates are: Ryan Erickson, Lakefield; and Drew Wedebbrand, Jackson.

A brief meeting will occur at the Jackson Fairgrounds, south of the grandstand, in the parking area at 6:30 p.m. Members may vote and either drive away or stick around for the 6:30 meeting, staying in their cars to socially distance. Members can listen on their radios to the brief meeting on 105.7 FM. The meeting agenda involves approving last year's Annual Meeting minutes, the Nominating Committee's report and recognize that those members voting create a quorum. Members

will honk their vehicle horns to vote on the minutes. No other speeches will be done due to the pandemic and drive-in format.

Ballots will be locked in Federated's vault to isolate from any virus. Ballots will be counted Friday, August 7 at 8 a.m. by Federated's Nominating Committee and attorney. After the candidates are notified, the results will be announced to the membership by noon through the media, Federated's Facebook page, website and in its September Connections newsletter.

In case of major storms and outages Federated has slated Wednesday, August 12, as the rain date with the same locations and times.

Federated is a Touchstone Energy electric cooperative serving 6,800 members in Jackson and Martin Counties.

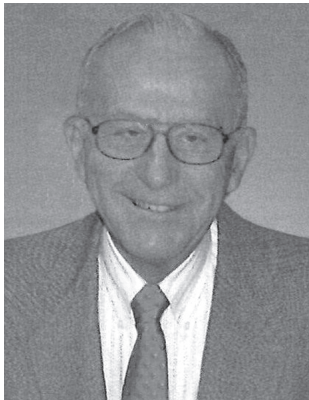

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## Sticking to budget can boost your emergency fund

During the coronavirus pandemic, our health concerns – for ourselves and our loved ones – have been at the top of our minds. But financial worries have been there, too, both for people whose employment has been affected and for investors anxious about the volatile financial markets. And one aspect of every individual's total financial picture has become quite clear – the importance of an emergency fund.

Even in normal times, it's a good idea for you to keep three to six months' worth of living expenses in a liquid, low-risk account. Having an emergency fund available can help

you cope with those large, unexpected costs, such as a major car repair or a costly medical bill.

Furthermore, if you have an adequate emergency fund, you won't have to dip into your long-term investments to pay for short-term needs. These investment vehicles, such as your IRA and 401(k), are designed for your retirement, so the more you can leave them intact, the more assets you're likely to have when you retire. And because they are intended for your retirement, they typically come with disincentives, including taxes and penalties, if you do tap into them early. (However, as part of the economic stimulus legislation known as the CARES Act, individuals can now take up to \$100,000 from their 401(k) plans and IRAs without paying the 10% penalty that typically applies to investors younger

than 59½. If you take this type of withdrawal, you have up to three years to pay the taxes and, if you want, replace the funds, beyond the usual caps on annual contributions.

Of course, life is expensive, so it's not always easy to put away money in a fund that you aren't going to use for your normal cash flow. That's why it's so important to establish a budget and stick to it. When developing such a budget, you may find ways to cut down on your spending, freeing up money that could be used to build your emergency fund.

There are different ways to establish a budget, but they all typically involve identifying your income and expenses and separating your needs and wants. You can find various online budgeting tools to help you get started, but, ultimately, it's up to you to make your budget work. Nonetheless, you may be pleasantly surprised at how painless it is to follow a budget. For example, if you've budgeted a certain amount for food

each month, you'll need to avoid going to the grocery store several times a week, just to pick up "a few things" – because it doesn't really take that many visits for those few things to add up to hundreds of dollars.

You'll be much better off limiting your trips to the grocery, making a list of the items you'll need and adhering to these lists. After doing this for a few months, see how much you've saved – it may be much more than you'd expect. Besides using these savings to strengthen your emergency fund, you could also deploy them toward longer-term investments designed to help you reach other objectives, such as retirement.

Saving money is always a good idea, and when you use your savings to build an emergency fund, you can help yourself prepare for the unexpected and make progress toward your long-term goals.

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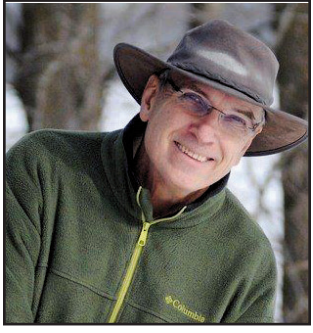
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## Naturally

The red admiral butterfly feeds on tree sap, rotting fruit and bird droppings. Its caterpillar eats nettles. This makes them nearly impossible to cook for. When I was a dear boy, I called the painted lady a "thistle butterfly." Thistles are host plants for the caterpillars.

I watched an aggressive eastern kingbird fight with a crow, a couple of blue jays and a robin all in one day. Why attack a robin? It must have considered it a threat and the kingbird granted no pardons to anyone. It has a forceful personality. Eastern kingbirds often perch in an exposed position in the high trees or along utility lines or fences. They fly in shallow, rowing wingbeats, typically accompanied by electric, sputtering calls.

I saw foxtail barley, sometimes called squirrel-tail grass, growing on roadsides. The plant has a windswept look and can grow in rough conditions. I spotted dogbane leaf beetles on milkweed and dogbane. They have blue, gold, green and copper iridescent colors and are smaller than Japanese beetles. Dogbane has milky sap, but monarch butterfly caterpillars won't eat it.

The perfume of flowers lingered in the air. In the jungle, the mighty jungle, the cricket chirps tonight. In the jungle, the quiet jungle, the cricket chirps tonight. Go outside at dusk and listen to a chirping cricket. Count the number of chirps it makes during a 15-second period. Adding 40 to that number will give you the approximate temperature in Fahrenheit.

I look forward to seeing northwestern crows in Alaska each year. Con-

sidered a cousin of the familiar American crow until a recent study on the genetics of the two species prompted the American Ornithological Society to conclude that the two species are actually one and the same. It's a variation within a species.

Mallard drakes have yellow bills. Hens and juveniles sport orange-and-brown bills.

### Q&A

"Did the turkey just miss being our national bird?" I've read that the turkey lost by a single vote to the bald eagle in 1782 to become the national bird or national symbol. The debate over the national symbol was memorialized in the musical 1776, in which founding fathers debated three possible birds. In the end, the eagle is picked over the turkey and dove. The National Constitution Center says that in real life, a committee in 1782 came up with a complicated design that featured a crested imperial eagle and a dove. The turkey was never in the discussion about becoming a national symbol.

"What do squirrels eat?" Acorns, hazelnuts, walnuts, butternuts, hickory nuts, tree seeds, fungi, buds, corn, fruits, berries, sap, eggs, nestlings, sunflower seeds, insects, caterpillars, small animals and snakes, carrion and goodies from the garden. When it comes to a diet, they don't carrot all. It might have been easier to list what they won't eat.

"Do rabbits tunnel?" The eastern cottontail rabbit doesn't dig its own burrows. They use deserted burrows of other animals, woody vegetation, decks or brush piles to escape the elements. A Michigan study showed only two out of 226 tagged cottontails lived 2 years. Other studies found about 30% of rabbits survive a winter. A cottontail's range is around 5 acres.

"What's the point of a yellow jacket?" It's on the opposite end of their heads. Seriously, a yellow jacket gives you something to wear with those light orange pants. Yellow jackets are beneficial insects.

They feed their young caterpillars, flies and other insects that damage crops and garden plants.

"What kind of gopher is Goldy Gopher?" The mascot of the University of Minnesota isn't a pocket gopher. He has stripes and looks like a thirteen-lined ground squirrel, which is often called a striped gopher. The original design was based on a thirteen-lined ground squirrel. The state nickname derives from a political cartoon by R. O. Sweeny, published as a broadside in 1858. The word "gopher" is a generic term for any rodent living underground. Some people think the original model for Goldy must have been a chipmunk, an animal more commonly seen than the thirteen-lined ground squirrel (other nicknames include striper, squinney, leopard ground squirrel and striped ground squirrel). I've heard a ground squirrel called a grinnie, but that term is more often used for a chipmunk.

"Why do I see so many crows in fields of mowed hay?" They are there for the food. They eat animals that didn't survive the mowing. The crows also gobble up voles, mice, large insects and bird eggs that have limited cover. Look for vultures and kestrels to feed there, too.

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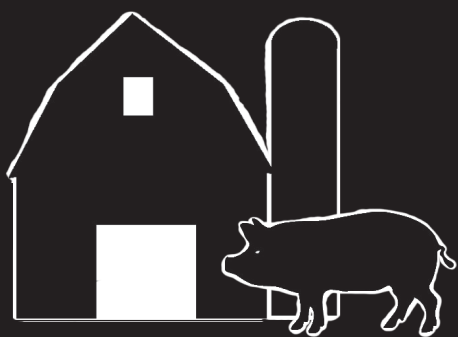

City of Granada, MN

ORDINANCE NUMBER – 36

Granada, Minnesota

Building and Zoning.

An ordinance of the City of Granada, Minnesota, regulating the construction and location of buildings in said City, in furtherance of the general health, safety, and welfare of its citizens and providing a penalty for violation, and providing for imposition of a fee to offset costs of enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance.

Chapter 1

The City Council of Granada ordains as follows:

Section 1 – Permit Required

From and after the effective date of the enactment of this Ordinance, no person or persons shall construct a building in the City of Granada, or move a building into the City of Granada for the purpose of placing it on any property therein, without first obtaining a building permit from the building official of the City. Furthermore, no person or persons shall change the physical, external footprint of their house, garage, building, or other structure, or to make structural changes to their house, garage, building, or other structure without first obtaining a permit as set forth in this ordinance.

Section 2 – Building Official

Unless other appointment is made by the Council, the City Clerk shall be the designated building official of the City of Granada.

Section 3 – Application; Fee

Each application for a building permit shall be accompanied by a fee of \$50.00. Such application shall be presented to the designated building official prior to the commencement of any construction which requires a permit under Section 1. Said application shall be accompanied by a drawing, to scale, showing the size of the lot or lots upon which the building shall be constructed, altered, or placed, and the distance from the front and side of said lot where the said building is to be located or altered.

Unless approved by the City Council, no building permit shall be issued by the building official unless said building is set back from the front property lines at least a distance to conform with the other buildings then constructed on adjacent property, nor unless such building is situated so that the sides of the same are at least 10 feet in distance from adjacent property.

Section 4 - Conformity

If a building permit is issued to the applicant, they shall thereafter conform in all things with the provisions stated in their application. If applicant encounters conditions which require material changes to the plans or specifications submitted with their application, applicant shall thereafter submit new plans for approval by the building official prior to enacting or incorporating such different specifications than submitted on their application for a permit. Applicant is responsible for identifying the adjoining property lines and the costs of any required surveys necessary to comply with any applicable setback or zoning requirements. The City of Granada is not responsible for identifying or obtaining property lines.

Within city limits, all buildings serviced with indoor plumbing shall be connected city water and sewer services. It is the Owner/Applicants responsibility to cover the cost of installation and maintenance from their structure to the City water/sewer connection(s). All work performed for purposes of connecting to City water and sewer services shall require a permit as otherwise set forth in this Ordinance and be performed by a licensed contractor qualified to perform such services.

Section 5 – Time; Limitations

Any person or persons receiving a permit under this ordinance shall thereafter complete construction of the proposed structure, building, or alteration within a period one year from the date the permit is issued. Failure to complete construction within a period of one year shall not constitute a violation punishable under Section 6 of this ordinance, but the applicant must cease construction until such time as applicant has re-applied for a new permit under this ordinance and paid an additional fee for such permit as required under Section 3.

Section 6 – Violations; Penalties

Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance, or fails to comply therewith, or who violates or fails to comply with any order or regulation made hereunder, or who builds in violation of any statement of specifications submitted and approved hereunder, or any certificate or permit issued hereunder, shall for each such violation or non-compliance, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, be fined not to exceed \$1,000.00 or jailed for a period not to exceed 90 days, or both.

The imposition of a penalty under this section for any violation of this ordinance or non-compliance therewith, shall not excuse any such violation or noncompliance, nor permit it to continue. All such persons found to be in violation or non-compliance under this ordinance shall correct or remedy any violation, defect, or noncompliance within a reasonable time. When not otherwise specified, each ten days that a violation of this ordinance continues shall constitute a separate offense punishable under this Section.

The owner of a building, structure, or premises where anything in violation of this ordinance shall be placed or shall exist, and any architect, builder, contractor, agent, person, or corporation or other entity employed in connection with the installation, construction, or maintenance of a building or structure in violation of this ordinance shall also each be guilty of a separate offense under this ordinance until removal or compliance.

The imposition of any penalty for violation of this ordinance shall not prevent the enforced removal or correction of prohibited conditions.

Section 7 – Repealer

Ordinance Number 36 passed by the City Council on May 5<sup>th</sup>, 1956, is hereby repealed in its entirety and replaced with the contents set forth herein.

Section 8 - Effective Date

This ordinance shall be effective and be in full force and effect immediately after its passage and legal publication.

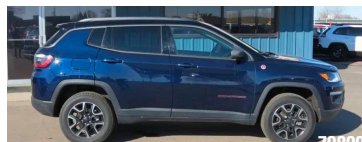

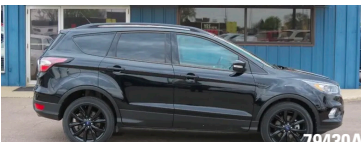

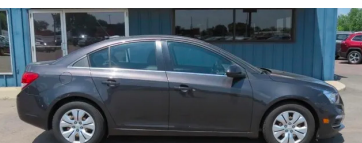
