

If you've chosen your ly below asking price. Sellers will usually reject "lowball" offers, especially if the property is priced properly. If your offer is flat out rejected, many times you can try again by submitting another offer. You do have to be careful, though, when submitting a "low-ball" offer to test the waters because you don't want to offend the sellers. If you offend them, the seller may never accept another offer from you, even if it is a good one.

2. Here's another scenario: You might get an immediate "Yes!" from immediate

the seller if you submitted an offer that was at asking price, or above asking price. If this happens, you will always wonder if you could have offered less and still received an accepted offer from the seller.

3. The most common possibility after submitting your first offer is when the seller submits another offer back to you, which is called a counter offer. How many times you and the seller "counter" depends on how much each of you like to negotiate. Some buyers and from sellers really like to negoti-

ate. If you like to negotiate more than the seller, you may push them away and they end the game. Keep in mind, the seller can end negotiation at any time. Are there any Aquatic Invasive Species of concern in Martin County?

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) are plants or animals that are not native to Minnesota and cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health. There are many aquatic species that we should be concerned about; zebra mussels, Eurasian watermilfoil, starry stonewort, spiny water flea, silver and bighead carp. These will displace and out compete with our native beneficial species.

So the big question. Have any been found in Martin County? As of now, no! There are no populations of aquatic invasive species in Martin County. So, where is the closest infestation in our region of the state? By using the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources website, under aquatic invasive "infested list" we can find which waters have been listed as impaired. You can access the infested waters list and other useful information about aquatic invasive species www.dnr.state.mn.us. Water bodies are added to the infested waters list if they contain populations, or they are connected to a water body that does have a population of invasive species. Located to the North and East of Martin in Blue Earth County, Lura Lake was put on the infested waters list in 2004 for Eurasian water-milfoil. Also in Blue Earth County just to

Anyone can use the MN DNR website to keep up to date and educate themselves on Aquatic Invasive

Species. Being aware they exist, and taking the time to clean water equipment before you transport them is very important in preventing the spread.

Minnesota is home to 11,842 lakes that are 10 acres or larger in size. Outdoor and recreational enthusiasts are doing their part in controlling the spread of aquatic invasive species, only 5% or 592 lakes are on the infested waters list.

You can help stop the

spread of aquatic invasive species. Take these steps every time vou leave a lake or river - whether or not it's infested:


Clean your boat, trailer, and equipment and remove any visible plants, animals, or mud before leaving a waterbody.

Drain water from your boat, motor, live well and bilge before leaving a waterbody.

Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash. Never release fish, animals or plants into a waterbody unless they came from that waterbody. To keep live bait, drain the water and refill the bait container with bottled or tap water.

Learn to identify aquatic nuisance species and report any suspected sightings to the nearest DNR fisheries station.

It is against the law to transport invasive species. Contact Martin SWCD or your nearest DNR office for further assistance about aquatic invasive species.

Saturated Buffer

A saturated buffer is an outlet in which tile drainage water seeps beneath buffer areas of perennial vegetation via a subsurface distribution pipe prior to entering a drainage ditch or stream. The purpose is to reduce nitrates in tile water via denitrification and plant uptake, and to reduce peak flows associated with typical tile drainage outlets.




Diagram of a woodchip bioreactor. Source: Farm Journal Magazine.





Diagram of a treatment wetland. Source: Sustainable Sanitation and Water Management.



Conservation Easements or Working Lands CRP land **Programs:** may transition into conservation easements to provide longer term benefits. NRCS's Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) or state or private easement programs may be an option. Participants planning to

agriculture use, USDA's working land programs, including FSA's CRP Grasslands, NRCS's Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) or the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) may be available to address a participant's resource needs. In many cases a combination of approaches can be taken on the same parcel. For example, riparian areas or other sensitive parts of a parcel may be enrolled in continuous CRP, and the remaining land that is returned to farming can participate in CSP and even receive additional ranking

The mission of Martin SWCD is to assist land users of Martin County in efficiently utilizing the soil and water resources in creases the sales and use tax our county. This is accomplished in large part due to our partnerships with Federal, State, and Local agencies, as well as with local Conservation Organizations. By working with a diverse group of partners, we are able to make our grant funds go further to implement projects such as water quality inlets, streambank restorations, or denitrifying bioreactors.

One source of funding we receive for projects is from Minnesota's Clean Water Fund. On November 4, 2008, Minnesota

voters approved the Clean Water, Land & Legacy Amendment to constitution to: protect drinking water sources; protect, enhance, and restore wetlands, prairies, forests, and fish, habitat; preserve arts and cultural

heritage; support parks and trails; and protect, enhance, and restore lakes, rivers, streams, and groundwater.

The Amendment inrate by three-eighths of one percent on taxable sales, starting July 1, 2009, continuing through 2034. Those dollars are dedicated to four funds: Outdoor Heritage Fund, Clean Water Fund, Parks and Trails Fund, and Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund.

Right now, Martin SWCD has funds from the Clean Water Fund to offset the cost of installing certain conservation practices, including saturated buffers, treatment wetlands, and streambank restorations in the Elm Creek Watershed.





1 layer cup thinly sliced celery, can add some chopped onion if you wish

1 layer thinly sliced raw carrots, 1 1/4 cups

1 layer raw potatoes, sliced very thin, about 4 medium potatoes

Top these layers with on can undiluted cream of mushroom soup.


