Fort Bliss, Texas, for reorganization and training for service in Europe.

In November of 1944 Battery "H" left initially for England to be eventually deployed on the mainland of Europe. While there, they would take part in the Rhineland and Central Germany Campaigns with the Third Army. In 1945, when the war was over, they received replacements thereby allowing all the older personnel to be sent back to the states to be discharged. Some of these soldiers being discharged at that time had



served for nearly five years from the time they initially left Fairmont.

The Martin County Historical Society was recently provided access to a large number of photos of service members of Battery "H" that are unidentified. These pictures, presently at the Pioneer Museum, may very possibly include parents, grandparents, and other relatives of Martin County residents that might well be important family connections to the past. We would like to encourage you to stop at the Pioneer Museum in Fairmont to see if any of these pictures are of your relatives and if you can possibly identify anyone pictured in this collection. "The Hairdressers" mark 50 years

Roger Harris opened rinse \$4.75 The Hairdresser's March 3rd, 1967 after working five years as a hairdresser in a salon at the Kahler Hotel in Rochester, Min-

Roger was sure he would be able to provide a better life for his wife Shari and expanding family if he opened his own salon. As Roger reflected on those days gone by, "if I could pull in \$100 a week, I thought I would be doing fantastic". Rent for his shop would cost was \$35 a month with heat, water and lights costing an ad-

ditional \$7 a month. A perfectly preserved appointment book sits on the kitchen table. Gently opening the book Roger looks endearingly as he turns the pages of the book. "See here, my first customer was Vickie Berhens" said Roger, "She paid \$3.75 for a haircut and shampoo set." The service provided and price charged, neatly written next to each customer's name, with numbers tallied for a daily total at the bottom of each column.





Is it spring yet?

I do like the changing seasons, but must admit I am ready for warm sunshine, leafing out trees and to dig around in the dirt in my flowers. It must be the farmer in me! You would think by my age I would learn patience. I've had enough of curling up with a good book, with a blanket and my furry Maggie on my lap. Besides that, I can also read in a lounge chair in my back yard, admiring my flowers and enjoying watching the birds at the bird feeders! Maybe the winter will make me appreciate spring even more when it arrives! I always think of asparagus in the spring. Lucky for us we can find it most of the year in the store. Frozen is good too and in the recipe I am sharing with you today, broccoli can be substituted for the asparagus. I have made it both ways. Go easy on the curry, 3/4 tsp. suits my taste, but if you like curry go for it!

Classy Chicken:

3 chicken boneless, skinless breasts, cubed in bite size pieces

1/4 tsp. pepper

3 Tblsp. olive oil or vegetable oil

10 oz. asparagus or broccoli, can use more if you

10 oz. can of cream of chicken soup

1/2 cup Hellman's mayonnaise

1 tsp. curry powder

1 tsp. lemon juice

1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Saute' chicken sprinkled with pepper in oil over medium heat until done, about 6 minutes. Drain. Cook asparagus or broccoli until crisp/tender, drain well. Arrange in bottom of baking dish. Place chicken on top. Mix together undiluted soup, mayonnaise, lemon juice and curry. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle top with cheese. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes, until hot.

What Is Contract For Deed?

A contract for deed is an alternate financing agreement whereby the seller finances the home sale rather than a traditional lending institution. Typically, this type of purchase is sought after by those who may have difficulty obtaining a loan by other means.

In a contract for deed, the buyer agrees to pay the purchase price plus interest in monthly instalments under terms worked out between buyer and seller. Usually the loan period is 3 to 10 years, with a balloon payment at the end. During this time, the seller retains legal title until it is paid off, at which time the title goes to the buyer.

A common misconception by potential buyers is that little or no money is required up front to purchase by contact for deed. In fact, it takes an

average of \$5,000-\$10,000, depending on the down payment negotiated between buyer and seller, and may include attorney fees, closing costs, taxes, insurance, title search/ title insurance, and other expenses.

The contract for deed method does have some risks for both parties to the agreement, and lacks some of the protections that automatically come with traditional mortgages. For example, if the buyer defaults on the payments, or fails to maintain the property, the seller can cancel the agreement, and repossess it without going through foreclosure processes. If the buyer cannot get a loan when the balloon payment is due, the seller can cancel the contract with a 60 day notice, and has the right to evict the buyer, and keep the down payment and any equity that has accrued.

The buyer risks paying too much for the home if they do not have it appraised before they agree to a price.

If the seller is still paying a mortgage on the property, it is necessary for him to obtain permission from his lender to sell the home as a contract for deed. Without this approval the lender can call the loan due (acceleration clause), and the buyer's balloon payment becomes due or the contract is cancelled.

Traditional mortgages and other liens have priority over a contract for deed, so if the home is foreclosed upon because of the seller defaulting on his payments, it is likely that the buyer will forfeit any money paid and lose the right to live in the home.

On the plus side, sellers are able to offer a lower interest rate than conventional lenders, and those who own their property outright can consider the monthly contract payments as income. They do have to act as a property manager throughout the life of the loan in order to protect their interests they must check the property to make sure it is being properly maintained, verify that taxes and insurance are being paid (some sellers even escrow this), and provide a statement of interest paid for the buyer's income tax.

Although a Contract for Deed is a viable option for some, most buyers and sellers prefer the services of a traditional lender, an experienced closing company, and the guidance and assistance of a realtor, who has been through the home buying/selling process many times, and understands the pitfalls and problems that may arise, and how to deal with

'How big a threat is an outdoor cat to birds?" Research published in the jourtematics" found that cats kill approximately three times more wild birds than all other known human-related direct causes (windows, automobiles, power lines, towers, agricultural chemicals and wind turbines) of bird deaths combined. A bird death due to habitat loss is considered indirect mortality.

"What is a good way to identify birds?" Size can be difficult to determine in the field, especially in poor light or at a distance. Size comparisons are easiest when an unidentified bird is seen near a familiar species. Otherwise, use the sizes of wellknown birds, such as the house sparrow, American robin and American crow as references to determine size. the length and shape of the bill. Notice field marks--patterns and colors. Consider the habitat where the bird was seen. Take notes. Take a photo. Draw the bird. Record the bird's song if possible. been a pleasant surprise during the early weeks of 2017, with both Chicago Board of Trade (CBOT) futures prices and local cash soybean prices at considerably higher levels than a year ago. Many farm operators have already sold their 2016 soybean production; however, for those producers that still have 2016 sovbeans in storage, this may be a good time to price some of the remaining inventory. The current price levels also suggest that it may be an opportunity to consider pricing a portion of the expected 2017 soybean production.

Current CBOT soybean futures closed at \$10.48 per bushel on January 27th, which compares to near \$8.80 per bushel in late January, 2016, and near \$9.60 per bushel in late January, 2015. Similarly, CBOT November soybean futures ended trading at \$10.24 per bushel, which compares to near \$8.90 per bushel and \$9.45 per bushel in 2016 and 2015 respectively. This puts CBOT soybean futures prices at about \$1.70 per bushel higher for current contract, and over \$1.30 per bushel higher for "new crop" prices, as compared to a year ago.

Local cash soybean prices in Southern Minnesota offer a similar sce-

Soybean prices have nario, with current soybean demand for soybeans, both prices near \$9.50-\$9.80 per in the U.S. and globally. bushel, which compares to \$8.00-\$8.35 per bushel at this time in 2016, and \$8.80-\$9.20 per bushel in 2015. Current "new crop" prices in Southern Minnesota for the 2017 crop have been near \$9.30-\$9.60 per bushel, compared to late January "new crop" soybean prices of near \$8.25 per bushel in 2016, and \$8.90 per bushel in 2015. In 2014, local "new crop" soybean prices were near \$10.40 per bushel in late January, and dropped to the near \$8.50 per bushel by late September.

The latest USDA Report, released in January, 2017, estimated the U.S national market year average (MYA) on-farm cash soybean price for 2016-2017 in a range of \$9.00-\$10.00 per bushel, resulting in an average soybean price of \$9.50 per bushel. The 2015-16 USDA price estimates are the expected average prices from September 1st, 2016 to August 31st, 2017, for the 2016 crop year, and are not estimated prices for the 2017 crop year. By comparison, the final national MYA soybean prices were \$8.95 per bushel for 2015-16 and \$10.10 per bushel for 2014-

The current strength in the soybean market has been driven by increasing

The levels of the soybean processing domestically and the amount of soybean exports are estimated to increase in 2016-17, compared to the previous two years, which has helped strengthen prices. The "caution flags" with maintaining the current strength in the soybean markets are the projected high level of soybean ending stocks, the final 2017 South American soybean production, reductions in future soybean export levels, and the 2017 planted soybean acres in the U.S. The latest USDA Report listed estimated 2016-17 soybean ending stocks at 420 million bushels, which is more than double the ending stocks of the previous two years. Future U.S. trade policy with China and Mexico are very important, as they are two of the major export markets for U.S. soybeans.

The biggest "wild card" in the current soybean market, especially for "new crop' soybeans, will likely be the level of 2017 planted soybean acres in the U.S. The first actual USDA estimates will be released in the March 31st Planting Intentions Report. Many private analysts are estimating 2017 U.S. soybean acreage in the range of 88-90 million acres,

which compares to U.S. soybean acreages of 82.7 million acres in 2016 and 81.8 million acres in 2015. An extra 5 million acres of sovbeans, increases the 2017 U.S. soybean production by approximately 235 million bushels, at a "trend-line" soybean yield of 47 bushels per acre, and even more with above average U.S. soybean yields, such as existed in 2016.

If the U.S. soybean acreage ends up at 88 million acres with a "trend-line" yield of 47 bushels per acre, the total 2017 U.S. soybean production would be estimated at just over 4.1 billion bushels, which is similar to the estimated total soybean demand for the 2016-2017 marketing year. If either the estimated 2017 U.S. planted soybean acres, or the expected 2017 national yield increases from those levels, it will likely put pressure on both current cash soybean prices, as well as 2017 "new crop prices. Conversely, lower than expected soybean acreage levels, or significant weather issues during the 2017 growing season, could help maintain strong soybean prices throughout the year.

Local cash corn prices in Southern Minnesota have not been nearly as encouraging as current soybean prices. Current cash corn prices were near \$3.10-\$3.25 per bushel on January 27th, which compares to \$3.25-\$3.40 per bushel in both 2016 and 2015. Current "new crop" local corn prices for the 2017 crop have been near \$3.30-\$3.40 per bushel at many locations in Southlevels in other areas, which time. USDA is currently estimating the MYA corn price for 2016-2017 in a range from \$3.10-\$3.70 per bushel, or an average of \$3.40 per \$3.61 per bushel for 2015-16 and \$3.70 per bushel for 2014-15.

In 2016, the local cash corn price in Southern Minnesota increased about \$.40 per bushel from late January to early June, peaking at about \$3.75 per bushel, before dropping significantly to near \$3.00 per bushel by pattern in 2015, with local cash corn prices rising nearly \$.50 per bushel from late January to early July, and then dropping to near \$3.25 per bushel by mid-August. Many farm operators have a significant amount of unpriced 2016 corn stored in grain bins on the farm, and need to pay close attention to any potential late Winter and Spring rallies in the cash corn market. The fairly large level of USDA estimated 2016-17 corn ending stocks at 2.35 billion bushels will likely limit any sustained rallies in the cash corn market beyond early Summer, unless there are growing season weather issues with the 2017 corn crop.

Similar to the 2016 corn crop in storage, producers need to look at opportunities to forward price some of their 2017 corn crop, either through CBOT futures contracts or with forward cash as grain market situations contracts. From mid-May to mid-June, 2016, CBOT

At that same time in 2016, the "new crop" forward cash corn price was \$3.65-\$3.75 per bushel, compared to curbushel, which compares to rent cash corn prices below \$3.25 per bushel. In 2014, 2015, and 2016, the highest corn prices have been offered in late Spring and early Summer in the year that the corn was produced, and post-harvest corn prices have never topped that level the following year. The last time we saw corn prices rise post-harvest was in 2013 late July. There was a similar following the major U.S. drought and reduced corn production in 2012.

It is important for farm operators to develop a good grain marketing plan for both the unpriced 2016 grain that is still in storage, as well as the expected 2017 corn and soybean production. Grain price targets should be based on realistic price expectations, as well as calculated crop production breakeven levels. Producers are also encouraged have target dates that are linked to grain marketing decisions and prices, especially with the unpriced corn and soybeans that are in storage. Historically, in most years with large grain supplies, such as exist in 2017, cash grain prices for "old crop" corn and sovbeans usually drop by a fairly significant level after July 1st. The price targets need to be continually reviewed and adjusted, change.


