

WEEK OF FEBRUARY 19, 1972

The front page of the Photo Press advertised the KSUM&KFMC Sport and Boat Show to be held at both halls of the Fairmont American Legion.

Twenty-eight participating exhibitors were listed. Admission was free and one feature of the show was an antique fishing lure display.

Betsy Lucas, daughter of Andrew and Mary Lucas was named International Baccalaureate program's Student of the Quarter. She was to attend Duke University next year.

Gary Hoehn of the Martin County National Bank and Jon Gunther of Gunther's Foods, presented checks of \$1,250 as a down payment to assure that the replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall would come to Fairmont in August. A total of \$5,000 was needed to be raised to pay for the display, which would be set up in Fairmont's Lincoln Park. Terry Anderson also served on the committee, and he, along with Jon Gunther both served in Vietnam and Jon's brothers Bob and Bill both served during the Vietnam era.

Development Park. A long story in the Photo Press said the company had been searching for a site for six months, and Fairmont officials were excited about the prospects.



"Honest" Sam Hackett. . . . Really!

Honesty and integrity are two character traits that are undeniably important where public trust is concerned. When we think of county employees, especially someone being county treasurer, most likely assume honesty and integrity to align with that position. However, there seems to be an instance contradicting that in the lengthy history of Martin County treasurers.

Sam Hackett, Martin County treasurer from 1876 to 1879, was thought to be so honest that he was often referred to as "Honest" Sam Hackett. He was considered by most as a person of integrity, a person perceived to have an "outstanding reputation for honesty.'

However, in September of 1879, a routine audit of the Martin County treasurer's books exposed some serious discrepancies. It appeared that the county treasurer, Sam Hackett, had been embezzling county funds since he took office in 1876.

What could have prompted this so called upstanding citizen to from the embezzle county treasury? There were some rather bazaar findings from the initial discovery of his crime up to and including what he suggested as a resolution to the problem.

It was discovered that "Honest" Sam Hackett had some disconcerting investments by way of the county treasury funds. He not only built a hotel in Sherburn with county funds, but he also invested county funds in his own store that was a mercantile business in Fairmont. But even more bazaar than that, his proposition to resolve the shortfall and pay the money back was, to say the least, mind boggling.

county board regarding his embezzlement of county funds, Hackett appeared embarrassed and sorrowful and thereby proposed a solution to the problem. His suggestion was that if he were allowed to go back east, he could raise the money among his relatives and pay the money back. Appearing sincere, the county board allowed this to happen and appointed F. S. Livermore to be in charge of the treasurer's office. "Honest" Sam's bondsmen put up the money for his trip back east.

However, "Honest" Sam never came back. Now, the county was "on the hook" for what "Honest" Sam had embezzled and the bondsmen for the cost of his trip back east. Hackett had turned his property over to the bondsmen, although it was heavily mortgaged. The bondsmen were comprised of some well-known Martin County individuals including William Budd, William Bird, C. H. Bullard, among others. Although at first reluctant to reimburse the county, the bondsman finally reached a compromised settlement following the threat of legal action by the county.

You might think that this would be the end of the saga of "Honest" Sam Hackett. However, it appears he had a number of sympathizers. A story in the May 3rd, 1889, edition of the Martin County Sentinel entitled "Sam Hackett Still on Deck" stated the following: "Poor old Sam Hackett, one of the pioneers of Martin County and for a long time one of its honored and trusted citizens and officials, is located in Worthington, Minn, where with his three sons he has the contract for putting up

When he met with the a \$30,000 school house. For the past ten years Sam has been a fugitive from Justice."

> The story goes on to tell of his "clandestine" visits to Fairmont where he didn't want to show his face. It concluded with a lengthy paragraph stating that few believe he was naturally dishonest and that his unfortunate mercantile business contributed to his "error in judgement" involving embezzlement. It goes on to say that people have long ago forgiven him and that a petition signed by nearly all citizens was presented to Judge Severance asking him to dismiss the indictment. However, that request was denied. The story closes by saying, "With all his faults Sam's old friends in Martin County still have a warm place in their hearts for him and wish him none but good luck."

> It's been said that crime doesn't pay. One might then wonder if, with the passage of time, forgiveness is inevitable. That appeared to be the case for the former Martin County treasurer who was once called "Honest" Sam Hackett, then "Slippery" Sam Hackett, and finally someone who has a "warm place" in the hearts of those that once knew him. That seems to be quite an evolution of character for a man that Al Ward once offered a reward of \$50.00 for his arrest and delivery to the Martin County sheriff.

"Dead skunk in the middle of the road. And it's stinkin' to high heav-

Loudon Wainwright III crooned that love song. The first dead skunk I saw on the road near the end of my driveway this year was on February 10. Settled into its winter home, the striped skunk becomes dormant but doesn't enter a full state of hibernation. It goes into torpor-a deep sleep from which it awakes occasionally. As the season changes from winter to spring, skunks emerge to seek mates and sometimes get in harm's way as the one did on the road at the end of my drive. Striped skunks are a polygamous species and a male takes multiple mates from late February through April. The scientific name for the striped skunk is Mephitis mephitis, meaning "bad odor" or "noxious vapor." The word "skunk" comes from an Algonquin word.

I heard woodpeckers drumming. I typically hear them beginning in mid-January and regularly in February. They drum most frequently in the morning. Drumming rates are highest before nesting, lower during nesting and increase after the young fledge. Both sexes drum. Drumming is a response to longer day length and helps establish and

maintain breeding territory, attracts a mate, maintains contact and strengthens pair bonds.


I have a heated dog dish that sits on a stand. It has an armored electrical cord to keep animals from gnawing on it. It works well as a bird waterer. When cleaning the dish, I discovered a mouse had entered through the hole for the cord and built a nest under the dish. It had an apartment with a heated ceiling and the rent was reasonable. It didn't have to break out the long underwear.

I'm noticing more yellow on the bills of starlings. A starling's bill is dark in winter, but begins turning yellow as the breeding season

there are large numbers of native sparrows (which includes juncos) around. I offer suet and peanuts, and some folks feed safflower seeds to lessen squirrel activity at the feeders. I enjoy providing room service to the birds at my feeders. Busy feeders mean I've gotten many referrals. Feeding birds provides a positive therapeutic effect on those who feed their avian amigos. I know it makes me happy. Watching birds is one of the greatest shows on earth.

"Last year, I watched a male cardinal feeding sunflower seeds to a grosbeak. Why was it doing that? And do cardinals mate for life?" He wanted to offer you a photo opportunity. Male cardinals occasionally

seed should I put in my bird feeder?" None. I don't use seed mixes in a feeder. Too much goes uneaten, clogs the feeder or falls to the ground. I use single ingredients in a feeder and like black oil sunflower seeds the best. I also feed nyjer seeds for the finches. Occasionally, I put mil-

"What kind of mixed feed nestlings or fledglings of other species, although not because they have taken over another bird's nest. This may happen because another chick is begging nearby and the cardinal has a strong parental instinct. Birds often feed babies that aren't their own. The instinct to stuff food in an open mouth let on the ground when is strong. Perhaps the

threat of not feeding one of your hungry chicks is greater than the risk of feeding someone else's. A brown-headed cowbird will lay an egg in a cardinal's nest and the cardinal will raise the cowbird as its own. I've watched a male cardinal fly down to the edge of a pond and feed koi. Cardinals don't mate for life and new pairs form during the breeding season, although some cardinals remain paired on the breeding territory all year and others get amicable divorces.

"Why doesn't a duck's quack echo?" A quack can be a fading sound, with a gradual decay, making it difficult to tell the difference between the quack and the echo, but a duck's quack echoes.

"Do opossums carry rabies?" Any mammal can get rabies, but it's extremely rare for an opossum to contract the viral disease. It's believed that the low body temperature of an opossum inhibits the virus and makes it difficult for it to survive.

"When does the sap run?" Maple sap runs best when daytime temperatures are in the high 30s to mid-40s and overnight temperatures are below freezing. In Minnesota, sap usually runs from March 15 to April 20, but the dates can vary. Sap is converted to syrup by boiling, taking 40 gallons of sap on average to produce one gallon of maple syrup.

If you're an investor, you probably enjoy the convenience of managing your accounts online. But you'll also want to make sure that you're not making it convenient for hackers, "phishers" and others with bad intentions to gain the same access.

Fortunately, there's a lot you can do to protect your privacy. Here are a few suggestions offered by the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission:

• Use a strong passvord or nassnhrase. You'll want to pick a password that would be virtually impossible for anyone to employing guess, capital and lower-

case letters, plus symbols and numbers. Of course, you'll want to record the password in a secure place so you won't forget it. Instead of using a password, you may have the option of choosing a passphrase, which contains a series of words strung together. You'll want to avoid phrases taken from popular culture or that are otherwise commonly used. And it's also a good idea not to use phrases containing your name, birthday or other nersonal identifiers.

• Use two-step authentication. If your investment company offers two-step, or multifactor, authenti-

cation, you'll want to take advantage of it, since it's a good se-curity tool. When using two-step authentication, you'll need to add an additional factor - such as your best friend from grade school or the model of the first car you owned, and so on - to your username and password. And when you log in to your account from an unrecognized computer, your investment firm may send you a code via text message or email which vou'll need to enter to open your accounts.

• Activate your account alerts. When you turn on your account alerts, you'll

receive text messages or emails notifying you of certain activities, such as account logins, failed account login attempts, personal information changes, money transfers, adding or deleting of external financial accounts, and more. These alerts can help you monitor your accounts for fraud and verify your own moves, as well.

• Avoid using public computers to access investment accounts. If you're at a hotel or library, try to avoid the temptation to use the computer to check in on your investments. But if you do use a public computer, at least take proper precautions. For starters, don't leave data on a screen and walk away, even for a moment. And when the computer, log out of your account to end the online session. You may also want to change any password you used.

• Ignore suspicious links. Be suspicious of emails or text messages containing links claiming to be connected to your investment accounts. These links could take you to websites designed to solicit sensitive account information, which could then be used for financial or identity theft. Even if the link seems to be coming from a business you know, you'll want to be quite cautious - experienced "phishers" can now create websites or online documents that look real. And keep in mind that legitimate investment firms will not ask you to divulge personal information without going through the password or twostep authentication protocols already de-

scribed. The ability to connect with your investment accounts online can be extremely useful to you - and you'll feel more comfortable about these interactions if you know you've done all you can to safeguard your information.

I was installing the oak trim boards in my house. I purchased unfinished wood, so each board and trim stick had to be clear-coated with the polyurethane finish - hand-sanded between layers.

An amazing way to start an FFA member's involvement is to participate in Career Develop Events (CDE) or Leadership Development Events (LDÉ). Students in grades seven through twelve have the opportunity to join and be a part of these team activities. The difference between these is that the LDE's focus on employment skills such as communication and speaking skills that will help in their future, versus CDE's that focus on students' success with studying and gaining knowledge in that certain event such as anatomy, identification, and math skills. These events can compete at the Regional, State, or National level. There are a wide variety that the students can pick from, twenty-five nationally recognized events to be exact. This is very beneficial because the students have a variety of events to choose from that are

compatible with things that they are interested in. There are areas of agriculture, food, and natural resources that the students can choose from within the CDE's and LDE's. A great benefit from being involved in these teams is the life experiences and knowledge that people can obtain. For example, the Parliamentary Procedure team learns the proper way in which a meeting should be run and all of the important details of meetings, such as who should sign the meeting minutes and how to make a motion. Or, in the Soils team, they learn about different soil and how the soil properties affect the crop growth. Apart from being on these teams, members learn more about their chapter and their advisors. Starting these teams really builds relationships within your chapter and your appreciativeness for FFA in general.

State Degrees and Proficiencies Written By MCW FFA President, Jacob Fiala

FFA includes many different opportunities to expand leadership skills, career readiness, service learning, and a lot of other skills in addition to these. One example that combines all of these skills is attaining a proficiency and/or State FFA degree.

Proficiency awards can be completed by any FFA member that is a freshman through senior in the organization. It is intended for students who have completed a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) and believe they have excelled in one of their SAE's. Nationally, there are about 51 proficiency categories. Common proficiency categories around this area include sheep production, swine agriculproduction, tural mechanics, ag services, and many more. This year, ten students from our completed chapter a proficiency award application, a few of them also completing a state degree. The MCW FFA chapter greatly encourages its members to complete a proficiency award to improve their skills for the future, as well as receive recognition and honor for their accomplishments. In addition to proficiencies, we had an outstanding number of students that received their State FFA degrees, the highest honor in the Minnesota FFA.

State FFA degrees are similar to proficiencies, howev-

er there are more requirements for a state degree. State degrees are a combination of all the SAEs a member has completed. In addition, a recipient must have earned at least \$2,500, participated in 10 activities above the chapter level, completed 25 hours of community service, and have demonstrated ten skills that they have improved. It is quite a lengthy process, but most members would agree that the time is well worth it. State degree recipients are made up of mostly seniors, but it is not uncommon for a few juniors to receive their state degree as well. There are five degrees total an FFA member can receive, but there are three that are the most common. Greenhand, chapter, and state degree. After the first two, (excluding discovery degree) the member gets a pin to put on their jacket. Perhaps the most exciting element about receiving the state degree is the gold chain that hangs on the side of the recipient's jacket, signifying that they have received the highest award the Minnesota FFA has to offer. Our FFA chapter has fourteen state degree recipients this year, all of whom will receive this honor at the Minnesota State FFA Convention this April in Minneapolis. We are proud of all of the work our fourteen seniors have put in to earn their state de-

Minnesota families who have owned their farms for 100 years or more are invited to apply for the 2022 Century Farm Program. Produced by the Minnesota State Fair in conjunction with the Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation, the Century Farm Program was created to promote agriculture and honor historic family farms in the state. Nearly 11,000 Minnesota farms have been honored since the program began in 1976.

Family farms are recognized as a Century Farm when three requirements are met. The farm must be: 1) at least 100 years old according to authentic land records; 2) in continuous family ownership for at least 100 years (continuous residence on the farm is not required); and 3) at least 50 acres and currently be involved in agricultural production.

A commemorative certificate signed by Governor Tim Walz, the State Fair Board of Managers President Joe Scapanski and Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation President Dan Glessing will be awarded to qualifying families, along with an outdoor sign signifying Century Farm status.




