Where's the Mayor?

The world of politics never seems to be lacking for interesting, and sometimes controversial happenings, whether locally, at the state level, or at the national level. This appears to have been true in the past as well as in the present time.

The year was 1905, and Mr. William W. Ward was the newly elected mayor of Fairmont. The April 7th, 1905, Martin County Sentinel stated that "Mr. Ward is a natural born diplomat, enterprising and up to date and will make Fairmont a first class mayor." He was re- elected in April of 1907.

William W. Ward was the third mayor of Fairmont after it became a city. Known as "Billy" to his friends, Mr. Ward came to Fairmont in about 1900 from Peoria. He worked for a short time with his uncle, Thomas Gleason, in the saloon business before opening one of his own. He was also a partner with H. C. Keck in the drainage business, at one time he owned a plumbing business, and he was also one of the organizers of the Fairmont Telephone Company serving as both president and manager. He was apparently quite an entrepreneur of his time.

However, the popular mayor was soon to become best known for his absence. A headline in the October 18, 1907, edition of the Martin County Sentinel states, "Mayor Ward Disappears." The article continues saying that he left Fairmont about six weeks ago, and hasn't been seen since September 30th in St. Paul.

Newspaper accounts indicate that Mrs. Ward soon began taking active steps to locate her husband. She initiated a search through her attornevs. They sent a printed circular to law enforcement agencies relating the following information

about Mr. Ward: "Disappeared: W. W. Ward of Fairmont, Minnesota." It went on to describe Ward as being about forty-six years old, grey eyes, grey hair, face smooth shaven, florid complexion, height

five feet eight inches, weight 215 pounds. It also stated that he was last seen in St. Paul on Sept. 30th; having indicated that he on official business. It fur-

ther said that Ward had lived in Fairmont for a number years, that he was "somewhat involved financially, but not enough to warrant his leaving for parts unknown, as most of his creditors were secured and his unpaid bills were few and in small amounts."

Further reports stated that "there has been nothing dishonorable in his business transactions." Although some newspaper accounts of that time seemed to imply that there might have been some financial concerns for Mr. Ward, they did not elaborate and were perhaps somewhat speculative in nature.

Apparently, Mayor Ward left for St. Paul in early September on business and was last seen by a Fairmont resident in St. Paul on September 30th. Many speculated that he had met with foul play; some thought that he had committed suicide; and others suggested that he had quietly left rather than face the certainty of business failure. In any event, Fairmont was without a Mayor. The city council was leaving for Fairmont was at work attempting to find a viable solution, as

the public was becoming concerned that there was no mayor of Fairmont, and the city charter of that time provided that vacancies shall be filled whenever they occur.

The January 17th, 1908, edition of the Martin County Sentinel reported that "Billy" Ward had been spotted in Tacoma, Washington, by a Fairmont resident. In addition, other reported sightings of Mr. Ward were in Illinois, Indiana, Des Moines, Chicago, Texas, Seattle, and Alaska. The editor of the Martin County Sentinel reportedly received a letter from J. R. Dalton, referred to as a reliable man formerly of Martin County, stating that a Mr. William Hartley, another reliable man also formerly of Martin County, had spoken to Mr. Ward. He said that the ex-mayor had just come from San Francisco and was on his way to Tacoma. Apparently "Billy" Ward either did a considerable amount of traveling, or he had a number of "doubles."

So, what exactly became of the former mayor of Fairmont? The January 31st, 1908, edition of the Martin County Sentinel

read, "Lost Mayor Is Located!" Mrs. Ward finally received a letter from her missing husband. In his letter, he wrote that he left St. Paul for San Francisco and that he became sick and grew worse along the way. He said he lay sick in Oakland for two weeks. He then spent a short time in San Francisco, and later went to Portland to visit an old friend for a couple of weeks. After that, his journey led him to Seattle, his location at the time he sent the letter to his wife.

Mr. Ward apparently gave no reason for his disappearance except that he was "all in financially, and saw no hope of bettering himself here." The article speculated that he would eventually send for his wife and family to come west to live.

William W. Ward, the third mayor of Fairmont, ultimately settled in Santa Ana, California, running a cigar store. He passed away in 1932 at the age of



Bedtime Snacks!

Years back my 6 oldest grandchildren would come for a week in the summer, for what we called "Grandma's Camp". They were always hungry. My next door neighbor asked me why I seemed so busy in the kitchen at 9:00 p.m. each night! The grandkids always liked a hearty bedtime snack. One year they were into ice cream shakes. It took lots of ice cream and wore out my blender, but that was such good times. I wish I could turn the clock back. Today I am sharing a snack I made that everyone liked. I could make them ahead and doesn't everyone like pizza?

Pizza Rolls

- 4 cups (16 oz.) shredded pizza cheese blend or mozzarella cheese
- 1 pound bulk Italian sausage, cooked and drained (I used mild)
- 6 oz. sliced pepperoni, chopped
- 1 medium green and red pepper, finely chopped
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 2 jars (14 oz. each) pizza sauce
- 32 egg roll wrappers
- vegetable oil for frying

Additional pizza sauce for dipping, warmed (optional)

In a large bowl, combine the cheese, sausage, pepperoni, peppers and onion. Stir in pizza sauce. Place about 1/4 cup filling in the center of each egg roll wrapper. Fold bottom corner over filling. Fold sides toward center over filling. Moisten remaining corner with water and roll up tightly to seal. In an electric skillet, heat 1 inch oil to 375 degrees. Fry pizza rolls for 1-2 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Drain on paper towels. Serve warm with additional sauce if desired. You can freeze the rolls before frying if you wish and fry as you need them.



Aquatic Invasive Species

Invasive Species of concern in Martin County?

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) are plants or animals that are not native to Minnesota and cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health. There are many aquatic species that we should be concerned about; zebra mussels, Eurasian water-milfoil, starry stonewort, spiny water flea, silver and bighead carp. These will displace and out compete with our native beneficial species.

So the big question. milfoil. Have any been found in Martin County? As of now, of the state? By using the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources website, under aquatic invasive species, "infested waters list" we can find which waters have been listed as impaired. You can access the infested waters list and other useful information about aquatic invasive species at www.dnr. state.mn.us. Water bodies are added to the infested waters list if they contain populations, or they are connected to a water body

Are there any Aquatic that does have a population of invasive species.

> Located to the North and East of Martin in Blue Earth County, Lura Lake was put on the infested waters list in 2004 for Eurasian water-milfoil. Also in Blue Earth County just to the east of Mankato; Madison, Ballantyne, North and South Eagle Lakes were all added to the list. Madison Lake, Eurasian water milfoil was discovered in 2010 and Ballantyne Lake in 2012. In 2015 North and South Eagle Lakes were listed with Eurasian water-

"How can I tell a centipede from a millipede?" Centipedes have brown, flattened bodies divided into numerous segments. Millipedes have multisegmented cylindrical or slightly flattened brownish bodies, making them look more worm-like. Centipedes are predators and are fast. Millipedes are plant eaters and move slowly.

"How many young does

a turkey vulture have?" This vulture lays one to three eggs, usually two. Turkey vultures don't build nests. Their nests sites include caves, ledges, rock crevices, abandoned hawk or heron nests, thickets, abandoned buildings, fallen trees, hollow logs and mammal burrows. The eggs are incubated for 28-49 days and the nestling stage lasts 60-84 days. They have one brood per year.

"How far will honey bees go to find food?" Honey bees prefer foraging as close to the nest as possible. They nest where there is food in order to save time and energy. They will travel 1 to 2 miles with relative ease and can go as far as 6 miles, but long distances add stresses.



A lot of "hope" exists for grain prices

Many farm operators are patiently waiting for the corn and soybean markets show a Spring price rally, which usually occurs between March and June. Thus far, any Spring rally in the grain prices has been very limited, with only a slight grain price improvement since May 1st, due to some planting delays in portions of the Midwest. The large anticipated 2016-17 ending stocks for both corn and soybeans, along with a rather robust planting intentions report on March 31st, has raised concerns about any significant grain market improvement during the Spring of 2017.

The Chicago Board of Trade (CBOT) May soybean futures had a closing price of \$9.63 per bushel on May 5th, which compares to \$10.26 per bushel on May 6th, 2016 and \$9.93 per bushel on May 5th, 2015. The nearby CBOT soybean futures price improved slightly in the first week of May, posting the highest closing prices since late March of 2017; however, the nearby soybean futures prices in early May are nearly \$1.00 per bushel lower than the closing prices in early February. CBOT November futures prices for the 2017 soybean crop closed at \$9.66 per bushel on May 5th, which is about 50-60 cents per bushel lower than CBOT November futures prices in February.

Cash prices at the soybean processing plants in Mankato were near \$9.25 per bushel during the first week of May, which again were the highest cash soybean price levels since late March, 2017. Soybean cash prices at local grain elevators in Southern Minnesota have typically been in a range of \$8.50-\$8.90 per bushel since late March. There has been a wide difference in local cash soybean prices across the Upper Midwest in recent months, depending on the local basis level.

CBOT nearby corn futures have basically been trading "steady" in recent months, closing at \$3.61 per bushel on May 5th. This compares to closing prices for nearby corn futures of \$3.58 per bushel on January 12th, \$3.65 per bushel on February 3rd, and \$3.59 per bushel on both March 9th and April 7th. Similarly, local cash corn prices in Southern Minnesota have generally been in the \$3.10 to \$3.25 per bushel range most of the time during 2017, with lower cash prices in areas with a wider basis level.

The local price "basis", which is the difference the CBOT futures price and the local cash price, has remained quite wide for both corn and soybeans at most locations in the Upper Midwest. The local basis for corn prices has been \$.40-\$.50 per bushel at most locations across Sothern Minnesota and Northern Iowa, except at grain terminals, with even wider basis levels in Western Minnesota and the Dakota's. Similarly, soybean basis levels in the same region have been at \$.70-\$.90 per bushel, and about \$.50 per bushel at the soybean processing plants. It will be hard to achieve much basis improvement in the coming months, considering the large supply of U.S. corn and soybeans that has been projected for the 2016-17 marketing year. About the only scenario that could tighten the basis would be development of a fairly major U.S. drought during the 2017 growing season.

The March 31st USDA Planting Intentions Report estimated 2017 U.S. plant-

ed corn acreage at nearly 91 million acres, which is a decline of 4 percent from 94 million planted acres in 2016, but is still above the 88 million corn acres planted in 2015. Given the fairly large 2017 acreage total, along with projected 2016-17 corn ending stocks of over 2.3 billion bushels, a major corn price rally of any type seems unlikely unless there is some type of national weather event. The 2017 U.S soybean acreage is projected at the record level of 89.5 million acres, which is 6 million acres above the previous record soybean acreage in 2016. Soybean ending stocks for 2016-17 are estimated at 445 million bushels, which is the highest level in over two decades, and will likely stymie any extended price

According to the March 31st USDA Grain Stocks Report there was over 4.9 billion bushels of corn and just over 668 million bushels of soybeans stored on farms in the U.S., as of March 1st, 2017. which represents about 56 percent of the total corn stocks and 40 percent of the total soybean stocks. There were 770 million bushels of corn and 93 million bushels of soybeans in on-farm storage in Minnesota on March 1st. 2017, and an estimated one billion bushels of corn and 115 million bushels of soybeans still in on-farm storage in Iowa. Based on those figures, there is a considerable amount of 2016 corn remaining in on-farm storage, much of which likely still has to be priced in the coming months.

Farm operators need to pay attention in the next couple of months to any short-term improvements in the cash grain prices to market any "old crop" corn and soybeans that re-

main in storage, either on the farm or in commercial storage. Historically, cash prices for "old crop" corn and soybeans tend to decline after July 1st in a given year, unless there is a major drought or other national weather event that significantly affects U.S. corn and soybean production. The last time that this occurred was in 2012. Given the seasonal trend in the corn and soybean market, producers probably need to have a "calendar target", as well as a "price target", to sell the remaining 2016 corn and

Based on farm business management records in Southern Minnesota, the average 2016 corn yield on cash rented land was nearly 205 bushels per acre, and the average "breakeven" market price was \$3.20 per bushel to cover cash input expenses and land rent, and about \$3.71 per bushel to cover direct and overhead expenses. For producers that had weather issues in 2016, and averaged closer to 190 bushels per acre, the breakeven corn price is about \$3.80 per bushel to cover cash expenses and land rent, and near \$4.30 per bushel to cover total costs of production. Local cash prices below \$3.30 per bushel in Southern Minnesota most of the time since January 1st, 2017, has resulted in a very limited amount of "old crop" corn being marketed. There was a brief opportunity to forward price 2016 corn between \$3.50 and \$3.90 per bushel during the late Spring and early Summer of 2016.

Farm operators now face the prospect of mar-keting the "old crop" corn in storage at cash prices below their 2016 breakeven levels. It may be better to have a marketing plan in place to sell this grain in the next 2-3 months, even if it means taking a small profit loss, rather than hanging on to the unpriced grain into the Fall of 2017. According to grain marketing data from Iowa State University for the past decade, local corn and soybean prices have increased or decreased about 50 percent of the time during May and June. However, during the

months of July and August, the percentage of declining corn and soybean prices increases to 60-80 percent of the time, with an average decline of about 7-10 percent.

During the Spring planting season many crop producers tend to put grain marketing decisions on the "back burner"; however, this may be a year to pay close attention to grain market changes during planting season. Farm operators need to watch the grain markets closely, and take advantage of any cash price rallies for "old crop" corn and soybeans that are still in storage. They also need to be aware of any opportunities to forward price a portion of the 2017 corn and soybean crop, especially if prices reach profitable levels. There could be some possibility of further price enhancements this Summer if drought conditions develop in the U.S.; however, there is also the possibility of rather significant price declines, if the 2017 crop prospects look favorable.



SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL USERS OF FAIRMONT LAKES:

The Fairmont lakes are covered by Minnesota and federal laws, of which every boater, swimmer and fisherman should be aware. Following are the additional items specifically pertaining to our Fairmont lakes.



These are the buoys you will encounter on our lakes, and their locations. Watch for them and obey them! It is a misdemeanor



It is unlawful to operate or permit the operation of any watercraft:

- At a speed in excess of "slow-no wake" within 100 feet of the three aerators on Budd Lake.
- At a speed greater than "slow-no wake" within 100 feet of any shoreline. This provision shall not apply to watercraft launching or landing a water skier by the most direct route to or from open water.
- A personal water craft must travel at a "slow-no wake" speed within 150 feet of non-motorized boats, shores (unless launching or landing skiers directly to or from open water), docks, swim rafts, swimmers, or any moored or anchored boat.
 - Within a designated swim area.
- To operate a watercraft so its wash or wake endangers, harasses, or interferes with any person or property.
 - To operate a watercraft in a careless or reckless manner.
- No person shall use a flotation device, including inflated inner tubes, life preservers, or similar articles for flotation purposes, except in an emergency more than 100 feet from shoreline.
- No person shall leave any temporary structure (such as swimming platforms) not extending from shore, in the waters of the city, between the hours of sunset to sunrise without a permit in writing from the Martin County Sheriff.
- In addition, as a courtesy, please do not "power load" your boat onto your trailer. This causes damage and washing out of the area at the end of
- Be aware of the Aquatic Invasive Species affecting Minnesota's waterways. The Fairmont lakes are free of these invaders and we want to keep
- Learn the current boating laws by picking up a current Minnesota Boating Guide at a MN DNR license center or going to www.dnr.state. mn.us/boating/.
- Boating While Impaired (BWI): The alcohol concentration for impaired operation is .08, the same as for motor vehicles. In addition, a second BWI offense can result in loss of motor vehicle driver's license, and forfeiture of the motorboat and trailer.
- State Law requires children under 10 years old to wear a life jacket while boat is underway.




