





The Rhubarb is Ready!

What a beautiful weekend! I spent four hours working in my flowers - ok - two of those hours were spent taking a break in my lawn chair!! The orioles were busy going in and out of the jelly and nectar and a little wren was checking out the wren house. I spent my Mother's day doing exactly what I like to do. What more could one ask for? I tried a new recipe this weekend for a rhubarb pie. It was easy - I made it even easier by buying a ready made short bread crust instead of using the recipe that came with the pie recipe. I hope that you like it too!

Pink Lady Pie Crust:

- 11/2 cups flour
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 cup oil
- 2 tablespoons milk

Mix flour, salt, sugar, oil and milk thoroughly. Press into a 9-inch pie pan, making an edge or rim. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-15 minutes. Set aside to cool.

Filling:

- 2 cups diced rhubarb
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 (3 oz.) package strawberry jello
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 cups whipped topping

Cook rhubarb and sugar over low heat until tender. Stir often and watch carefully. Add dry jello. Stir until jello is dissolved, let cool. Add lemon juice, cool to room temperature, fold into whipped topping. Pour into cooled crust and refrigerate for several hours. This may also be frozen. Top with additional whipped topping when served.



Very little change in the May 10 USDA report Guest Columnist

The USDA World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates (WASDE) Report released on May 10th did not offer any significant adjustments to projected 2016-17 U.S. corn and soybean supplies. The report was regarded as mainly "neutral" for both the corn and soybean markets in the coming months. The report showed slightly lower corn ending stocks for 2016-17, and slightly higher 2016-17 soybean ending stocks, compared to the April WASDE Report. Corn ending stocks are expected to show a 32 percent increase compared to a year earlier, while the ending stocks for soybeans are expected to more than double by the end of the 2016-17 marketing year, compared to 2015-16 ending stock levels for corn and soybeans. The 2016-17 marketing year runs from September 1st, 2016 to August 31st, 2017. Following are some highlights of the latest USDA WASDE Re-

CORN: According to the

May 10th USDA WASDE Report, the projected corn ending stocks for the 2016-17 year, which ends on August 31st, 2017, are estimated at 2.295 billion bushels, which was decreased by 25 million bushels compared to the April Report. The corn ending stocks would be at the highest level since the carryover of 1.97 billion bushels for 2005-06. This compares to corn ending stocks of 1.737 billion bushel in 2015-16, 1.731 billion bushels in 2014-15, and 1.232 billion bushels in 2013-14. USDA is projecting that total U.S. corn use for 2016-2017 will be 14.645 billion bushels for livestock feed, ethanol, food products, seed, exports, etc., which is an increase of about one billion bushels. The large level of the corn supply for the 2016-17 marketing year has put downward pressure on corn market prices since early Summer of 2016.

The May report offers one of the first USDA estimates for ending stocks in the following year for the crop that is currently being planted. USDA is projecting the corn ending stocks to be 2.110 billion bushels by the end of the 2017-18 marketing year, which ends on August 31st, 2018. This would be a decrease of 185 million bushels from the estimated 2016-17 corn ending stocks. USDA is projecting total corn usage at 14.3 billion bushels for 2017-18, which would be a slight decrease from 2016-17 estimated corn usage. USDA is estimating almost steady usage levels for feed and ethanol production in 2017-18, along with a slight decline in U.S. corn export levels. Corn use for ethanol production in 2017-18 is estimated at 5.5 billion

USDA is estimating total U.S. corn production for 2017 to be at 14.06 billion bushels, which would be a decrease of approximately 7 percent from the record U.S. production of 15.15 billion bushels in 2016. However, the 2017 U.S. corn production would still exceed the 2015 total production of 13.66 billion bushels. The USDA Report indicated an estimated 90 million acres will be planted to corn in the U.S. in 2017, compared to 94 million acres in 2016, 88 million acres in 2015, and 90.6 million acres in 2014. USDA is estimating an average U.S. corn yield of 170.7 bushels per acre in 2017, compared to a record vield of 174.6 in 2016, 168.4 in 2015, and 171.0 in 2014.

USDA is now estimating the average U.S "on-farm" corn price for the 2017-18 marketing year in a range of \$3.00 to \$3.80 per bushel, or an average price of \$3.40 per bushel, which would be the same as the current projected 2016-17 U.S. average corn price. The current USDA projected corn prices compare to the final national average prices of \$3.70 per bushel for 2014-15, \$4.46 for 2013-14, and \$6.89 for 2012-13.

SOYBEANS: According to the May 10th WASDE Report, the projected soybean ending stocks for 2016-17 are estimated at 435 million bushels, which is a slight decrease of 45 million bushels from the April soybean carryover estimate. The projected 2016-17 soybean ending stocks level compare to carryover levels of 197 million bushels for 2015-16, 191 million for 2015-16, and 92 million

for 2013-14. Interestingly, USDA estimated 2015-16 soybean ending stocks at 400 million bushels in the 2016 May WASDE Report, and the actual 2015-16 ending stocks in September of 2016 ended up lower than 200 million bushels. This probably helps offer some explanation for the unexpected strength in the soybean market from harvest season of 2016 until March of 2017.

Based on the recent WASDE Report, soybean ending stocks for 2017-18 are estimated at 480 million bushels, which would be an increase of 45 million bushels above the current estimated 2016-17 ending stocks, and would be at the highest level in over two decades. Total soybean demand for 2017-18 is estimated to be 4.23 billion bushels, which compares to 4.09 billion estimated for 2016-17, and 3.94 billion of total use in 2015-16. The increased demand is mainly due to a projected increase of 100 million bushels for soybean exports in 2017-18, along with a slight increase in the bushels used for soybean processing.

Total U.S. soybean production in 2017 is estimated at 4.25 billion bushels, which would be slightly below the 2016 record U.S. soybean production of 4.31

billion bushels, but would be considerably higher than the 3.9 billion bushels produced in both 2015 and 2014. Planted soybean acres for 2017 are estimated at the record level of 89.5 million acres, compared to 83.4 million in 2016, 82.7 million acres in 2015, and 83.3 million in 2014. USDA is estimating a national average soybean yield of 48 bushels per acre in 2017, which compares to the record U.S. soybean yield of 52.1 in 2016, and is equal to the previous record yield of 48 bushels per acre in 2015.

USDA is estimating the U.S "on-farm" soybean price for the 2017-18 marketing year in a range from \$8.30 to \$10.30 per bushel, or an average price of \$9.30 per bushel, which compares to the current estimated U.S. soybean price of \$9.55 per bushel for 2016-17, and the final U.S. average soybean prices of \$8.95 for 2015-16, \$10.10 in 2014-15, and \$13.00 per bushel for 2013-14. Given the large estimated U.S. soybean acreage for 2017, any enhancement in the national yield level will likely push total 2017 U.S. production to a record level, and thus put increasing downward pressure on 2017-18 soybean prices.





Home Rule Charter

Fairmont is one of 107 Minnesota cities (out of 853 total) that operates under Home Rule Charter. We have been a charter city for over 100 years. We became a charter city through the state mandated process of appointing a local Charter the charter for Fairmont. Being a charter city allows the citizens of our city to adopt its own way of operating our city. The charter allows for flexibility in our form of government (mayor/council) and allows us to operate with rules and procedures drafted by our citizens rather than only following rules and procedures allowed by the State of Minnesota. There are many advantages to being a Home Rule Charter City, so our forefathers were right in establishing Fairmont as one of those cities.

One of the requirements of being a charter city is that the Charter Commission meet at least annually. Fairmont uses the statutory maximum 15 members for its commission. As you may have heard, we are looking to find qualified citizens to be appointed to our commission. This is an impor-

tant commission for our city but not typically a time burden. The commission meets only once per year unless the citizens or commission members would like to make changes to the charter.

The Charter Commis-Commission that created sion has four-year terms. The commissioners are appointed by the district court, typically from a list submitted by the mayor and council. By reestablishing the commission now, half of the members will have two-year initial terms and the other half four-year to create staggered terms. Charter commission members can serve unlimited successive terms.
