It Couldn't Happen Here Or Could it? Guest Columnist

It was sixty-one years ago, John Brandenhoff Fairmont's mayor was and Dwight D. Eisenhower was president of the United States. Dateline, 20/20, Investigation ID, and On the Case with Paula Zahn are all television programs providing crime documentaries that did not exist at that time. However, there were true crime magazines such as Inside Detective, Master Detective, and True Detective that documented crimes at that time. Could there have been a crime in Martin County so horrendous that it might have been featured in one of these magazines?

It was an early June day in 1960. School was out, parents and grandparents were relaxing at the beaches at Fairmont's lakes with children enjoying the sun and swimming. There didn't seem to be a care in the world. However, those lazy, hazy days of summer were soon to be accompanied by something heinous, something unheard of in Fairmont or Martin County.

Cash-Way was a lumber yard, including a gas station, located off Highway 16, now County Road 26, on the west end of Fairmont. In the early morning hours of Sunday, June 5th, an individual delivering the Sunday Minneapolis Tribune stopped at the Cash-Way gas station to drop off newspapers. There was a car parked by the gas pumps. The driver said he honked several times, but no one came to fill his tank. He speculated that the attendant may have gone over to Laur-Els for a sandwich or cup of coffee. When the person delivering the newspapers entered the station, he noticed the washroom door was open with an individual appearing to be sitting and leaning up against the wall. As he got closer, he was shocked to see that the man's hands were bound and that he was covered in blood. A closer look revealed that he had been shot in the head.

The Fairmont police were called and soon arrived in the scene along with Martin County Sheriff Musegades and his deputies. They questioned the motorist and cleared him. The coroner arrived and estimated the attendant had been dead for about twenty minutes. In a search of the crime scene, the police found two spent .22 caliber cartridge casings and determined that about \$170.00 had been taken from the till. Later that day the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension arrived to aid in the investigation.

From that point on, speculation abounded as to who might have committed such an unspeakable crime. The first of several theories involved two runaway boys, ages 16 and 18, from the Albert Lea area. The trail of these two boys led Sheriff Musegades, Chief Cavers, and state Special Agent Reiter to Arkansas armed with first degree murder warrants. Upon questioning the boys, they hit a dead end as they were ruled out as suspects. It was verified that they were eating at a restaurant in Jefferson City, Missouri, at the time of the crime in Fairmont.

Another account involved a waitress at a café just west of the scene of the crime. She told the authorities that a thirty-year old "laborer" was in the café brandishing a .22 caliber pistol. When questioned by the police, the "laborer" admitted showing the pistol but stated he just wanted to sell it. Ballistics later proved his gun was not the murder

weapon. It was another dead end.

A local citizen told the police that he recalled seeing an old red coupe, described as a "kid's car," a "hot rod," parked by the gas pumps. The owner, a boy recently released from the "reformatory" had also been picked up for speeding. He was questioned but he too was also eventually cleared.

Following a review of car rentals, the records showed a young man from Emmetsburg, Iowa, had rented a car on Saturday and returned it at noon on Sunday. Could this be the lead the authorities needed to find the killer?

But what about the murder weapon, a .22 caliber pistol? It was nowhere to be found, yet.

Then, on June 14th, two young girls were wading in the water at Ward's Park when one of them stepped on something. Wrapped in a plastic bag was a .22 caliber pistol that the girls thought at first to be a toy gun. However, one of their grandparents inspected it, saw that it was loaded, and promptly took it to the police.

Records showed that the gun was part of a consignment that went to a distributor in Blue Earth. From there, it went to a sporting goods store in Emmetsburg. The gun then became part of a large group of guns recently stolen from that sporting goods store in Emmetsburg. The burglar had not been apprehended, however, most of the stolen guns were recovered in Minneapolis.

The next lead that proved significant came from the owner of a car rental agency in Fairmont. After the authorities had checked the rental records, he

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had subsequently discovered a roll of tape next to the car that was returned by the young man from Emmetsburg. The tape matched the tape used to bound the service station attendant's hands. This narrowed their search to the young man from Emmetsburg.

A tip led Sheriff Musegades and Special Agent Reiter to a hotel in Hasting where it was reported the suspect was staying. Upon searching his room, they found ammunition so they suspected that he was armed. While they were staking out the hotel lobby a teenage girl entered, looked at them nervously, and abruptly left. Musegades and Reiter immediately followed her to a restaurant across the street speculating that she may have been a lookout for the suspect. They sat down beside her at the counter, but just then, the suspect himself walked into the restaurant. When approached by the officers, he put up no resistance and was quickly "frisked" and arested. Ironically, the young girl vanished and was not seen again.


The suspect was taken into custody and gave an account of his whereabouts. He stated that he was on his way to Minneapolis to dispose of the stolen guns and had stopped in Fairmont on "impulse." He said that he had gone to the Fairmont Youth Center for a while earlier in the evening. He later left and parked near the Fairmont Police Station falling asleep in the rental car. When he awakened, he realized he had a car rental bill of \$30.00 and only had \$40.00. He said he first planned to rob the Highland Court Motel, but the night manager would not open the door since it was late at night and told him to register his name and car and go to the room himself. He decided against staying there.

Next, he went to the Cash-Way station, walked in, and asked for change for the cigarette machine, even though he didn't smoke. When he got the change, he pulled out the gun and ordered the station attendant to tape his own hands and to tell him how to open the cash register. The suspect then said he glanced at car lights flashing by and at that moment the attendant came towards him. The suspect swung at him and fired his pistol killing the attendant. After he left Cash-Way, he got something to eat, and then threw the gun into the lake. He said he turned the car in at the bus station, took a bus to Minneapolis and got a hotel room. He later went to Hastings.

The suspect was a recent high school graduate and a good student. His take in the robbery was less than \$170.00. As a result, two families were crushed with sorrow and pain. Why did this happen? There are probably no real answers to that question.

Although violent crime is thought to be more likely to take place in metropolitan areas, rural areas are not immune. This story was in the headlines of the local newspapers and even included in the September of 1960 issue of Inside Detective magazine. The article was entitled "Murder On Tape." Yes, it happened in Martin County.



Martin County Pheasants Forever Habitat Group has successful inaugural season



formed A group within the local Pheasants Forever chapter has recently completed their inaugural season performing prescribed burns on wildlife properties across the county. In the past 6 weeks they have completed 11 burns totaling 235 acres for their clients holding conservation lands. Pheasants Forever's mission is to conserve pheasants, quail, and other wildlife through habitat improvements, public access, education and conservation advocacy. These prescribed burns are a major means of accomplishing that habitat improvement.

Lands that are not

burned on a regular basis tend to turn into a monoculture of brome and similar grasses. These burns promote biodiversity onto the landscape by allowing other native grasses and forbs to again gain a stand on these lands. The burning also helps remove layers of decaying plants on the surface and opens up the soil to sunlight and rain. It benefits the pheasant chicks and many other small songbirds by allowing them to move freely through the grasses in search of insects and other ing season officially highprotein foods. Prescribed burns can be used as a means of setting back overmature shrubs and trees

to allow sun the reach sun-dependent the grasses and flowers. Blackened soil also absorbs the sunlight and warms the earth to encourage seed germination. All the charred remains are converted into fertilizer to help support the new growth as well.

In pasture and meadows, the new growth can promote higher quality cattle forage, as well as providing nesting and hiding areas for many birds and wildlife.

As the primary nestbegins on May 15th most years, our burning has ceased for the season. We have a waiting list for inter-

ested conservationists and land managers for the spring of 2022. As the weather and time dictate the extent of where and when we can safely perform these burns, we would welcome any contacts from farmers and landowners alike.

For those that have land enrolled in CRP, CREP, and similar state and federal programs we can provide an excellent option for your midcontract requirements. MODIFIED RACE CAR IS CAR SHOW FEATURE

The car, powered by a 327 Chevy V8 was built by Roger Hendrickson, who did the body and chassis work, Ron Barton of Barton's Automotive, who built the engine, and Jim Edgington who also drove the car. number 14 car at area race tracks and at the Minnesota State Fair in 1969 and 1970 where he won the 25-lap earlymodel modified stock car races two years in a row.

After its racing days were over, the car,

was restored by and owned by Hendrickson's son Eric.

#14 Modified returns home

In 1969 Ron Barton, Jim Edgington, and Roger Hendrickson built the number 14 modified in a single car garage at 1321 N. Elm Street. The three men had been racing modifieds since 1965. It was built with steel tubing that was bent in Loren Woodke's shop in Lakefield, MN. This was the 4th complete modified the three had built so it was christened "Odds and Ends IV". In April of 1969 it was a rolling chassis with no body. In June it had a body. It was ready to race so off they went to the track. They raced mostly at Fairmont and Jackson, MN. They did however go to Algona and Mason City Iowa from time to time. About a month after they had started racing the car was badly damaged at the Jackson race track. They completely disassembled and rebuilt the car. The car took on a different look for the rest of 1969 season. It raced at MN State Fair and won the 1969 modified championship.

In 1970 a rule change allowed them to shorten the wheelbase and move the engine back. This made the car handle much better thus being faster.

Jim Edgington driving the much improved car won the points championship at Fairmont and repeated the state fair modified championship again.

Many years later Roger discovered the remains of the number 14 modified in an iron pile north of Alpha, MN. He talked to the property owner and showed him the old photos of the car. The last driver of the car was also there. He was the one who had the last accident with the chassis. After some discussion and Roger turning to walk away, the last driver told the owner just give it to him. At that point in time Roger said "'thanks' I think"

Roger's son Eric has had the car in his possession for 2 or 3 years. Eric had helped on the car as a young boy of 5 holding things for dad to tack weld. Now he was going to restore a boyhood memory not only for himself but his dad and the racing public. Eric did most of the work at his shop in Courtland, MN. Dad helped some searching for parts.

Rick DeBoer sign maker in Fairmont got wind of this. He had spent time as a young boy watching the building of this car. He asked Roger if he could letter the car when it was ready. The interesting part of this is Rick and his wife Deb had bought the house at 1321 N. Elm Street in 1980 from Jim and Linda Edgington where the car was born. Now in the summer of 2021 it is back home to get its lettering done by Rick at the same address.

Good Luck Finding Good Luck By Al Batt


I was talking to a Billiken on a shelf.


