





Initiative Grants are awarded based on their likelihood to create measurable change within the Foundation's three core focus areas. This round of grantees includes:

•\$34,546 to Fairmont Opera House for Enhancing the Sound Experience for Fairmont Opera House.

•\$20,000 to the Sherburn Park Committee for Handicapped Accessible Park Equipment.

•\$15,150 to Southern Minnesota Initiative Foundation as fiscal agent for "Home Delivery of Meals and Healthcare to Elderly Residents of Martin County" in care of Manna Health, Dr. Tim Bachenberg, Medical Director, and Pastor Russell Reimers, Board Chairman.

The grandson surprised me when he drove the restored 1914 Model T Ford car up our farm lane yesterday. I was mowing the lawn next to the lane, my lawn mower was noisy, and I did not hear the sound of another motor. What surprised me when I looked over within the shade of the line of evergreens something dark black was moving. I looked over to see something of family, long awaited restoration, and finished project. He was driving a family keepsake and HIS PRIDE WAS SHOWING.

I drove the mower up into

the yard and walked over to where he was parked. He sat waiting, with the Model T's motor speaking a greeting. His smile was something wonderful. It said so much! His father had told me of

the car, its history, and how he had ordered the needed parts for the restoration. However, he had left the restoration up to his son. I thought of the father as the car sat as tough it was being spotlighted by the morning sun. One of the first things that I noticed was the brass radiator. It highlighted the restoration like a "point of interest" of a painting. Lamp headlights told the story of how they served a need before the coming of modern electric lights. He spoke of how he had to learn to drive the Model T. Making it go required pushing in on the clutch pedal rather than letting it up. The condition of the upholstery, flooring, steering wheel, dashboard mounted coil box, all spoke of how its age had been restored.

His coming to the farm was something that had to be shared with Bev for she has known is family longer than I. I asked him if Bev and I could have a ride in his treasure. His smile reappeared as he agreed. The unique sound of its motor seemed to welcome a chance to satisfy such long-time friends. We moved down the lane with such ease. Its narrow tires seemed to barely touch the ground in quietness. He drove us out to "the narrows", a place by the lake near his hoe, and then returned us home.

It was an event that was very meaningful. It brought an understanding of how the restoration took place. How the grandson was encouraged by his wife, how the restoration was such a success, and how something of family history had been preserved.

Naturally By Al Batt Harry Ot-ter and the chiggers

R irdsong diminishes **B**in July. House wren songs abate toward the end of July, but indigo buntings, song sparrows and red-eyed vireos continue to sing. Why does the uncaged bird sing? Most songs are linked to a bird's love life. Birdsong has touched the hearts of poets, composers and birders.

A friend, Kim Eckert of Duluth, wrote sagely that the swallows in Minnesota could be divided into three sets of two. The blue ones (purple martins and tree swallows) nest in birdhouses. The brown ones (bank and northern roughed-winged) nest in the ground (sand piles or riverbanks). The ones with dark red throats (barn and cliff swallows) construct mud nests. I find the swallows with masonry skills fascinating. Barn swallows create mugs and cliff swallows jugs.

I'm continually awestruck. A Navajo prayer is, "With dew about my feet, may I walk. With beauty before me may I walk. With beauty behind me may I walk. With beauty below me may I walk. With beauty above me may I walk. With beauty all around me may I walk." While walking, I saw a river otter. I think his name was Harry Otter.

I watched three tree swallows at a nest. As a boy, I was told the third bird was an attendant or helper, but the extra swallow doesn't feed nestlings. It attempts to pirate food from nestlings and parents.

Black-eyed Susans, yarrows (milfoil or thousand-leaf), blue flag iris, yellow sweet clover (usually blooms a bit earlier than white sweet clover), vetch, bergamot, false sunflower, evening milkweeds, primrose and field bindweed bloom. Bindweed has arrow-shaped leaf blades and white-topinkish flowers. Common morning-glory has rounded, heart-shaped leaves and blue to purple flowers. Daisy or prairie fleabane has flowerheads about ½-inch across with a daisy-like appearance and 40-100 white (sometimes pinkor purple-tinted) ray florets that surround a yellow disk. Pineapple weed is a low-growing plant with finely divided, feathery leaves that gives off a pineapple smell when crushed.

Curly dock (yellow dock, sour dock, curled dock) flower stalks bloom at the top of the plant and when mature, turn brown and are covered with papery capsules that are triangular or heart-shaped. Each plant produces as many as 40,000 seeds, which remain viable in soil for decades.

Stay on the trails

There are chiggers in Minnesota. They crawl to the highest point on grass and other plants and use them as diving boards to hop onto a passing meal. They fall onto a person, usually landing on the shoes or lower pantlegs, and crawl up the body looking for a place to bite. They're a type of mite related to ticks. Sometimes tiny red mites are seen. These adult chiggers don't bite people. The chigger larvae that bite us are much smaller than the adults and can scarcely be seen without a magnifying glass. They don't burrow into the skin. They pierce a skin cell with their mouths and their saliva contains an enzyme that causes the skin cell wall to liquefy. After the chigger has had its fluid meal, it drops off. The bite develops a welt in 10-16 hours. Coating bites with Vaseline or nail polish to suffocate the chigger doesn't work. You can't suffocate something that's not there. They're confused sometimes with swimmer's itch

caused by microscopic larvae spread by waterfowl. Entomologist H.B. Hungerford wrote: "The thing called a chigger, is really no bigger, than the smaller end of a pin, but the bump that it raises, just itches like blazes, and that's where the rub sets in."


