Mito Syndrome makes International News

Some of you may be aware of the story of Charlie Gard. He is a little boy in the UK who has a diagnosis of Encephalomyopathic Mitochondrial DNA depletion syndrome. Without getting caught up in the semantics, suffice to say he has Mito and he is very severely affected. Due to his disease, he has brain damage, is unable to move his arms and legs and can't breathe on his own. His parents have been trying to take him to the United States for an experimental treatment which had the potential to allow him to gain more function. The doctors at the hospital where he has been living (yes, he's been living in the hospital) did not think there was anything more to be done for Charlie and wanted his life support to be removed. A legal battle began between the hospital staff and Charlie's parents.

Unfortunately, this story does not have a happy ending. The specialist that was trying to help Charlie's parents made it to the UK last week and after examining him and going over scans, it was determined that Charlie was past the point of no return and that the experimental treatment would no longer have any potential to help him. Days later, Charlie's parents gave up the legal battle and decided to let their son go. It is not likely that Charlie will not live to see his first birthday, which is August 4th

This is one of the first times Mitochondrial disease has been featured on International News and unfortunately it was not portrayed accurately. I'd like to say this is the first

time this has happened but I would be lying. At any rate, many people in the media were making it sound like Charlie was brain dead which is not true. It also implied that Mitochondrial disease is always terminal, which is also untrue. Some Mitochondrial disorders are more severe than others, and two people with the exact same mutation can present vastly differently.

Another point I think is important to emphasize is that with Mito, often early intervention is key. Early intervention can prevent further damage. Had Charlie been allowed to receive the experimental treatment earlier in his disease course, perhaps his story would have ended a little differently. Unfortunately, it's too late for Charlie. My heart is broken for his family. No parent should ever have to go through the loss of a child. Speaking from personal experience, it is the most heartbreaking thing a person can go through. It is time that Mitochon-

drial disease doesn't get a baffled look from doctors. We need more awareness and a cure! Through efforts like the Energy for Life Walkathon, we are working tirelessly to ensure that someday parents won't have to watch their child die from Mito, and patients will know life without Mito.

Recently he celebrated a birthday and his two children took him on a salmon fishing trip to Michigan. He knows I like salmon, so yesterday when he and Pa Lloyd met for breakfast he had a cooler with salmon steaks to share with me. So I got to looking at salmon recipes. I fixed it for lunch and it was simple and so good, so that is your recipe today, all because of my special brother-in-law Bill!

Tarragon Salmon steaks

2 salmon steaks

2 Tablespoons melted butter


2 tsp. lemon juice

1 Tablespoon minced fresh tarragon (if you don't have fresh, use dried but less, as the flavor is more intense when its dry)

1 Tablespoon fresh chopped parsley salt and pepper to taste

Place salmon in ungreased glass baking dish, skin side down. Drizzle with a mixture of the melted butter and lemon juice. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, then sprinkle with parsley and tarragon. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until fish flakes. I baked for 25 minutes. Serves 2.

Proposed crop insurance cuts

A few weeks ago, the Administration revisions limit. Producers with very Trump Administration released their 10-year proposed federal budget proposal, which is targeted to reduce federal expenditures on crop insurance by \$58.7 billion over the next ten years, or approximately a reduction of approximately \$6 billion per year for the next decade. Many similar cuts have also been proposed as measures to reduce the federal budget deficit by some members of Congress in recent years. In the past, there has been enough bipartisan support from members of Congress representing areas with significant agriculture production to prevent the passage of legislation with drastic cutbacks to the Federal Crop Insurance Program.

The current Administration budget would achieve the crop insurance reductions by limiting the maximum federal premium subsidy to \$40,000 per farm operation. Currently, there is no limit on the maximum subsidy. The premium Administration proposal would also eliminate the popular Harvest Price Option (HPO) for crop insurance that is utilized as a risk management tool by most Midwest corn and soybean producers. In addition, the

would eliminate federal high value crops could hit crop insurance coverage to any farm operation that exceeds \$500,000 in adjusted gross income (AGI). If all of these changes were implemented, it could drastically change the federal crop insurance program for many crop producers, as we know it today.

The average federal subsidy for most common levels of crop insurance coverage for corn, soybeans and wheat is about 60 percent. In other words, if the gross cost of the crop insurance premium is \$40 per acre, the farmer would pay \$16 per acre (40%) and the federal subsidy would \$24 per acre (60%). Under the Administration proposal, once a farm operator hits the \$40,000 limit, the farmer would be required to pay 100 percent of the crop insurance premium, which would be a significant increase in the cost of insurance coverage.

The Crop Insurance Title of the Farm Bill provides crop insurance availability for over 100 different crops, including many high value fruit and vegetable crops. There is a wide variation in the level of crop acres required to hit the proposed \$40,000 premium subsidy

the subsidy limit with just a few hundred acres, while producers in some other areas may require 6,000 or more acres to reach the limit.

Corn and soybean producers in many Upper Midwestern States that typically utilize 80% revenue protection (RP) crop insurance coverage with HPO would likely hit the \$40,000 limit at approximately 1,500 to 2,000 acres, which is not a large farm operation by today's standards. Farm operators that raise some acres of canning crops or specialty crops with higher crop insurance premiums may hit the insurance subsidy limit with even fewer acres. Producers that utilize higher coverage levels of crop insurance coverage (such as 85% RP) or other special crop insurance options that may be subsidized could also reach the subsidy limit with fewer acres.

In the late 1990's and early 2000's, the Federal government offered increased premium subsidies and developed new products in order to encourage greater participation in the Federal Crop Insurance program. The Federal government wanted to elimi-

disaster programs that were enacted on annual basis several times prior to that time period, as a result of natural disasters in varying crop producing areas of the U.S. There have been very limited ad-hoc Federal disaster programs related to crop production in recent

years, even though we have experienced some major natural disasters, such as the 2012 drought, in widespread crop producing areas of the U.S. Most corn and soybean

producers in Minnesota and other Midwestern States purchase Revenue Protection (RP) crop insurance policies, which protect against the combination of vield losses and price reductions during the growing season. A base revenue level is established on a farm unit using the historic average crop yield times the national average crop price on March 1st, at the beginning of the insurance coverage period. With RP policies, the insurance coverage level purchased by farm operators is a percentage of that base revenue, ranging from 50 % up to 85 %. Insurance coverage levels of 75% to 85% are the most common for Midwest corn and soybean producers in recent years. The final crop revenue on the insured farm unit is the actual crop yield times the crop price at harvest time. If the actual crop revenue is lower than the guaranteed insurance coverage, a crop insurance indemnity payment is

> Most producers also utilize the Harvest-Price Option (HPO) that is available an 80% RP policy in place, with RP insurance policies. The HPO permits producers that incur yield reductions greater than their coverage level (ex. - 80 % of average yield) to have added crop insurance protection if crop prices are higher at harvest time than the base price on March 1st. This option allows farm operators to forward price a higher percentage of their crop production at profitable prices, while still having insurance protection the surrounding States. 
