A Colorful Character in Martin County's Past **Guest Columnist**

Lenny Tvedten, Director, Martin County Historical Society

One of the most colorful and interesting characters in Martin County's history is undoubtedly Lionel Vivian Archer-Burton, better New York and took it to known as "Lenny." The following reflects some of the interesting encounters and entanglements Lenny became involved in during his lifetime.


Lenny once saw an advertisement in the Minneapolis Tribune offering any kind of dog "under the sun" available for sale. Consequently, he inquired and mailed payment of \$25.00 for a pup. His payment was the only letter that went through as The bull snake appeared notified that a big bear all of his follow-up mailings wondering when his pup would be delivered came back indicating the business. Lenny was out upon arrival. Later on he finally took a cab to where \$25.00.

In 1926 Lenny was referred to as Fairmont's zoo man and being a Pied Piper of sorts. It seems that he had read about Chicago having too many cats. Consequently, he wrote to a newspaper in Chicago stating that Fairmont was "absolutely catless" and requested a few dozen of Chicago's cats to help control the local rat problem. There was apparently no response from the "Windy City" as Fairmont

With the help of the cabbie and hay forks they persuaded the bear back into his cage. The bear's escape was seemingly a result of a box of meat scraps being left near the cage and the bear being quite hungry



since it hadn't been fed on time.

As a segue into the preceding story, the city council in 1927 was upset by the fact that Lenny's "so called" zoo seemed to be more of a nuisance than the city dump due to the volume of rodents feeding on meat scraps supposedly intended for his zoo animals. Complaints included disturbances by dogs and other animals as well as the occasional escape of the bear alluded to in the previous paragraph. Burton failed to appear at the council meeting. Although he had indicated he would be present, his failure to appear clearly annoyed the council.

seals had escaped, one being a 500-pound bull seal. They were seen on the lakes and docks throughout the summer, however, Lenny was concerned that they would not survive the winter. He was unable to capture them before winter set in, nevertheless, the following spring the bull seal was once again seen. However, there is no record as to what finally happened to the bull seal, but the fate of the others was apparently "sealed" by their inability to survive the previous winter.

Golden Chicken Squares:

8 slices white bread 2 cups diced cooked chicken 2 Tblsp. parsley 1/2 cup diced onion 4 oz. can mushrooms, drained 1/2 cup mayonnaise 1/2 tsp. salt, pepper and accent

3 eggs 2 cups milk

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 cup shredded cheese

Cut bread into 1/2 inch cubes, place 1/2 of them in a 9x13 inch baking dish. Combine chicken, onion, parsley, mushrooms, mayonnaise and seasonings, spoon over bread cubes, then rest of bread cubes. Beat eggs slightly whisk in milk, pour over bread, cover and refrigerate over night. Just before baking top with undiluted soup, bake for one hour at 350 degrees. Sprinkle cheese over top, return to oven until cheese is melted. Let set for 10 minutes before cutting and serving.

Take a break from your Christmas preparations, stretch out on the couch with the Christmas lights on and listen to Christmas music for a half hour every day!



Notice to the Public

PRIVATE PROPERTY OWNERS SNOW DEPOSITED ON ROADWAYS LIABILITY

Snow dumped, plowed, blown, or shoveled onto a public road can create a hazard for motorists and snow plows. This includes snow removed from a private drive that ends up on the roadway. Compacted snow can become very difficult to remove, causing slippery spots. Snow plows can also be forced into the opposite driving lane when hitting compacted frozen snow deposited on roadways. Depositing snow onto a public road can be punishable as a misdemeanor (Minn. Stat. 169.42 and 160.2715). Furthermore, the person responsible for depositing snow onto the roadway may also be liable in a civil action lawsuit if damages or injuries occur as a result of that action.

Your understanding of and cooperation with the County snow plow operators is appreciated, as is your concern for your own, and your neighbors' safety.



A person whose regular place of employment is within the state or who is a student at an educational institution located within the state shall not operate a vehicle, regardless of its place of registration, upon any highway within the state if such vehicle is equipped with tires which would be unauthorized were the vehicle registered in this state.

Many farm operators custom rates for typical for custom work services, has resulted in average 2018 custom rates for farm work remaining close to steady compared to 2017 rates. Most custom rates for tillage, planting, and harvest operations in 2018 are listed at no increase or down slightly, compared to the rates for similar operations in 2017. The 2018 harvesting, Fall tillage, and corn and soybean production declined slightly from a year earlier. In addition to the higher fuel costs, labor expenses also increased slightly compared to 2017 levels. The cost for new and used machinery has also remained fairly stable in 2018, thus helping keep most custom dated in May, 2018. This rates at a fairly even pace.

The 2018 Iowa Custom Rate Survey lists a range of custom rates being charged, in addition to the costs. The use-related ex-"average" custom rates for most farming practices. Some of the "average"

CHECK GRAIN BINS

Most corn and sovbean custom farming rates for custom farming should producers across the Midwest have completed the 2018 harvest season, and now need to pay close attention to grain that is stored in on-farm grain bins for potential storage problems. Due to low local corn and soybean prices, a much higher level of corn and soybeans in the Upper Midwest are likely being stored following would only add to the fiharvest in 2018. It is likely nancial difficulties that that most of the crop was placed into grain bins at a variety of outside temperatures, some grain at fairly warm temperatures, and labor, and depreciation. other grain at quite cool

Overhead costs include temperatures. This grain temperature difference, along with fluctuations in recent outside temperatures, can result in wide temperature variations in the final grain temperature in grain bins. This can lead to moisture migration in the bin, which could potentially result in significant grain spoilage, if not properly addressed. There have already been reports of grain going out of condition in some areas.


> Farm operators should cally to equalize the grain bin temperatures, which will help prevent this situation from occurring. It is also very important to check grain bins on a regular basis for any potential storage issues, and to address those issues promptly. Otherwise, there can be considerable damage to grain that is in storage, resulting in a significant financial loss to the farm operator. This type of loss many farm operations are facing as we head into 2019.


