

# Mayo changes design of ambulance interiors

look of the outside of its ambulances earlier this year, adding a distinctive black and white reflective wrap material and other high visibility features. Now Mayo Clinic ambulance interiors are being redesigned to enhance the safety and comfort of patients and patient care providers.

Mayo Clinic's ambulance team convened a group of emergency medical technicians, paramedics and representatives from other work disciplines in September 2018 to consider ways to increase safety. The group brainstormed ideas that included putting equipment and supplies within arm's reach in the back of the ambulance to minimize times when crew

Mayo Clinic changed the were not restrained with seat belts. They also looked for ways to enhance ergonomics and reduce injury due to lifting and exertion.

> "We made a determination that our current configuration needed to be updated to better protect and better restrain our patient care providers when they are in the back of a moving ambulance taking care of patients," says Matthew Will, director of clinical services for Mayo Clinic Ambulance. "We took one of our existing ambulances that had been removed from service, and with the help of our fleet services vendor, we took all of the existing cabinets and compartments out of the back and began with a clean slate," Will says.

The team set out to design what a patient care area of an ambulance could look like. a support services specialist with Mayo Clinic Ambulance. 



Bottom layer: 1/2 cup butter 3 oz. cream cheese 1 cup flour with 1/4 tsp. salt Raspberry filling: 1/4 cup red raspberry jam Almond Paste topping: 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup almond paste, chopped almonds

for top

Beat together the butter and cream cheese, stir in flour and salt, chill one hour. Shape into 1 inch balls and press into mini muffin cups, forming crust. spoon 1/2 tsp. raspberry jam into each tart.

Beat egg, sugar and almond paste until smooth, spoon 1 tsp. of this mixture over jam, next sprinkle with chopped almonds. Bake at 325 degrees for 25-30 minutes, cool in pans and remove. Makes about 2 dozen.

I watched juncos, often called snowbirds, feed on the ground. Some people consider this bird a harbinger of winter. That's a miserable responsibility for a lovely, little bird.

Snow had given my world a natural texture. December and January are typically our snowiest months. Red squirrels tunnel under and through the snow. They are much more likely to do so than are gray or fox squirrels. Weasels (ermine) tunnel through snow in search of voles, mice, and shrews.

I feel terrible when a bird hits a window of our house. "That's it!" I say to my long-suffering wife, 'We're moving to a cave."

The temperature had fallen below zero as my wife and I rang bells for the the demoralizing thud of a bird crashing into a store window. My wife spotted a female house sparrow that had fallen to the concrete. I held the bird in my closed hands. The warmth helped. I opened my hands and the bird flew off. I felt good about having a tender soul. Later, I heard house sparrows chirping. I hoped that bird was one of them.

"Where do juncos nest?" Dark-eyed juncos breed in forests across much of North America, including northeastern Minnesota. The female chooses the nest site, typically on or near the ground in roots, moss, or grasses — occasionally nesting off the ground.

"Do bears need to eliminate waste during hibernation?" Scientists don't agree whether or not bears are true hibernators. Some people of science maintain bears enter a sleep-state called torpor. Torpor, like hibernation, is a survival tactic used to survive the winter months, and is triggered by colder temperatures decreased food availability. Torpor involves decreased breathing and heart rates, and lower metabolic rate, but not the dramatic decrease in body temperature often associated with true hibernation. No matter what it's called, do sleeping bears need to use the little bear's room or do what bears do in the woods? Bears are able to sleep 100 days without passing waste. Bears avoid eliminating metabolic wastes by recycling them. Bears lose fat and may gain lean muscle mass while sleeping. They need to do an infomercial.

'What towers kill the most birds?" It would be the tall structures like the radio

and TV towers that have guy wires. The guy wires can be treacherous for flying birds. The lights on those towers can confuse birds in foggy weather, causing them to fly into the guy wires. Self-supporting, shorter towers are less of a problem because they lack guy wires. Studies have found wind turbines are murder on bats.

### Details of the New USMCA Trade Agreement for the Agriculture **Industry:**

 As part of this new agreement, all food and agricultural products traded between the U.S., Canada and Mexico that had a zero tariff under NAFTA would continue to have a zero tariff under USMCA. Similar to NAFTA, the USMCA agreement will not eliminate tariffs on all ag products. One important aspect of USMCA is that it will provide more access to the Canadian market for U.S. dairy products, poultry and eggs.

the USMCA negotiations related to agriculture was on dairy provisions between the U.S. and Canada. USMCA will increase the access to ship U.S. dairy products into Canada to 3.59 percent of the annual Canadian production. This is higher than the 3.25 percent level proposed under the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) trade agreement that the U.S. chose to withdraw from in 2017. USMCA provides for specific increases in tariff-free quotas of U.S. dairy products into Canada for fluid milk, cheese, butter, ice cream, and other products. The USMCA pact also would eliminate Canada's class 6 and 7 milk pricing programs, which were limiting U.S. dairy exports to Canadian markets. It is estimated the agreement will allow U.S. dairy exports to Canada to increase by nearly \$300 million.

• Much of the focus in

USMCA increases the tariff-free quotas for eggs and egg products, as well as chicken and turkey products, that can be

shipped from the U.S. into Canada. The initial quotas will be allowed to increase by one percent per year for an additional ten

- As part of the USMCA deal. Canada agreed to grade U.S. wheat imports in a manner similar to Canadian wheat, and not to require a country of origin statement on the inspection certificate, both of which have been issues in the past. The two countries also agreed to collaborate on items related to seed quality and grading systems, as well as other seed regulatory issues.
- The biggest win for pork producers under the USMCA agreement is the

continuation of tariff-free trading of pork products with Mexico and Canada, both of which are major export markets for U.S. pork. In 2018, U.S. pork exports to Mexico totaled \$1.3 billion and to Canada totaled \$765 million, accounting for over 40 percent of total U.S. pork ex-


• The pork industry will also benefit from the strong sanitary-phytosanitary (SPS) provisions that are contained in the USMCA pact, which go beyond those contained in the current NAFTA agreement or in World Trade Organization (WTO) agreements. The SPS provisions will allow for more

transparency and sharing of scientific data, compliance measures, and other information among the three countries. This part of the agreement could be very important if African Swine Fever (AFS) disease were ever to be confirmed in the Western Hemisphere.

• Even though there is not an immediate trade benefit for corn and sovbeans, USMCA does free up easier access to Canada and Mexico for the export of those products. Enhancing the livestock export markets also helps maintain domestic corn and soybean demand in the U.S. Mexico is actually the number two export market for U.S. soybeans, trailing only China. During the years of the NAFTA agreement, U.S. soybean exports to Mexico were four times greater than before NAFTA, and U.S. soybean sales to Canada doubled during that time-

U.S. agriculture exports to Canada and Mexico grew under the first 23 years of the NAFTA agreement from below \$9 billion per vear before NAF-TA to over \$38 billion per year by 2016. Trade with Canada and Mexico accounts for about 28 percent of the total annual U.S. ag exports. In 2016. U.S. ag exports to Canada were valued at just over \$20 billion, with leading export products being grains and feed, animal products, fruits and vegetables, oilseeds, and horticulture products. U.S. ag exports to Mexico in 2016 totaled nearly \$18 billion, with the top export products being animal products, grain and feed, and products. horticulture Mexico is either the largest or second largest export destination for U.S. beef, pork, poultry, wheat, corn, soybeans, and dairy products.

As usual, not everyone is in total agreement with the new USMCA agreement. However, many experts feel that USMCA is a step in the right direction to address the trade issues that have been affecting sales and profitability in some industries, especially certain segments of the U.S. agriculture industry. Many of the labor and environmental issues that were holding up approval of USMCA in Congress were worked out in the final agreement. Most segments of the agriculture industry are pleased with the USMCA agreement; however, they also realize that trade agreements are very complex and many times take years to fully develop.
