The house sparrow's popularity does exceed that of the starling. Once a Year!

I like to cook and try new recipes all year long, but there are some recipes I only make at Christmas. If I made them routinely they would no longer be a special treat! Such is the case of Finnish cardamom braids. I made two loaves today for gifts, one got too dark on the bottom so I will keep that one for us. This recipe came from a Taste of Home magazine and is pretty much an all day project because I let it rise twice before I form it into braids. Today I had a little brain lapse and couldn't remember how to braid, I know another senior moment but I did figure it out! We think its worth the time to make.

Finnish Cardamom Braids:

2 packages (1/4 ounce each) active dry yeast 1/2 cup warm water 2 cups warm milk 3/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup butter, softened 11/2 tsp. salt 3/4 tsp. ground cardamom 2 eggs 7-8 cups all-purpose flour

In a large mixing bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add milk, sugar, butter, salt, cardamom, eggs and 3 cups flour; beat until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough. (I used 7 cups). Turn onto a floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning to grease top, cover and let raise in a warm place until doubled, 1-2 hours, punch dough down and let rise again. Turn onto a lightly floured surface, divide dough in half and then each half into thirds. Shape each piece into a 13 -inch rope. Place three ropes on a parchment lined cookie sheet. Braid ropes; pinch ends to seal and tuck under. Repeat with remaining dough, cover and let rise until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans to wire racks to cool. Yield two loaves. When cool I frost with powdered sugar frosting and decorate with almonds and maraschino cherries. This dough can be used for cinnamon rolls too.

headline of the article and spent \$125,000 for a business plan. No mention of this in a subsequent article on November 14th, 2017 when it is stated that the "City Ok's update for trail plans."

It seems to me that this has been a behindthe-scenes effort to build regardless of citizen concerns. I would like to see this brought up for a vote before proceeding any further. I fail to see the legality of burdening the taxpayers with this debt. It's like spending a nickel because we have a dollar showing up in 15 years -- a lack of fiscal responsibility. Voters beware: some council members deserve to be replaced if this is the way they govern.

The Census Bureau statistics show we are losing population. Young people do not stay in Fairmont mainly because there is no new industry here to give them jobs. Time and again we are considered by companies but get out-maneuvered by other, more

progressive, communities, iust 30 miles away, in Jackson and Blue Earth. City council: You need to step back and examine what we are doing wrong. Going way back look at the loss of the Jr. College, the loss of John Deere facilities, the loss of Winnebago Industries expansion, the loss of Stokleys, Wick Homes, Teledyne Aerospace, -- the list goes on and on.

We have a lot more pressing matters to attend to rather than a fitness center as proposed. Our roads are a disgrace coming into town from the west, an enterprising company would question their decision to locate here. Finally, our building codes are such that building here is a big financial burden. Again, the city has chosen to make expansion and new business development as tough as possible - I do not see the council as a pro-business and growth driven entity.

Notice to the Public

Snow dumped, plowed, blown, or shoveled onto a public road can

create a hazard for motorists and snow plows. This includes snow removed from a private drive that ends up on the roadway. Compacted snow can become very difficult to remove, causing slippery spots. Snow plows can also be forced into the opposite driving lane when hitting compacted frozen snow deposited on roadways. Depositing snow onto a public road can be punishable as a misdemeanor (Minn. Stat. 169.42 and 160.2715). Furthermore, the person responsible for depositing snow onto the roadway may also be liable in a civil action lawsuit if damages or injuries occur as a result of that action.


