Both memberships were overwhelmingly in favor of the unification and exceeded the state required two-thirds majority (67%) vote with 76 percent of the WFS membership ballots cast in favor and 75 percent of the Central Valley Cooperative (CVC) ballots cast in favor of the unifica-

The merger will go into effect on March 1st, 2016 and the newly unified company will be named Central Farm Service. WFS Chief Executive Officer, Todd Ludwig will take the reins as CEO of the new company, while CVC CEO, Gary Mohr, will become the Chief Administrative Officer. As stated in the merger proposal documents, both administrative offices, Owatonna and Truman, will remain open in order to serve members' needs.



**<u>Land Values</u>** --- Land values in most areas of the Midwest have declined by 10-20 percent from the peak land values in 2013 and early 2014; however, there were still some very strong localized land sales during 2015. A recent, highly credible, land value survey from Iowa State University, released in early December, showed that average land values in Iowa decreased by 3.9 percent during 2015, which followed a decline of 8.9 percent in 2014. This was only the second and third time since 1999 that Iowa farm land values decreased from one year to the next. The 2014 decline was the largest annual decrease since 1986.

According to the survey, the average land values dropped by about 6-8 % North Central Iowa from November, 2014 to November, 2015, which followed a decline of 10-12 percent a year earlier. Land values have remained surprisingly strong in many portions of Northwestern Iowa. Land value adjustments in Southern Minnesota have likely been similar to the Northern Iowa land value survey results, with slightly stronger land values in Southwest Minnesota, compared to other portions of the region. The combination of lower projected market prices for corn and soybeans in 2016, together with nearly steady input costs for seed, fertilizer, and chemicals, will limit rental rates, as well as real **capital investments**

Decisions that are made on crop marketing and crop insurance, as well as potential payments from the government farm program, can also have a significant impact on potential profitability for 2016.

# What's Cooking

### **Comfort Food**

Now that the holidays are nearly over it feels good to return to the basic comfort food cooking, to me anyway! Cold winter weather seems to call for comfort food too. When my son John was home for the holidays he asked me if I had shared my rice hamburger casserole recipe with you. He said it is a favorite of his family. I made it a lot when my children were home as did my mother when I was growing up. Everyone seems to enjoy it and to me it's basic comfort food, I hope that your family will enjoy it too.

#### **American Chow Mein**

- 1 lb hamburger
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 stalks celery, sliced
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 4 Tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 soup can of water
- chow mein noodles to sprinkle on top

Brown hamburger, onion and celery, drain. Add rest of ingredients except chow mein noodles. Pour into a large greased casserole dish, sprinkle noodles on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. ### Ask A Trooper: The **Headers Goes Here**

by Sgt. Troy Christianson, Minnesota State Patrol

Question: I encountered a funeral procession along a two-lane highway (no roads entering this section of highbar on the dash flashing an alternating red and blue light. Everyone on the highway going oppulled over to the shoulder, thinking it was a police officer. Is this legal for the funeral home to do and what is the protocol for vehicles encountering this?

**Answer:** Funeral home vehicles may utilize flashing red lights for the purpose of escorting funeral this instance.

According to Minnesota State Statute (M.S.S.) are prohibited, except on an authorized emergency vehicle, school bus, bicycle as provided in section 169.222, subdivision 6, road maintenance equipment, tow truck or towing vehicle, service vehicle, farm tractor, self-propelled farm equipment, rural mail carrier vehicle, funeral home vehicle, or on any vehicle as a means of turn, or the presence of a vehicular traffic hazard requiring unusual care in approaching, overtaking, or passing. All flashing warning lights shall be of the type authorized by section 169.59, subdivision 4, unless otherwise

permitted or required in this chapter."

M.S.S. 169.04 allows red lights stating, "specifically the use of motorcycles or way) and the lead funeral vehicles that are owned by **home vehicle had a light** the funeral home and that utilize flashing red lights for the purpose of escorting funeral processions."

M.S.S. 169.20 covers fu**posite the procession** neral processions - "When any funeral procession identifies itself by using regular lights on all cars and by keeping all cars in close formation, the driver of every other vehicle, except an emergency vehicle, shall yield the rightof-way."

"Right-of-way" is the privilege to proceed with processions. Blue flashing precedence over others in lights are not permitted in a particular situation or place. To yield to the rightof-way, you must safely move to the right and stop. 169.64: "Flashing lights If you are in an intersection, proceed through before stopping. Remain stopped until all those with the right-of-way have passed. You are not required to stop if the approaching procession or emergency vehicle(s) are separated from your lane of traffic by a physical barrier such as a fence, wall, or median strip.

## The Chain / **Upon Their Backs**

We had purchased an insurance agency in the community. The owner had died and we bought the agency from his estate. His agency was somewhat unusual. Most of the business was written with people who had his same political affiliation. He had been a political leader of the area. His customers were widespread.

His agency sold a wide variety of insurance but much of the business was crop hail. I decided to contact each of his clients in person. I spent days going from farm to farm, introducing myself, and asking that they allow us to continue writing their insurance. Most were pleasant out of respect for their now-deceased leader of that political party. However, some would try to corner me on politics. Many would try to find out if I had the same political beliefs as the former agent. I have made it a policy to never discuss politics or religion with customers. I found this to be the best way to be able to work on a level playing field.

I drove up the lane of one of his clients. I had his crop hail insurance file with me. The farm was near a river and large and beautiful trees surrounded the building site. Could they provide a catalyst for a first conversation with what I hoped would be a continuing client? I remember walking to the front door of the large four-sided home. I remember that the home had a porch that went across the entire front of the home. However, there was no step. The front door seemed to be hanging above an open space. I walked around to the back of the house and noted another fullsized porch. I entered the porch and knocked several times. Just as I was about to give up, someone addressed me from behind. The low and powerful voice scared me! The tall man stood as though he was protecting his land. I introduced myself and told him why I was at the farm. He motioned to the picnic table in the lawn and asked me to sit down. I opened the conversation by asking about his giant trees and how old they must be. It was almost immediate; I had hit on a subject that he wanted to discuss. He asked me to walk toward the barn as he had something to show me.

He pointed up to a particular limb high in a giant oak tree. He wanted me to note THE CHAIN that was embedded in the limb about three feet out from the trunk. I had no idea what it meant or why he wanted to show this chain to a stranger. I could sense that he was provide the farmland needed. He decided that it was here that his family could settle. I listened as he spoke of his grandfather with such pride. He told of his grandfather walking back to Prairie du Chien to get the family. They then returned to the land, the land where



proud of what he was about to tell me. He told me the story of his family in great detail. He wanted to tell me about THE CHAIN and its significance in family history.

The story continued when we returned to the picnic table on that hot spring afternoon. His grandparents had been some of the earliest Norwegian settlers. They had found their way to Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, which is located on the Mississippi River. It was at Prairie du Chien that a decision had been made. His grandfather would leave the family at the river. He would walk west to find farmland. He walked over two hundred miles until he found land that suited him. It was what he was looking for. The land was located near a river that had many large trees. These would supply lumber for building. The river would provide the water for drinking until a time when they could drill a well.

I was sitting in awe as

he told his story. Why was he sharing this all with me? What made him think that I was interested in such history? Was it that I had mentioned the beauty of the giant trees? I found out that THE CHAIN had a special significance. It had been installed in a tree in the early days by his grandfather. It had been used when butchering. A pulley and rope was attached to the chain. A carcass of a hog could then be lowered into a barrel of boiling water for scalding.

A long and meaningful relationship developed from this meeting. We became very good friends. I was always anxious to see him each spring when we renewed his crop hail insurance. He would tell me a piece of his family history each year.

### **Upon Their** Backs

The hot summer sun beats down on the flat prairie! Our workhorses rest at the end of the field, resting before returning to their plodding duty. The hair near the horse collars is white with sweat. They seem relieved to stop. I feel sorry for them. I remember getting down from the hay mower and walking up in front. They look down at me, for I am just a boy. Their large gentle dark eyes have a kind look to them. I rub my hand down their long faces. They respond by moving their heads toward me. They seem to be thanking me for thinking of them.

The workhorse was the power of the farm when I was a boy. Some neighbors bought tractors for heavy work. My father finally gave in and bought a tractor for these jobs. However, he used horses long after others had stopped. He wanted to hang onto something that was precious to him. He was a horseman and he needed to teach his skill

to his son. The work of the farm was UPON THEIR BACKS. They bore the heavy load. They pushed into their neck collars to power the plow, disc, harrow, cultivator, mower and wagons. It was before my time, but I was told of them walking in a circle as they pulled a large wheel, the stationary horsepower. The horsepower turned a rod that powered the stationary pieces of farm machinery such as the early threshing machines. They would walk for hours!

What bothers me is that the common workhorse is mostly forgotten today. No one ever speaks of them. The common workhorse did so much and is given credit for so little. We seldom see them pictured as they were. Most people think of them as the high stepping, beautiful purebred horses pulling a wagon that hauls nothing. They think of them as giants that we see at the fair!

The common workhorse deserves to be remembered. They deserve a place in the memory of

those who were born on the prairie. Most were not the beautiful animals that are now pictured. They were average in size and plain to look at. Their harnesses were plain, yet they were simple and effective. There were no braided manes and tails. Their hooves were not polished black and adorned with just-right shaped horseshoes. There were no chrome ornaments over their collars. They were just plain workhorses! They were faster than the oxen and slower than the tractor.

I feel a sense of sadness as I write this essay. How many people remember them? They were wonderful. When you worked with them you soon began to understand them. They were like people. Some were better workers than others. The common workhorse soon became a friend - they wanted to satisfy. You knew them and they knew your voice. They responded to kindness - my father taught me that.

Rittenberry stayed in Alberge's (cheaper style living quarters that was pretty much a bed in a room with others) in small towns along the way. Much of the food she consumed while on the trek was considered "Pilgrim Meals", which usually consisted of some type of protein, salad, soup, bolognaise and a dessert. Because she many times traveled alone and the sleeping arrangements, Iulie always kept her "valuables" close to her even when showering.

Pilgrims were many times identified by the backpacks they wore and the shells that many hung around their necks or on their shirts. Julie stated that she many times started her trek early each day and planned for her overnight stops ahead of time so she could also spend time visiting the small towns and areas that she stayed in.

After walking for 32 days (she actually spent 34 days on the pilgrimage - spending a couple extra days taking in the areas she was in), Rittenberry arrived at the Cathedral Santiago on October 3rd, 2015, which was the end point of her trek. She received her certificate showing that she had completed her trek and attended three masses at the cathedral in an emotional end to her journey.

Julie said that should would like to do the pilgrimage again sometime in the future and that "there is alot of things I would do differently, now that I have taken the trek." She called the pilgrimage a "life-changing experience" and that she learned many things about the people she met along the way and the lifestyles of the people throughout Spain.

Her advice to those who may be interested in taking the pilgrimage themselves, "Use the online forums to learn about the area, the trek itself and also what to expect along the way." It may not hurt to brush up on a little Spanish, either!


