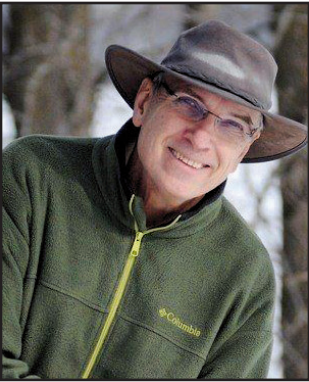

Naturally

The Royal Guild of the Stable Fly Appreciation Club met. There was no one in attendance. I hoped the darner and meadowhawk dragon-

flies find the flies appetizing. Bull thistle is more robust than Canada thistle with redder flowers. Yellow flowers of goldenrods and sunflowers delighted. Dew-covered spiderwebs proved photogenic. Young Baltimore orioles swamped the jelly feeders. As the great philosopher Adam Sandler sang, "Oh, so many things for me to wonder. Oh, I love grape jelly!"

"Do cliff swallows reuse nests?" They may repair and reuse old nests. Their nests are made of

mud and shaped into the form of a jug-like gourd. They sometimes dome over barn swallow nests. Legend says cliff swallows return to the Mission San Juan Capistrano in southern California on March 19 (St. Joseph's Day) and leave for South America on October 23 (Day of San Juan). Larger bird species are more apt to reuse nests. One bald eagle nest was used for 35 years. I watched white storks in Europe and was awed by the realization that some of their nests had been in continuous use for hundreds of years. Helen Abramson of

Meadowlands wrote of her hummingbirds going through a lot of syrup since late July due to the fledglings. Sometimes all six ports in one of her eight feeders were used at the same time. She wondered if the adults had left. Fewer hours of daylight trigger hormonal changes that cause the urge to fuel up and fly south. They leave while nectar-rich flowers are still in bloom and feeders are full. Ruby-throated hummingbird males leave first, as early as mid-July. Females follow and then the juveniles migrate for the first time all alone.

Daniel Otten of Hayward sent a photo of barklice. Adult barklice are about 1/4 inch long with shiny black wings held in tent-like fashion over their abdomens. Nymphs are gray with pale yellow banding. They're typically encountered as a colony containing a mixture of nymphs and adults. Adults are reluctant to fly but it is the primary means of dispersal. They are social and often move as a mass. Their herd-like movements have earned them the nicknames "bark cattle" or "tree cattle." They aren't the blood-sucking lice associated with humans. They have nothing in common with human lice and glean fungus, lichen, algae, broken bark and other plant debris from trees, decks and other wooden things. They prefer damp areas fostering growth and degradation of their food. Barklice are harmless.

"How many species did Audubon discover?" John James Audubon practiced the first bird-banding in North America in 1804, ringing silver thread, yarn or wire around the legs of eastern phoebes. Audubon claimed 40% of his tagged phoebes returned home. An "Archives of Natural History" paper doubted that as larger scale studies found much lower return rates and suggested Audubon was in France at the time of the phoebes' return. Audubon's

method of painting birds was specimen-based ornithology. He killed them with small shot, before arranging them with wire into natural-looking tableaux that might include nests, stumps, branches and/or predators. He compiled his works into a masterpiece called "Birds of America." It was common for authors to seek subscriptions from members of the public willing to pay for the work's completion. In 2010, a copy of "Birds of America" sold at a Sotheby's auction for \$11.5 million. Audubon is credited with discovering around 25 species and 12 subspecies, but there are other mystery birds that appear nowhere but in Audubon's watercolors: the Bartram's vireo, carbonated swamp-warbler, Cuvier's kinglet, Townsend's finch (or Townsend's bunting), small-headed flycatcher, and blue mountain warbler. They were likely hybrids, birds with aberrant plumages, immature birds, sexually dimorphic specimens or birds no one else saw. Audubon had been known to stretch the truth. And then there was the Washington eagle.

Audubon first saw one on a trip up the Mississippi River in 1814. A few years later, he shot one in Kentucky and according to his measurements, it stood 3 feet, 7 inches tall and had a wingspan of 10 feet, 2 inches. The journal "American Naturalist" opined that it was a large, immature bald eagle. Was it a case of avian misidentification or a con that duped people for financial gain (subscriptions)? Either way, he was a brilliant bird artist. The Massachusetts Audubon Society began in 1896 when people became alarmed at the number of waterfowl being killed for use as feathers in hats. The National Audubon Society was founded in 1905. We haven't seen our out of town children and grandchildren since Christmas because of the pandemic. Last week our youngest son John and his family came for a much enjoyed 2 night visit it motivated me to make home made cinnamon rolls and do some house cleaning! Our grandson Hunter wanted to take his driver's test but after calling for an appointment to take the test in their area our daughter in law discovered there was a 3 month wait and that you couldn't even sign up more than 3 months ahead. So she tried Fairmont and was able to sign him up. So on Friday Hunter took his drivers test in Fairmont and passed his first try so it was a successful visit!

My favorite salad with tomatoes is the one I am sharing with you today, I think the secret is the tarragon vinegar so don't substitute another kind!

Connecticut Hill Salad

3 cucumbers, scored and thinly sliced
1 medium yellow onion cut in thin strips
3 medium tomatoes cut in 6 wedges
1 cup sugar
1 cup tarragon vinegar
1 cup sunflower oil
2 Tablespoons salt
1 Tablespoon black pepper
3/4 Tablespoon white pepper
1/2 cup freeze dried chives
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch

Place cucumber, onion and tomatoes in a medium salad bowl. Combine the next 7 ingredients in a 1 quart bowl. Combine the 1/4 cup sugar and cornstarch in a small bowl and add enough of the oil/vinegar mixture to make a thin paste, add to remaining oil and vinegar mixture and whip until slightly thickened, pour over vegetables, toss and refrigerate for 20-30 minutes.

One of Richard's favorite treats to eat since he was young was caramel popcorn balls and loved to have one with his family and friends through the years.

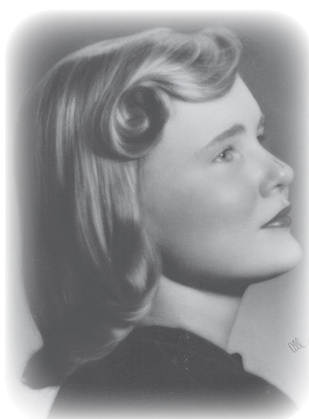

Strike up the band

Entertainment in the early part of the 20th Century, while vastly different from today, did have some similarities. There were no video games, television, cell phones, downloaded music, Sirius Satellite Radio, or cable television. Yet there was baseball, the advent of motion pictures, city bands, plays, and something called Vaudeville. According to Dictionary.com, Vaudeville can be defined as follows: "theatrical entertainment consisting of a number of individual performances, acts, or mixed numbers, as by comedians, singers, dancers, acrobats, and magicians."

Back in 1919 the Fairmont City Council recommended a \$2,000.00 tax levy to support a city band and to hire Pro-

fessor Guy Donnelly of Harmony, Minnesota. Donnelly was lauded as a very successful band instructor. Following his being hired in Fairmont, an article in the August 12, 1920, edition of the Truman Tribune told of the reorganization of the Truman City Band with the intention of hiring Donnelly to lead their band as well.

So, just who was this somewhat illustrious figure of musical propensity of the day, Guy Donnelly? According to documentation found in the archives of the Pioneer Museum, Donnelly arrived in Fairmont in 1918 after ten years traveling on the "week show" circuit and two years as a bandleader in Harmony, Minnesota. Originally from Lew

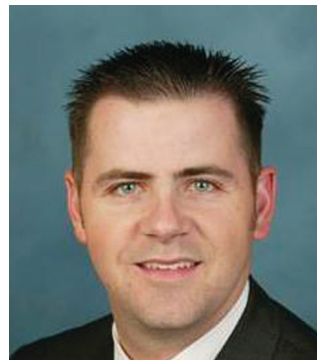
Rob Zelinsky was born and raised on an 80 head Suffolk sheep farm in Terril, Iowa, under the watchful eye of his grandfa-

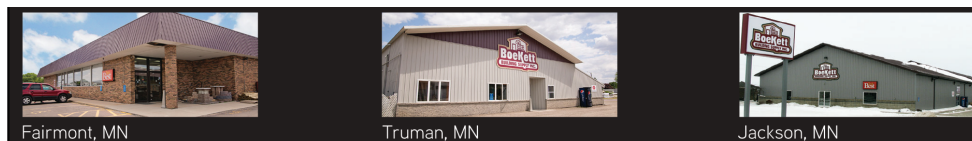

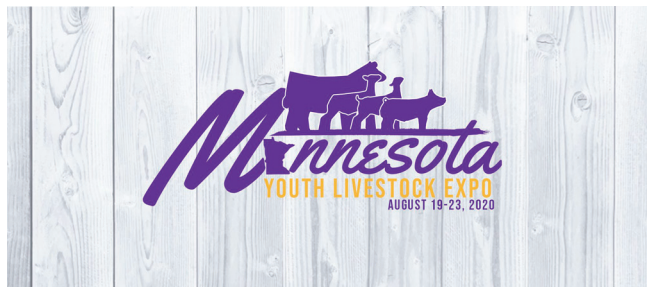

KEY AG ISSUES DISCUSSED DURING FARMFEST VIRTUAL FORUMS

Every year many key agriculture issues are discussed as part of the candidate forums and feature forums that are held at Farmfest in early August. The U.S. Senate and Congressional candidate forums, as well as other forums were held again in 2020; however, this year's forums were conducted in a virtual format. Farmfest Virtual 2020 featured several candidates and agricultural leaders discussing many of the key issues affecting farm families and rural communities in Minnesota and the Midwest.

Following are some of the main issues that were discussed during virtual Farmfest forums:

•Covid-19 Impacts and Assistance --- There was considerable discussion about the financial impacts of COVID-19 on crop and livestock producers and on the ag processing and biofuels industries, as well as coronavirus impacts on rural families and communities. The Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP) was credited with providing some much needed assistance to farmers, especially for small-to medium sized livestock producers that have dealt with low prices and limited packing plant access since the COVID-19 outbreak in the U.S. However, it was pointed out that the current CFAP program did not provide any assistance to biofuel producers, to crop farmers that had already sold their 2019 crop production or for market price losses incurred on the 2020 crops, or to livestock producers that had to euthanize hogs. Only 80 percent of the current CFAP payments were paid out after sign-up; however, it now appears that USDA will

make the final 20 percent of the CFAP payments in the coming weeks to crop and livestock producers. Sign-up for the CFAP program continues until August 28, 2020 at local USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices or online at: <https://www.farmers.gov/cfap>.

•Farm Financial Challenges --- Whether it was comments by U.S. Senate or Congressional candidates, or insights from other Farmfest forum panel members, the continued tight margins and low profitability in farming was a big topic of discussion. Profit margins in crop production have been quite tight in recent years, which has put many farm operations at the brink of financial disaster. Crop production expenses and land rental rates have remained relatively stable for many producers, while crop prices for corn, soybeans and wheat have remained below breakeven levels, and are now at the lowest levels in several years. For farm operators that experienced crop losses in 2019, or may have a crop loss in 2020, due to weather issues, the financial situation may be even more severe.

The livestock sector is not faring much better from a profitability standpoint and has seen profit levels deteriorate quite rapidly since the U.S. outbreak of COVID-19 earlier this year. Dairy farmers have been dealing with very low milk prices for the past several years, which has resulted in many dairy producers exiting the industry in the past few years. However, a large number of dairy farmers

have received CFAP and dairy margin coverage (DMC) program payments in recent months, which together with an improvement in milk prices recently, has helped to mitigate the financial losses that were incurred earlier this year. Hog producers were able to show a slight profit margin earlier in 2020, following some optimism in the pork export markets; however, the return to lower market prices and the necessary euthanizing of hogs following the COVID-19 outbreak, has created significant profit challenges for the hog industry. Cattle feedlot operators and beef cow/calf producers have also faced negative margins at most times during the past year or so.

•Ag Trade Agreements --- Most of the U.S. Senate and Congressional candidates that participated in the virtual Farmfest forums expressed concern about the continuing trade disputes between the United States and China, as well as the slowness in the implementation of the Phase 1 trade agreement with China. If implemented fully, the Phase 1 agreement would increase Chinese purchases of U.S. ag products, including grains and meat products; however, some panelists expressed concern that declining relations between the U.S. and China may again lead to restrictions and tariffs on U.S. ag products being imported by China. In the past couple of years, added Chinese tariffs on ag imports from the U.S. greatly lowered U.S. exports of soybeans, pork and other ag products to China, resulting in much lower commodity prices in the U.S. The other trade issue that garnered considerable attention during the forums was implementation of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) by

the three countries, which replaced the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Canada and Mexico, along with China, are the three largest trading partners for U.S. ag exports.

•Ethanol and Renewable Energy --- Many farm operators, ag and community leaders, and investors in renewable energy plants, are concerned about government policies related to the development and use of ethanol and other biofuels. Many States in the Upper Midwest, including Minnesota, have a very strong and well-established corn-based ethanol industry, which utilizes over 35 percent of the corn produced each year in the United States. In the past few years, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has issued numerous blending waivers to gasoline refiners, which has reduced demand for ethanol and resulted in over-supply in some areas. The ethanol industry has also been negatively impacted by reduced gasoline consumption following the COVID-19 outbreak, as well as by the slowness to implement E-15 as an ethanol fuel blend in the U.S. The biodiesel industry in the U.S. has also been growing significantly in recent years, which has become more important for soybean usage in the past couple of years, due to the challenges with the


soybean export markets.

In addition to the direct benefits to farmers, renewable energy plants have become cornerstones in rural communities by providing jobs, adding to the local tax base, and enhancing the overall economic vitality of the communities. Even with all the economic, environmental, and community benefits of renewable energy, many special interest groups are calling for reductions or elimination of the Federal renewable fuel standards (RFS), and other measures that would hurt the renewable fuels industry. There is also concern as to how climate change legislative proposals, such as the "Green New Deal" or further implementation of the "California Fuel Standards" might impact

future development of the biofuels industry.


The candidates and ag leaders that participated in the Farmfest Virtual 2020 forums discussed numerous other issues, programs and efforts that affect rural businesses, families, and communities in a variety of ways. This included dealing with the economic challenges currently being experienced by rural businesses and local governments, family health care access and costs, expansion of broadband coverage in Greater Minnesota, infrastructure needs, and other issues affecting agriculture and rural communities. I was scared of how my steer would act with all the cheering. What would he do if some of the other cattle acted up? However, his training paid off. I was so proud of my steer, Stub!

Time and fairs passed. Competition had taught me the need for more excellence! If the project attained such excellence it could go on to another level. Market animals, such as market steers, were shown at the Junior Livestock Show in St. Paul. It was only later that all animals became a part of the Minnesota State

Fair. Winning a trip to "the cities", staying in the large 4-H building, competing, were all something unbelievable.

Post membership of 4-H has continued. We have served as adult leaders, worked in the food stand, hosted club meetings, and served as project advisors. Our three children were all active members. Their many projects ranged from clothing to cattle. Many of our grandchildren have been 4-H members. Our business has participated in the 4-H auction for many years. Being honored as a "FRIEND OF 4-H" at an annual recognition banquet carries a great meaning.

Something has happened in 2020 that has changed our world. The COVID 19 pandemic has brought about the need for many "hard to make" decision. Making decisions for ourselves is something very hard. Making them for others can sometimes be even harder. The fair board made a decisions. The 2020 Martin County Fair was cancelled to protect others. YES, IT HURTS, BUT IT WAS THE RIGHT THING TO DO!

istown, Pennsylvania, he played cornet in a theater orchestra there and also attended the German Conservatory in New York.

He really thought he would have a career in show business but, with the advent of the phonograph, the times were changing. According to Donnelly, musicians hated that invention.

Donnelly tried Vaudeville, but after about six weeks he tired of it and got a job as lead in a "farce comedy." That launched him on a career in show business performing in what was called "week shows." These "week shows" would come to town, play for a week, and then move on to the next engagement, most likely in another town.


While in his twenties, Donnelly had a chance encounter with who he referred to as an "old Swede." This individual, colorfully

portrayed by Donnelly, had been a band leader in Harmony, Minnesota. The "old Swede" told him that if he ever wanted quit the road and settle down, Harmony was the best town in the United States. Consequently, following that advice, Donnelly took the job offer in Harmony. However, after about two years, he had an offer from Fairmont that he decided to accept.

As a result of those chance happenings, Donnelly went on to lead the municipal band in Fairmont from 1918 to 1943. During part of that time also taught band and orchestra for the Fairmont schools. In addition, he led bands in Truman and other surrounding towns. His musical influence was reflected by the fact that a number of his former students were playing first chair in seventeen different colleges.

Donnelly spent his retirement years in Fairmont often reminiscing about his days traveling in show business and how it has evolved over the years. He was obviously skilled and creative. He was sought after for his expertise in music and had a stellar career as a band leader.

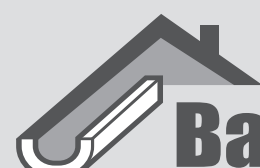
