



Engaged Fathers

Back in the early 60's, (when I gave birth to my children), it was the custom for the father to wait, sleep, read and relax in the father's room, while the mother gave birth to their children. In that era, the gender of the child was revealed at birth and it was then customary for the father to visit family and friends to distribute cigars sporting either a pink or a blue announcement band, and receive the congratulatory handshakes. The mother would usually stay at the hospital for up to five days and once home the responsibility of caring for the newborn, as well as the other children in the household, was assumed to be hers and hers alone. I can tell you from experience that those were very tough years, as by then, many of us were also holding down full time jobs and trying to "doing it all".

By the 80's, according to USA Today, this trend began to shift, and fathers began taking on new roles within the household. By 2011 this study sites more and more couples working together toward a much more balanced distribution of childcare duties; a goal that I encourage all couples to work toward. Nothing makes me smile more, than to witness great parenting; and I get genuinely ecstatic when I

fathers like my Grandsonin-law Brady, as he cares for, and interacts with his son Kaylor... it truly warms my heart! My excitement increases when I see research by the American Psychological Assn. showing that the influence of a father's love on a child's development is as great as the influence of a mother's love. Fatherly love helps children develop a sense of their place in the world, which helps their social, emotional and cognitive development and functioning. (These are the very reasons that I find it extremely sad that often loving, well intentioned, non-residential fathers have to fight for their right to be that engaged parent, when it is proven fact that they play such a huge role in that child's development.)

So, why do you think that someone like me, who usually writes about essential oils and natural products, all of a sudden gets on her soapbox about fathers being engaged in childcare? Well, it's all because of a little 5 year old boy who said to me... .."I just <u>"WOV"</u> <u>"WOV"</u> <u>"WOV"</u> when my daddy put my OYOS on". It was those words that almost gave me goose bumps... not only because it reinforced the fact that this precious child had an engaged father, but that his

see amazing and engaged father was involved in the "wellness" piece of his parenting.

Farmer's Strata

Growing up on the farm!

I had a wonderful, carefree childhood growing up on the farm! We could always see the sunrises and sunsets, and try to locate the star constellations on clear starry nights! I grew up with one sister one year younger. I don't ever remember being bored. We created our own fun, playing pioneer down by the dredge ditch; making pretend outdoor play houses in the grove, dragging boards, crates and what we could rummage out of the junk pile; and even making floats out of cardboard boxes and crepe paper for our make believe parades, using our dolls as parade queens! My dad milked those gentle brown Swiss cows. Those early morning chores always called for hearty breakfast! No skipping breakfasts at the Taylor home!

In my recipe file I found this hearty recipe for Farmer's Strata, which I thought fitting for this week's recipe. I hope you enjoy it! Plan ahead - this needs to be refrigerated overnight before baking.

Farmer's Strata

1 lb bacon, cut into 1/2 inch pieces 2 cups chopped fully cooked ham 1 small onion, chopped 10 slices white bread cubed 1 cup cubed cooked potatoes 3 cups shredded cheddar cheese 3 cups milk 1 Tbsp. worcestershire sauce

1 tsp ground mustard salt and pepper to taste

Cook bacon 'til crisp; add ham and onion, cook and stir until onion is tender. Drain. In greased 9x13 inch baking dish, layer half the bread cubes, half the potatoes and half the cheese, then top with the bacon mixture. Repeat layers of bread, potatoes and cheese. Beat eggs; add milk, worcersterhire sauce, mustard, salt and pepper. Pour over all, cover and refrigerate overnight. Remove from refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 65-70 minutes or 'til knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let set 10 minutes before cutting.




Nature by the yard By Al Batt

It was a lovely January day. It was good to take a leisurely walk after having been fenced in by the cold, wind and snow.

There was no smell of skunk. That scent is a sign of a coming spring.

I stopped to look and listen so often that I moved with the speed of a building.

Ι learned as a child to pick up my feet, but they didn't want to go. There was too much to experience.



When I want to see a bird, crows come in handy. The crow flew from a tree with a flurry of caws. Watching birds fly lifts me during troubled times. Birds are beautiful. George Orwell wrote, "The essence of being human is that one does not seek perfection."

That is true, but a bird in flight appears to be perfect and I delight in its appear-

Birding isn't only about birds. It's about place, too. Birding is about gathering memories. It's a connection to something bigger. It's a wonderment. It's becoming lost in the excitement. It's freeing the mind to travel where it wants to go. This provides a place to reclaim happy times.

I stood without movement, savoring the moment.

"Where do frogs spend the winter?" During our winters, frogs and toads become dormant, hibernating either underwater or under leaf litter on the ground. The northern leopard frog spends the winter swimming slowly under the ice of lakes, ponds and streams. Wood frogs, chorus frogs, gray tree frogs and spring peepers lie frozen under leaf litter on the floor of woodlands.

Blanding's Turtle priority area

Westford and Waverly Townships have been desthe state threatened Blanding's Turtle.

The MN DNR Nongame Wildlife Program has partnered with DNR Wildlife, Martin SWCD, Fox Lake Conservation League (FLCL) and the Martin Conservation County Club (MCCC) to improve the habitat for Blanding's Turtles and other species of wildlife within the Perch Creek corridor. The project is currently focused on 72 acres located on the Perch Creek WMA and on two private parcels that are enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program under a perpetual easement.

Grant funding through DNR Nongame Wildlife has provided \$2,500 used for the initial chemical treatment of the regrowth following a burn in the spring of 2013. A second grant of \$4,000 along with matching mental seeding to insure

Work included removing invasive species, priignated as a priority area for marily Brome grass, Reed canary grass and Hybrid cattails. Invasive species have been removed and local ecotype native plants are becoming established within wetland areas, in the transition zone and on the upland areas of the project. Once established, the diverse range of native species will provide a huge improvement in habitat value, compared to the monocultures that dominated the

One of the primary goals of the project is to establish short clump type vegetation on the hill tops and upper side slopes. Blanding's Turtles, Pintails and several other species of prairie wildlife that require this type of habitat for nesting and foraging, are expected to benefit from the project.

It will take many years of close monitoring, spot weed control and supple-



Cover crops

by Kristy DuBois

There are numerous reasons to put cover crops in as part of your corn and soybean rotation and I have a couple of reasons that I will share with you.

1. Nutrient scavenging brassicas. As they grow they take up nutrients and store them in their leaves, roots, and tubers. Their long tap roots access and take-up nutrients like nitrogen that have filtered down below the root depth of most grain plants. After winter kill, they quickly decompose in the spring and put all those nutrients back into the soil. The biomass left on the surface creates a mellow seed bed to plant your cash crops. Who could ask for more?



2014 year in weather review for Minnesota, including Martin County

"Polar Vortex" was on everyone's mind at the start of 2014. Measurable snow happened on 15 or more days of the month for many places in the state, about twice the normal number of days. Strong winds brought bliz-January. January average temperatures ranged from 5 to 10 degrees below normal and for many places in the state, January 2014 ranked among one of the top five coldest Januarys of the past 35 years. The coldest temperature for 2014 occurred on January 2nd and 3rd with -47 degrees F at Babbitt.



Every profession has a "toolbox" that holds everything that one needs to get their job done. A plumber has his pipe wrenches and a "snake," a dentist has his picks and a drill; a farmer has his plow and a combine. Here at Natural Resources Conservation Service we also have a tool box to help us improve Soil the Conservation Practice Standards that guide us in the installation and implementation of conservation practices.

Without good soil very well. Soil contains living organisms that perform functions necessary to produce food and fiber. We need to look at

Our Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) has financial assistance dollars to help you convert conventional practices to less tillage practices.



ON AQUATIC HITCHHIKERS

Actions Required by MN Law

- to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species: Clean aquatic plants, zebra mussels, and other prohibited invasive species off watercraft, trailers, and equipment before leaving the water access.
- Drain water from boat, ballast tanks, portable bait container, and motor before leaving a water access – and drain bilge, livewell, and baitwell by removing drain plugs. Keep drain plugs out while transporting boats.
- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash. It is illegal to release live bait into the water, or to dump worms on the ground.



Elm Creek Certainty Pilot Watershed

ral Advantage – Elm Creek Pilot Coordinator

The Elm Creek Watershed in south central Minnesota was selected as one of four pilot watersheds for the new Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality Certification Program [MAWQCP] in 2014. This new program is focused on the intersection between agricultural production and water quality. The goal of the MAWOCP is to enhance Minnesota's water quality by accelerating the voluntary adoption of on-farm conservation practices. Farmers receiving certification are exempt from new Minnesota water quality rules for a period of ten years, as long as they continue or improve their management see farmers falling short cally. The Elm Creek Pilot Project is seeking to idenwho would be interested in having the Certainty Assessment Tool applied for their farm operation. The assessment tool measures water quality risks in the areas of nutrient management, pesticide management, tillage and practices. conservation Basically, an interested farmer agrees to complete an assessment of fields in STIR score. their farm operation. Each

management scheme the farmer uses for each crop. Most farms run two assessments - one for corn and one for soybeans. When the field is assessed they receive an index score between 1 and 10. Farmscore on all their fields, under all management schemes, to receive Certification from the MN Department of Agriculture.

So far staff has worked with 25 or so farmers and run over 500 assessments on about 21,000 acres in the Elm Creek watershed. Approximately one half of the fields are meeting the index score of 8.5 with their current management techniques.

Landowner guidance to Elm Creek financial incentives

by Linda Meschke, Coordinator

The following financial incentives are available to landowners or producers participating in the pilot MN Agricultural Water Quality Certification Program [MAWQCP] at any level. To be eligible to participate, you must have at least one acre in the Elm Creek watershed to make all your acres eligible. Contact Dustin Benes at 507-238-5449 or dustin@ruraladvantage.org or contact your local SWCD or NRCS staff if you are interested or need information.

Funds may be available to address any water quality issue a landowner or producer wants to address. The solu-

tion needs to fit programmatic criteria, but there is significant latitude in programs to address most issues.

Priority issues and practices identified by the local advisory committee are listed below. Funding for other conservation issues and practices not listed are also available.



These properties encompass almost 19,000 acres of critically important wetlands and grassland for migrating, breeding and nesting waterfowl. They also provide vital habitat for declining grassland bird populations, and a variety of mammal, reptile, amphibian, and pollinator species. In addition, the include the purchase of 220

Only about 1% of the state's original native prairie, one of the most endangered ecosystems in the world, remains. The Windom WMD also provides technical and financial assistance to private landowners to improve habitat on their property through the Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program.

WPAs and NWR tracts are actively managed by Windom WMD staff. Activities include periodic prescribed burning, prescription grazing, haying, and water level management to mimic natural ecological processes and increase the diversity and vitality of the prairie-wetland landscape. When lands are first acquired, habitat restoration or enhancement work is typically needed. Former agricultural fields are reseeded with locally harvested native grasses and wildflowers. Drained wetlands are also restored and enhanced.



North Union Students create PSA's for area shelters


