Interlaken Golf Club marks 100 years By Lenny Tvedten, Martin County Historical Society

Golf Club will be celebrating its 100th anniversary July 12th, 13th and 14th, 2019. A number of events and activities are planned for the celebration.

dates back to the early 1900s during which the legendary entrepreneur, Frank Wade, was instrumental in its formation. The organization papers of the golf club were signed in 1918 by his son, Harold Wade, and fifty-nine of his friends. Apparently

According to research in the Pioneer Museum, it appears that golf was played Frank Wade, Fairmont in early July of 1918 and that the construction of the clubhouse was started in June of that year. It seems reasonable to believe that the project wasn't completed until the following year,

In the early years, every club member was new to the driving force behind the Fairmont, staking out the was from Chicago. Conse-

quently, a former pro and teacher at Interlachen Golf Club in Minneapolis was hired to teach the members to play golf for a fee of fifty cents per lesson.

In 1922, the Interlaken Golf Course purchased 67 acres from Frank Wade's estate for \$300.00 per acre. The land had previously been leased. Later, in 1936, stock in Interlaken was offered for \$150.00 per share. Harold Wade, Frank's son, purchased the first share. It took eight years to sell 100 shares of stock.

In 1966, the Interlaken Board hired former technical editor Tony Kowski of



Golf Magazine in New York City to be the golf pro. He was instrumental in leading the organization through the purchase of 76 acres of farmland directly south of the nine hole course. Don Herefort, a Minneapolis golf course architect, was hired to develop the new 18-hole layout. The new 18-hole course opened for play in July of 1969 with club membership reaching 350 members. In addition, the stock purchase price was raised from \$150.00 to \$250.00.

Thirty years later, in 1999, a fully automatic course watering system was installed in addition to the new retention pond and pump house. The total cost of the project was \$435,000.00.

Since its inception, there have been many interesting and notable golfers that have played at the Interlaken Golf Course in addition to many exciting golf tournaments. of the local electric rate is a transmission rate which is required for electricity to be delivered to the city. That rate is paid to ITC. Heartland has evaluated the possibility of Truman building their own lines, but found it was not economical.

The final component of the local rate is local costs required to run the utility and the revenues transferred to supplement other services. Municipal electric utilities on average transfer 5.6% of revenues back to the community to help pay for other city services. Truman's transfer rate is much higher as electric revenue is largely supplementing water and sewer services.

Selling the locallyowned, locally-managed utility would not immediately provide Truman with lower electric rates. Heartland's wholesale rate is lower than the cooperative's advertised retail rate. Truman would still be responsible for the transmission rate and may even incur additional wheeling charges. The

Summer is here!

I am trying not to complain about the last couple of days of hot, humid weather! I weeded my flowers on Friday it was really hot but worse on Saturday and Sunday so glad I got it done. My flowers are really tall so the weeds don't show to just a casual look, but once I start looking I find them. Fourth of July is just around the corner, after that it seems like fall comes

Today I am giving you the recipe for sausage gravy to go with the biscuit recipe I shared with you last week, I dare not make it too often!

Classic Sausage Gravy:

1 # Jimmy Dean breakfast sausage 1/3-1/2 cup all purpose flour or as needed 4 cups milk, or as needed (I used 2 %) Kosher salt and ground black pepper to taste

In a large skillet cook sausage until crumbly and no longer pink, Add 1/3 cup flour, if there are not enough drippings to make a roux add 2 Tablespoons butter, cook until bubbly. Whisk in milk until smooth. Bring to a simmer over medium heat and cook until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Adjust the gravy's consistency if necessary. If its too thin, whisk in more flour 1 tablespoon at a time or if its too thick, add milk a couple Tablespoons at a time. Season generously with salt and pepper. Serve over biscuits warm. Store leftovers in a covered container in the refrigerator for up to 4 days. Reheat gently over low heat.

The 2018 Farm Bill created the Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) program as a safetynet program for dairy producers for 2019-2023, which may offer some hope in the future for the small-to-medium size dairy producers. Sign-up for the new DMC program began on June 17th, 2019 and will continue until September 20th, 2019 begin after July 8th, 2019, age level was \$8.00/cwt.) and DMC payments to eligible dairy producers will be made retroactively back to January 1st, 2019.

The DMC program is a voluntary program, which is "margin based" with calculations based on the income over feed cost margins on a monthly basis. The DMC program requires dairy producers to choose production and price coverage levels at various premium rates. There were some fairly significant improvements in the DMC program as a "safety-net" and risk management program for dairy can purchase the \$9.50/cwt.

Following are highlights of the new DMC program (compared to the previous MPP program):

 Dairy producers now have a coverage level choice up to 95 percent of production history. (MPP maximum coverage level was capped at 90 percent of production history.)

> • Tier 1 DMC coverage goes up to 5 million pounds of production (approx. 200-230 cows). (MPP Tier 1 maximum was 4 million pounds.)

Under MPP, many dairy producers selected Tier 1 coverage at either the \$6.50 or \$8.00 per hundredweight coverage levels for 2015 to 2018. Based on USDA data, MPP payments only ocriod at the \$6.50/cwt., and in 41 percent of the months at the \$8.00/cwt. level. The DMC program now offers higher price coverage level options of \$8.50, \$9.00, and \$9.50 per hundredweight. approx. 3 million pounds Had the DMC program been per year (30,000 cwt.), the months at \$8.50/cwt.: 63 percent at \$9.00/cwt.; and

The maximum DMC coverage price is \$9.50 per hundredweight, which is MPP/DMC margin over the past ten years of \$8.11 per hundredweight. The average MPP/DMC margin over the past five years has been \$9.51 per hundredweight, coverage level. It should be noted that the 5-year aver-

are not necessarily a predictor of future DMC program payments; however, based on current trends in the margins, the \$9.50 per hundredweight level should provide a considerably improved safety-net.

Preliminary 2019 DMC Results

As was mentioned earlier, the 2019 DMC payments will be retroactive back to January 1st, 2019, once they begin in July of 2019. The DMC payments are calculated on a monthly basis, so we already have the results for January, February, and March of 2019. Based on the DMC income over feed cost formula, the DMC payments for the first three months of 2019 would be: January = \$1.51/cwt.: Feb. = \$1.28/cwt.; March = \$.65/



It's easier to use my iPad than starting my laptop, especially if I need to get online for just a few minutes, but I thought I might be doing some writing that morning, so I carried my laptop bag in with me as well. I ordered a cup of coffee and an english muffin, then sat at a small, round table and set the computer bag in the extra seat on the other side.

On my iPad I re-checked my routes on Google maps, looked at few other things online, then started to think about what I was going to write. I was drawing a complete blank - writer's block and I had it bad. It was another 565 miles to our destination in New Jersey and we didn't have time to sit around; if I wasn't going to be able to write, I needed to get going. "I'll try again later." I said. I closed my device, went back to my truck, and June and I headed down the highway, eastbound.

...I reached for it, but it wasn't there...I panicked... how could I ever recover what I lost...



Vehicle manufacturers are sending official recall notices to affected consumers. Consumers also get notifications through postcards, e-mail, social media and other forms of communication urging them Airbag Recall, can also be to contact their dealers immediately to schedule an appointment for a free recall repair.

Even if they haven't received a communication, all vehicle owners should check if their vehicle is affected by the Takata airbag recall by visiting www.SafeAirbags.com or www.NHTSA.gov/Recalls and entering their vehicle identification number (VIN).

Dealerships around the country have replacement parts available, and the free recall repair should take an average of one to several hours depending on vehicle make and model.

"Unfortunately, many consumers are not taking immediate action, either because they have ignored the repeated safety recall notices or do not understand the severity of the situation," said Patrick Juneau, who is leading a nationwide outreach program by SafeAirbags.com.

"It is vitally important for consumers to pay attention to any notifications they receive and to schedule an appointment to have their airbags repaired for FREE. This literally could be a matter of life and





Answer: Under the law, you may not hold your phone in your hand and cannot use it at any time for video calling, video livestreaming, Snapchat, gaming, looking at video or photos stored on the phone, using non-navigation apps, reading texts and scrolling or typing on the phone.

The new law does allow a driver to use their cell phone to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single-touch activation without holding the phone.




