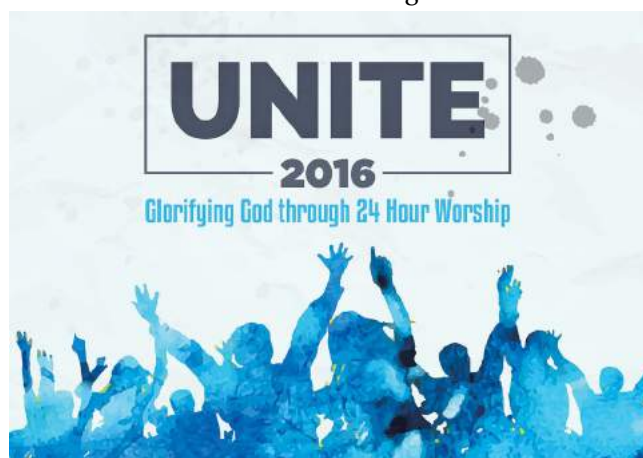

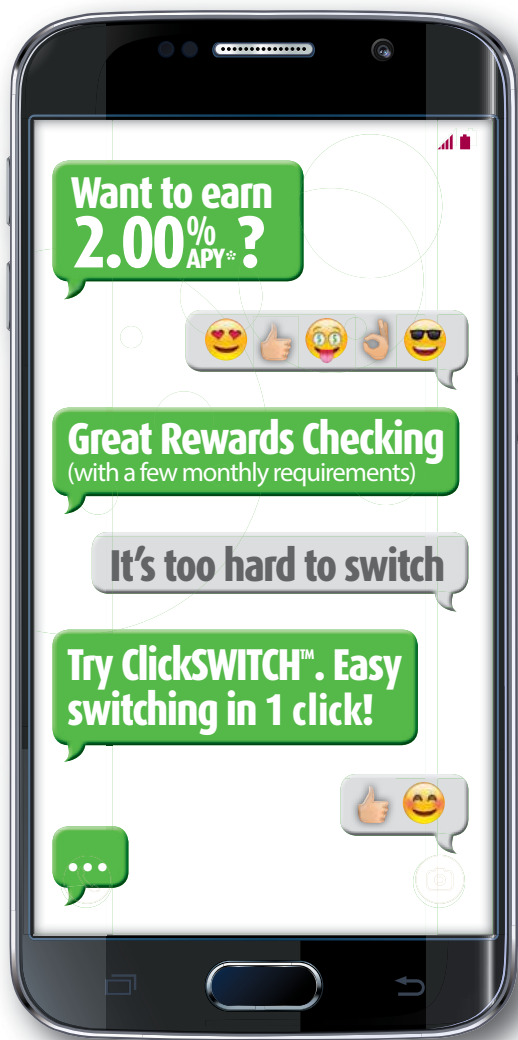

Avenue in Fairmont, was at one time THE place to go and eat. The original Oaks Inn was started by Sumner Scott and was located in a building in the vicinity of Albion Avenue and Oak Ridge Road in the early 1940s when there was no residential development yet in that area. In 1945, the Scotts started the second Oaks Inn at 1600 Albion Avenue. They ran both businesses for a time, eventually closing the original location in the late 1940s to concentrate their efforts on the Albion Avenue location.

The Oaks Inn was probably the first restaurant in the area to have such a full and varied menu. It included many options ranging from a grilled cheese sandwich to steak and lobster tail. The Oaks was well known for its

steaks primarily as a result of their aging process. According to one of the former owners of The Oaks in the 1960s, Jerry McShane, he explained that they would cut their own meat daily, absorb any shrinkage so that the customer would not be shorted, and they made certain that all excess fat, tissue and gristle was removed.

It was considered somewhat of a gathering place, and although it only had a capacity of between 40-60 diners, it attracted people from throughout northern Iowa and southern Minnesota. It was said to have had a relaxed appeal with a "club" like atmosphere, although, there was neither dancing nor entertainment, simply good food.

The Oaks Inn closed in

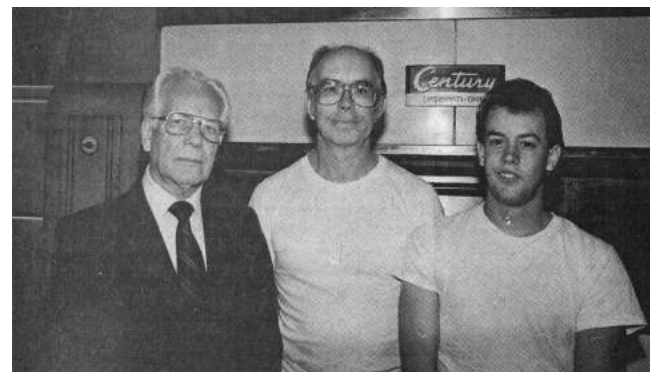


the fall of 1980 and eventually became the site of a twin home development.

Both Kiehl's Bakery and The Oaks Inn had excellent reputations for their products and services. They had a following that considered them to be without equal. The quality of their products was a measure of their success. If you were fortunate enough to have

experienced these businesses, you can count yourself lucky. Those that didn't have the good fortune to experience them don't know what they have missed!

lived in Martin County and the surrounding area for a number of years the thought of Kiehl's Bakery and The Oaks Inn will bring a variety of mouth watering delicacies to mind. The Oaks had those delectable steaks as well as very good sea food, and who can forget Kiehl's Champagne Cake, not to mention the other exquisitely prepared offerings available at both establishments.

Kiehl's Bakery was originally opened by Art Kiehl on January 1st of 1940. Kiehl had owned and operated bakeries in Nebraska but was looking for a town in Minnesota that had a population between 5,000 and 10,000. He decided to give Fairmont a try even though there were already three bakeries in town. Because of that, many didn't think his business would last six months. However, he proved those prognosticators wrong by building a thriving and extremely popular business that lasted beyond the half century mark and eventually included second and third generation family members in its operation.

When Art Kiehl started in the bakery business, his workday was from midnight to early afternoon. He employed a crew of bread and pastry bakers. Their bread baking would be done through the night into early morning. In ad-

dition, he rarely closed the bakery. Although the workday changed over the years, the recipes remained unchanged and were the same ones used and enjoyed by customers for many years. The longevity of the business

Kiehl's Bakery was originally located at 117 Downtown Plaza in Fairmont. He purchased the building at 214 Downtown Plaza and moved his bakery to that location. Although it is no longer in business, the various products made by Kiehl's Bakery are undoubtedly fondly remembered and sorely missed. Anyone fortunate enough to have experienced the taste of their mouth-watering offerings including cakes, cookies, rolls, and bread that they made daily for many, many years would surely long for them to be back in business.

1 1/2 tsp vanilla
1 cup coconut

FCHF grants to Eye Clinic

Fairmont Community Hospital Foundation granted our local hospital \$70,976.52 to the Mayo Clinic Health System - Fairmont Eye Clinic Department. The three items which were granted are listed below:

Cryotherapy Probe Hand Piece

The Cryotherapy machine is used to treat retinal tears and treat cancers on the surface of the eye.

Retinal Laser

The current retinal laser is over 10 years old. It is difficult to laser patients because the view

with this laser is not as clear as newer lasers. In order to treat patients with a laser, it is important to have as clear of a view of the lesion(s) as possible, and our current laser has poor optics, making it very difficult for us to use this laser to treat patients.

The new laser will help in several ways: (1) With better optics, we would be able to treat patients more efficiently (less treatment time for patient) and more thoroughly (better treatment) (2) It would prevent us from having to refer patients elsewhere for laser treatments - because of difficulty seeing the lesion(s) with the current

laser's poor optics.

Allows for enhanced surgical safety and efficiency. Naturally

As I drove along, there was another constant besides car and rural road. Wild parsnip growing in the ditch. It has been my



lifetime companion. Resembling a large dill plant and growing up to 5 feet tall, wild parsnip is in the carrot family and was introduced to this country in the 1800s. The plant has a flat-topped, five-petaled yellow flower cluster that is 2 to 6 inches wide and blooms from June to late summer.

Wild parsnip is a biennial, producing a rosette of leaves the first year and a single flower stalk the second. It grows in sunny conditions in dry to mesic areas. Wild parsnip is prolific and invasive. The sap from the wild parsnip can cause painful phytophotodermatitis on skin exposed to sunlight. Unexpected

red patches and blisters on skin following a walk in the woods or fields are often blamed on poison ivy, stinging nettles, insects or spiders. They could be the result of bumping into wild parsnip.

We baled wild hay to supplement the alfalfa we fed the cows. Wild parsnip grew in the prairie we called wild hay. The cows ate the forbs and grasses in the hay, but refused to eat the wild parsnip.

Rocky and Bullwinkle and the rabbits

I loved watching the animated TV series titled, "The Rocky and Bullwinkle Show." It featured the adventures of a flying squirrel and a moose from Frostbite Falls, Minnesota.

Bullwinkle, a moose dressed as a magician, would say, "Hey, Rocky! Watch me pull a rabbit out of my hat."

Rocky, the flying squirrel, replied, "Again?"

Bullwinkle tore off his shirtsleeve and declared, "Nothing up my sleeve. Presto!"

Then Bullwinkle reached into a hat and pulled out a lion.

The bit ended with Bullwinkle saying, "No doubt about it, I gotta get another hat."

Bullwinkle must have left his hat full of rabbits in my yard. Eastern cottontails are everywhere.

As I walked to the mailbox, three of them hopped ahead of me. As a boy, I was told that cottontail populations run in 10-year cycles with high numbers occurring at 10-year intervals. The population built to a high before disease, weather, predators and poor reproduction reduced it. A low might continue for several years before the numbers move toward another high.

Within this 10-year cycle, local areas may have highs and lows opposite the overall state cycle. Some areas may hold a high or low for years and

Populations are impacted by weather and the availability of food. Each year about 80 percent of Minnesota's cottontail population dies from weather, predators or disease.

Waterfowl survey

According to the results of the annual Minnesota DNR spring waterfowl surveys, this year's mallard breeding population was estimated at 243,000, which is 18 percent above last year's estimate of 206,000 breeding mallards and 7 percent above the long-term average since 1968.

last year's estimate and 50 percent above the long-term average. The combined populations of other ducks such as ring-necked ducks, wood ducks, gadwalls, northern shovelers, canvasbacks and redheads is 208,000, which is 39 percent higher than last year and 17 percent above the long-term average.

The estimated number of wetlands is 221,000, unchanged from last year, and 13 percent below the long-term average. Wetland numbers vary with annual precipitation. The survey estimates the number of nesting ducks and geese and not those that migrate through. The survey covers 40 percent of Minnesota and includes much of the best breeding habitat. A DNR waterfowl biologist and pilot count waterfowl and wetlands along established survey routes by aerial surveys.

The survey begins in early May to coincide with the peak nesting activ-

ity of mallards. This year's Canada goose population was estimated at 202,000 geese, lower than last year's estimate of 250,000 geese. An additional 17,500 breeding Canada geese are in the Twin Cities area. The number of breeding Canada geese in the state is estimated via a helicopter survey in April. The survey includes most of the state except for the Twin Cities and counts Canada geese on randomly selected plots located in prairie, transition and forested areas.

Ask A Trooper: Fatal Crashes

by Sgt. Troy Christianson, Minnesota State Patrol

Question: There was a story in the news about a recent hit and run fatal crash where the State Patrol was looking for the public's help in locating the vehicle that fled. How many hit and run incidents are there in Minnesota and what is the law that covers this?

Answer: As a State Patrol public information officer, I will ask the media to assist us in identifying a driver or vehicle in a hit and run type incident.

Below are "Hit and Run" crash statistics from the past two years.

2014 "Hit and Run" Crashes

8 Fatal Crashes,
1,096 Personal Injury Crashes
5,972 Property Damage Crashes,
7,079 Total Crashes
8 Fatalities
1,407 Injuries

2015 "Hit and Run" Crashes:

12 Fatal Crashes
1,295 Personal Injury Crashes
6,118 Property Damage Crashes

7,425 Total Crashes
12 Fatalities
1,722 Injuries

As you can see, there are more than 7,000 reported hit and run crashes in Minnesota each year. If you are involved in a hit and run crash and the other vehicle leaves the scene, try to get a license plate number, make, model and color of the vehicle, driver description and direction of travel. Report this information as soon as possible to law enforcement, and we will attempt to locate that vehicle.

Minnesota state statute 169.09 says that the driver involved in a collision shall immediately stop the vehicle at the scene of the collision or as close to the scene as possible and investigate what was struck.

If the driver knows or has reason to know the collision resulted in injury or death or damage to another vehicle, the driver shall remain at the scene of the collision and give information. The driver of any motor vehicle shall give the driver's name, address, and date of birth and the registration plate number of the vehicle

being driven. The driver shall, upon request and if available, exhibit the driver's license or permit to drive to the individual struck or the driver or occupant of or individual attending any vehicle collided with. The driver also shall give the information and upon request exhibit the license or permit to any peace officer at the scene of the collision or who is investigating the collision. The driver shall render reasonable assistance to any individual injured in the collision.

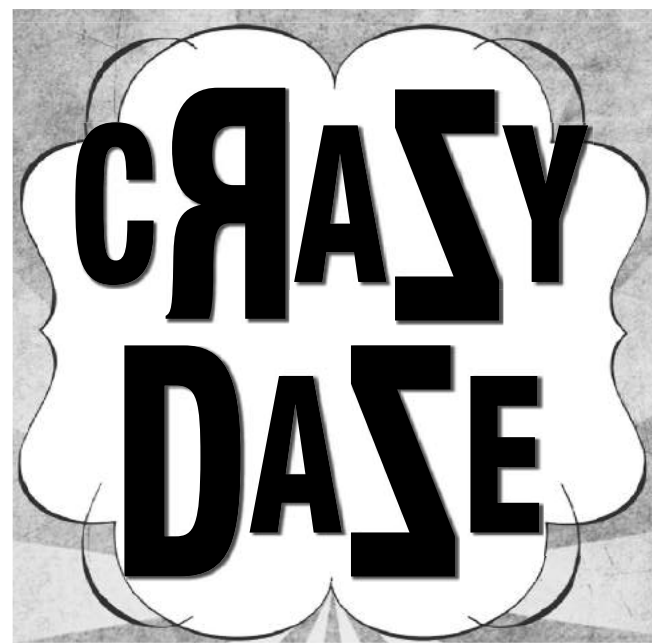

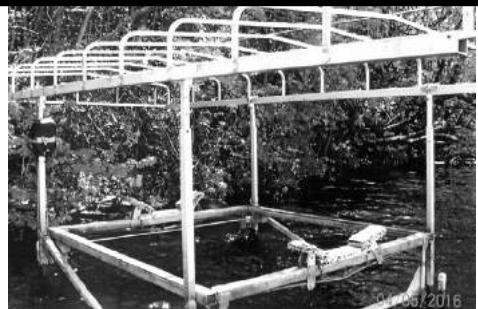

Crop conditions mixed across the region

When it comes to crop production, most long-term farm operators are often heard saying that "no two years are the same". That statement is certainly true in many portions of Southern Minnesota and Northern Iowa as it relates to the 2016 growing season, in comparison to the previous year. The 2015 crop year featured almost ideal growing conditions across the region, and resulted in record corn and soybean yields in both Minnesota and Iowa, as well as for many individual producers. The first half of the 2016 growing season has been much different with some areas dealing with very late planting, while other portions of the region have experienced a late frost, excessive rainfall, and hail damage.

In Southwest Minnesota, Northwest Iowa, and Eastern South Dakota, a considerable amount of 2016 corn was not planted until late May or early June, leaving the crop development well behind normal. From an agronomic standpoint a significant amount of corn in this region is two-three weeks or more behind normal development. This increases the likelihood that a large amount of corn could have maturity issues this Fall, and that the 2016 corn crop is much more susceptible to a normal or earlier than normal first frost. It also increases the odds of wetter corn at harvest, which will likely lead to higher corn drying costs this Fall.

Some of these same locations, as well as a large area in the Western portions of South Central Minnesota, were severely impacted by heavy rainfall events during mid-June,

which caused considerable drown-out damage in some areas. It was too late to replant corn acres at that point, but many farmers planted some early varieties of soybeans. However, some of those replanted soybeans have drowned-out again, due to heavy rainfall events in early July. In addition, there have been numerous severe storms across Southern and Western Minnesota that have featured hail and wind damage to crops. Some of the more extensive hail damage resulted in some replanting of soybeans. Similar to the late planted corn, farm operators that replanted soybeans will need to hope for a long growing season, and some favorable weather conditions in August and September.

In areas of the Upper Midwest that have not dealt with these weather challenges, crop conditions look good to excellent at most locations. Above normal growing degree units (GDU's), along with adequate soil moisture, has resulted in very favorable growing conditions in many areas. The accumulation of GDU's at the U of M Southern Minnesota Research Center totaled 1,121 GDU's from May 1st through July 8th, 2016, which is about 8 percent above the normal GDU accumulation of 1,034 on July 8th. By comparison, there were 982 GDU's accumulated by July 8th, 2015; 1,005 GDU's in 2014, and 985 GDU's in 2013. Much of the corn that was planted in April, and was not impacted by the severe weather in June, was beginning to tassel and pollinate by July 8th, under very favorable conditions.

June rainfall amounts were quite variable across the region, with some areas of Upper Midwest, receiving excessive amounts of rainfall during June, while other areas ended the month a bit dry. Total rainfall at the Waseca Research Center in the month of June was 4.75 inches, which nearly the same as the long-term average June rainfall. The total precipitation for 2016 through June 30th at Waseca is now at 13.68 inches, which is about 3 inches below normal. Many areas of Western South Central Minnesota received more than double their normal precipitation during the month of June, receiving 4-6 inches in single rainfall events. There are also some areas of Western Minnesota and the Eastern Dakota's that ended June quite dry. Fortunately, some widespread rainfall across the region in early July has alleviated most drought concerns for the time being.

In addition to drown-out damage, the frequent excessive rainfall amounts during the month of June have also resulted in shallow corn root development, as well as some leaching of available nitrogen in the soil profile. This has resulted in very uneven corn stands and some corn showing nitrogen deficiency in portions of fields. There are also areas with yellow, chlorotic-looking soybeans, due to the excessively wet soil conditions. Close to maximum levels of stored soil moisture exist in most areas of Southern Minnesota, so any major rainfall events can quickly result in large amount of standing water in crop fields.

Based on the weekly USDA Crop Progress Report for July 3rd, 75 percent of the corn and 70 percent of the soybeans in the United States were rated "good" to "excellent", and only 5 percent of the corn and 7 percent of the soybeans were rat-

ed "poor". In both Minnesota and Iowa, 79 percent of the corn was rated "good" to "excellent", with soybeans at 74 percent in Minnesota and 77 percent in Iowa rated in the higher categories. Only 3 percent of the corn and 4 percent of the soybeans in

Minnesota were rated in the "poor" category as of July 3rd, which could be a bit understated, given the weather challenges in many areas of South Central and Southwest Minnesota during June.

Farm operators face important FSA deadlines

Farm operators throughout Minnesota and the United States are facing two very important deadlines in the coming weeks at local USDA Farm Service Agency Offices. They are:

- Friday, July 15th is the final date for farm operators to report, or certify, their 2016 crop acres at local USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices. Also contact local FSA offices for questions on certifying late planted or replanted crop acres.

- August 1st, 2016 is the final date to enroll in the 2016 farm program at local FSA offices. Farm operators must enroll in the farm program each year to be eligible for farm program payments for that crop year. August 1st is also the deadline for farm operators to combine or separate farm units, or to make changes in their FSA Ad-

ministrative County for the 2016 crop year.

Failure to certify their crop acres by July 15th, or to enroll in the 2016 farm program by August 1st, could lead to farm operators being ineligible for potential 2016 farm program payments, which will be paid in October, 2017. This could be a very costly mistake, one that most farm operators can not afford in 2016-17.

In Minnesota, and most other Midwestern States, over 90 percent of corn and soybean crop base acres are enrolled in the ARC-CO program, which is based on county crop yields and national average commodity prices. If 2016 corn and soybean yields are close to county benchmark yields, or slightly above, farm operators are likely to earn a fairly substantial ARC-CO payment on their 2016 corn and soybean base

acres, based on current market year average (MYA) price projections for 2016-17. The 2016 ARC-CO payment levels will not be finalized until after September 1st, 2017, so a lot can change on the payment projections.

At current 2016-17 MYA crop price projections, farm operators that are in the price loss coverage (PLC) program option, which is based on price only, could also be likely to earn a 2016 farm program payment for some crops, including corn. The 2016 PLC payments will also be paid in October, 2017.
