I walked while having a heated argument with the temperature and inciting conflict with biting insects. An unseen skunk held me smellbound.

I watched soaring turkey vultures. A vulture's heart rate when soaring is about the same as it is when the bird is sleeping. A half-dozen blackbirds hammered upon a Cooper's hawk. There was no movie on that flight.

Earwigs star in folklore claiming they will crawl into your ear and lay eggs. They don't. Earwigs eat pests like aphids, mites and nematodes. They will chew on ornamental and vegetable plants, particularly dahlias, zinnias, hollyhocks, lettuce, strawberries, potatoes, roses, beans, beets and the silk of sweet corn. They are preyed upon by tachinid flies, centipedes, toads and some birds.

American Eagle: A Visual History of Our National Emblem

Preston Cook of Wabasha donated over 25,000 items, depicting eagles in culture, politics and history, from his collection to the National Eagle Center in Wabasha. How does one get started in collecting things portraying eagles, which have been used to advertise everything from mattresses, underwear, cornflakes and embalming fluid? Preston saw a movie, "A Thousand Clowns," in which Murray Burns, played by Jason Robards, said, "You can never have too many eagles."

Maren Ring of Albert Lea asked if catbirds mate for life. They are essentially monogamous during the breeding season, but pair bonds don't necessarily persist from one year to the next.

"What would puncture eggs in a nest?" There are many suspects: house wren, brown-headed cowbird, house sparrow, red-headed woodpecker, gray catbird and others. There are many animals that eat bird eggs: crows, jays, magpies, grackles, squirrels, humans, snakes, raccoons, weasels, deer, skunks, cats and those dreaded others once again.

Norm Fredin of Albert Lea asked about the nesting habits of house wrens. When it comes time to nest, wrens search out cavities. If you hang several nest boxes, a male will prepare a number of potential nests for a female's consideration, stuff-

ing available cavities with twigs. She chooses one and finishes the nest herself, a cup-shaped depression built atop the twigs, lined with softer material including fine grasses, hair, moss or bits of string and debris. The female

lays 3-10 eggs and she alone incubates them. The young hatch in 9-16 days and fledge in 15-17 days. They often have two broods.

Gordy Toenges of Alden asked why we have more vultures than in ward turkey vulture.

'Let us praise the noble turkey vulture: no one envies him; he harms nobody; and he contemplates our little world from a most serene and noble height." Abbey also penned, "If my decomposing carcass nourishes the roots of a juniper tree or the wings of a vulture — that is immortality enough for me. And as much as anyone de-

> wrote, "Like large dark lazy butterflies they sweep over the glades looking for death, to eat it, to make it vanish, to make of it the miracle: resurrection."

Several accounts from the late 1800s indicated vultures were locally abundant throughout many parts of Minnesota. T.S. Roberts, a physician known for his ornithological work, wrote this

about the turkey vulture in 1932, "was formerly more common in Minnesota" and "still to be seen in fair numbers throughout the state." Increases in human settlement, expanded agriculture, human disturbance and human persecution all likely contributed to this decline. Turkey vultures are seen in every county in Minnesota. The growth in its range and population is attributed to expanded road miles, increased deer populations, openings created by logging activity and warming temperatures. These changes facilitated movement, provided a steady supply of carrion for food and increased survival of vultures.

How much down payment do I need?

Buying a home is an integral part of the American Dream, but for some it seems impossible - the thought of having to come up with 20-25% of the purchase price can be daunting! However, many wouldbe buyers are unaware that there are loan programs where the down payment can be as low as 3%, or there may be no down payment requirement at all.

What is a debt-to-income ratio?

The loan type that you might qualify for depends on several financial factors, including your current debts and credit history, your credit rating, your income, and debt-to-income

Your DIR is the total of all monthly debt payments divided by your gross monthly income. This enables your lender to measure your ability to repay your loan. Generally, lenders do not like to go above a 43% debt to income ratio, but there may be exceptions to this rule if there are other positive factors in the buy-

tion is accepted or rejected, your lender must show that it made a good faith determination as to whether you have the financial ability to repay the loan.

What sort of loans are available with little or no down payment?

The good news is that there are several loan programs in this category!

A DVA loan is a 100% mortgage loan guaranteed by Dept of Veterans Affairs, enabling veterans and active service members become home owners without the need of a down payment. The buyer may choose any lender who works with this type of loan, as the government does not actually make the loans, just guarantees the loans made by the lender. There is a funding fee of 1%-3.5% which can be rolled into the loan amount or paid in cash at the time of closing. In certain situations. the funding fee may be waived, please check with your lender for further information.

Rural development loans (USDA loans) are er's situation. Regardless of available in many areas

whether your loan applica- outside of big cities. These 100% loans require no down payment because the USDA guarantees the mortgages, protecting the lenders if the buyer should default. There is a guarantee fee which can be rolled into the loan - and this is the only loan type that also allows closing costs to be added to the loan. The USDA does require mortgage insurance.

There are low down payment FHA-insured loans for first time home owners, or those who have not owned a property for three years or more. Basic requirements include a credit score of at least 640, and a 3.5% down payment. Mortgage insurance, which can range up to 1% of the loan amount, is usually required with this type of loan, and there is an income limit in order for a buyer to become eligible.

If you are currently renting, and have a good credit history, your dream of owning your own home may be closer to fulfillment than you think - check out your situation with a lender, you may be pleasantly sur-

A recipe for BLTs???

I thought I knew how to make BLTS, one of my summer favorites with those garden fresh tomatoes but there is always room for improvement. I discovered when I found a recipe for a BLT. So see what you think!

BLT Sandwiches:

1 # smoked bacon 1/2 cup Hellmann's mayonnaise 8 slices thick cut bread (your preference) 1/2 herb mayo (recipe follows) 8 leaves of lettuce tomato, sliced salt and freshly ground pepper

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees.

Arrange the bacon slices on one or two baking sheets. Bake until desired crispness is reached, about 20 minutes, drain on paper towels.

Spread a small amount of plain mayonnaise on both sides of each slice of bread. Heat skillet over medium heat and toast the bread on both sides until crispy and brown, 1-2 minutes per side.

lay out four slices of toast and spread each with one tablespoon of the herb mayo, layer lettuce, bacon and tomato slices on top and season to taste with salt and pepper. Spread each of the remaining 4 slices of toast with the 1 tablespoon of the herb mayo and place mayo-side down on the toppings to form four BLT's. Slice each in half and serve.

Herb Mayo

1 cup Hellmann's mayonnaise

1 small garlic clove

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

2 Tablespoons minced fresh chives

1 Tablespoon minced fresh flat leaf parsley

1 Tablespoon minced fresh dill

1 1/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice

1/2 tsp. paprika

1/2 tsp. white pepper

Place the mayonnaise in a medium bowl. Mince the garlic on a cutting board, then add a couple pinches of salt to it. Tilt the knife at an angle, and scrape it over the mixture several times to work it into a paste. Add it to the mayonnaise along with the remaining salt, chives, parsley, dill, lemon juice, paprika and white pepper. Stir until well combined. Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours before serving.

USDA extends deadline for reporting MN spring planted crops

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is extending the deadline to file crop acreage reports for agricultural producers in Minnesota impacted by flooding and heavy moisture. The new July 22nd deadline applies to reporting spring-seeded crops to USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) county offices and federal crop insurance agents.

"Agriculture operations throughout the state have been hit hard by heavy rains and flooding that have affected their operations," said Joe Martin, FSA State Executive Director in Minnesota. "The deadline extension provides more flexibility for producers who experienced planting and field work delays."

Filing a timely crop acreage report is impor-

tant to maintaining eligibility for USDA conservation, disaster assistance, safety net, crop insurance and farm loan programs. A crop acreage report documents all crops and their intended uses and is an important part of recordkeeping for your farm or ranch.

Producers filing reports with FSA county offices are encouraged to set up an appointment before visiting the office. Acreage reports from producers in Minnesota who set up appointments before the

July 22nd deadline are considered timely filed, even if the appointment occurs after the deadline.

The following exceptions apply to acreage reporting:

- If the crop has not been planted by the reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.
- If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendars days after purchasing or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

But numerous factors at these events can lead to heat exhaustion or heatstroke, which is why Mayo Clinic Health System is reminding people of some easy preventive steps to stay cool.

"Heatstroke is usually due to prolonged exposure to high temperatures or physical exertion in high temperatures," said Dr. Brian Bartlett, vice-chair of clinical practice, hospital specialties, at Mayo Clinic Health System. "Heatstroke occurs when the body

Parade and festival sea- reaches a temperature of confusion, altered speech, nausea or vomiting, rapid breathing and a racing heartbeat, among other symptoms."

The good news is that heatstroke is often predictable and preventable. Take these steps to prevent heatstroke during hot weather:

- Wear loose fitting, lightweight clothing. Wearing excess clothing or clothing that fits tightly won't allow your body to cool properly.
- · Protect against sunburn. Sunburn affects your body's ability to cool itself, so protect yourself outdoors with a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses and use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of at least 15. Apply sunscreen generously, and reapply every two

hours - or more often if you're swimming or sweat-

- Drink plenty of fluids. Staying hydrated will help your body sweat and maintain a normal body temperature.
- Take extra precautions with certain medications. Be on the lookout for heatrelated problems if you take medications that can affect your body's ability to stay hydrated and dissipate
- Never leave anyone in a parked car. This is a common cause of heat-related deaths in children. When parked in the sun, the temperature in your car can rise 20 degrees F (more than 6.7 C) in 10 minutes. It's not safe to leave a person in a parked car in warm or hot weather, even if the windows are cracked or the car

is in shade. When your car is parked, keep it locked to prevent a child from getting inside.

- Take it easy during the hottest parts of the day. If you can't avoid strenuous activity in hot weather, drink fluids and rest frequently in a cool spot. Try to schedule exercise or physical labor for cooler parts of the day, such as early morning or evening.
- Get acclimated. Limit time spent working or exercising in heat until vou're conditioned to it. People who are not used to hot weather are especially susceptible to heat-related illness. It can take several weeks for your body to adjust to hot weather.
- Be cautious if you're at increased risk. If you take medications or have a condition that increases your risk of heat-related problems, avoid the heat and act quickly if you notice symptoms of overheating. If you participate in a strenuous sporting event or activity in hot weather, make sure there are medical services available in case of a heat emergency.

If heatstroke does occur, the condition requires emergency treatment. Untreated heatstroke can quickly damage your brain, heart, kidneys and muscles.

The damage worsens the longer treatment is delayed, increasing your risk of serious complications or death.

Seek medical treatment immediately if you experience these symptoms:

- High body tempera-
- Altered mental state or behavior. Confusion, agitation, slurred speech, irritability, delirium, seizures and coma can all result from heatstroke.
- Alteration in sweating. In heatstroke brought on by hot weather, your skin will feel hot and dry to the touch. However, in heatstroke brought on by strenuous exercise, your skin may feel dry or slightly moist.
- Nausea and vomiting. You may feel sick to your stomach or vomit.
- Flushed skin. Your skin may turn red as your body temperature increases.
- Rapid breathing. Your breathing may become rapid and shallow.
- Racing heart rate. Your pulse may significantly increase because heat stress places a tremendous burden on your heart to help cool your body.
- Headache. Your head may throb.

SUMMARY PUBLICATION OF CITY OF CEYLON ORDINANCE NO. 2019-1

The City Council of the City of Ceylon has adopted Ordinance 2019-1 on the 9th day of July, 2019.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING CHAPTER 9, TAXING DISTRICT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL SERVICE DISTRICTS AND URBAN SERVICE DISTRICTS

This ordinance establishes separate taxing districts for the purpose of all municipal taxes, except those levied for the payment of bonds and judgments, and interest thereon. Separate districts shall be known as the "Rural Service District" and "Urban Service District". Properties designated as Rural Service District properties are identified in this ordinance and the ratio of benefits to land within the Rural Service District compared to land of like market value situated within the Urban Service District shall be 25 percent.




