Answer: I have responded to and investigated a number of train/ vehicle crashes in my career. A majority of them resulted in fatal or serious injuries to the vehicle occupants. In Minnesota, failure to yield the right of control device, improper turn and inattention and impatience are cited as the most common factors contributing to motor ve-

The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) has worked to share the following rail safety tips:

1. Yield the right-of-way to trains at highway-rail crossings. It's the law.







Gazpacho Salad

Is it hot enough outside for you?

These warm days certainly call for salad! I have visited our farmer's market the last two weeks and bought nice fresh cucumbers and green peppers. We are getting ripe tomatoes from our own two plants every day. It's such a treat having fresh veggies - there is nothing better. 



Common mullein does well in acidic soil. Purslane prefers rich soil with high phosphorus content. Quackgrass and plantain prosper in heavy clay or compacted soil. Oxalis or wood sorrel grows well in soil that is low in calcium and high in educates. Naturally. magnesium.
