



Shoe repair shops were at one time quite common. If you went into a shoe repair shop, some of the pieces of equipments you might see that were used by shoe repairmen in their shops included foot treadle sewing machines, stitching machines, leather cutting machines, riveting machines, shoe anvils, and bins of pre-cut leather, soles, shoe lifts, nails, rivets and other supplies. These are items that most people today very likely have no idea as to what they might look like or how they are used.

In the past, shoe repair work could be a lifetime profession. One of those individuals that devoted his life's work to shoe re-

(These are the ones her puppy sitter, Pat Rose, made for her)

2 cups whole wheat flour

- 1/2 cup oatmeal
- 1 Tbsp baking powder
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1/4 cup water if dough seems too dry to roll out





169.56 **AUXILIARY** of vehicles with all four LIGHTS. Subd. 2. Fog **lights on while driving** light. Any motor vehicle may be equipped with not to exceed two fog lamps mounted on the front at when they are coming at a height not less than 12 inches nor more than 30 inches above the level surif the lights are within the face upon which the vehicle stands. High-beams simply light up the fog and can make it difficult to see. Fog lights light up the road *mn.us*

below the fog. The fog light reflectors are designed to spread the beam wider for a shorter distance.

Make sure all of your markers, directionals, parking lights and low/ high-beam lights are working. Remember to turn on your headlights in the rain. Use the fog lights only when you have very low visibility, and don't forget to turn them off when the fog has lifted. Even though it may be legal, it can make visibility to the other drivers difficult.





Naturally By Al Batt

The morning chorus woke me early and summoned me from my bed. Male birds were yelling at other male birds, "Get off my dawn!"

Catbirds gobbled green elderberries. Rose-breasted grosbeaks sang. They are one of few bird species to sing on the nest. The female sings when building the nest, incubating and brooding. The male sings quietly from the nest and loudly from other perches.



Crows gathered together in the middle of the road. Were they velcrows? No, they were chowing down on road kill.

I took a walkabout in New Richland. I looked down at ants scurrying about on the sidewalk. When I'd worked in Arizona recently, a friend told me that The Grand Canyon State was home to 318 species of ants. I recall reading something, I think it was from Carleton, saying that Minnesota has 102 ant species.

The trees weren't the only things holding up the sky. A good number of chimney swifts were flying overhead. The chattering of the flying cigars not only made me look up, it made me feel up.

Four-leaf clovers

A Polish proverb says, "When opportunity knocks, some people are out in the backyard looking for four-leaf clovers.'

I don't think that applies when eating lunch.

Brice, a student in a writing class I taught, found a four-leaf clover on campus while he ate lunch outside.

Leaves of clovers and alfalfa typically have three leaflets per leaf, but sometimes have four or five. The frequency of four or more leaflets per leaf is influenced by the genetic makeup of the plant and the growing environment. Because they occur relatively infrequently, fourleaf clovers are said to impart good luck. It has been estimated that there are approximately 10,000 three-leaf clovers for every four-leaf clover.

Firebirds

Researchers have preliminary evidence of Australian birds spreading fires in order to force prey from protected areas. The brown falcon and black kite are believed to pick up smoldering material, and fly it to new locations. The birds regularly hunt at the edges of fires, but such blazes aren't always positioned over food sources. Moving the fires to areas with a heavy concentration of prey creates an opportunity to hunt frogs, reptiles, insects and mice.

Bee concerned

A Purdue University study has found that honevbees collect the vast majority of their pollen from plants other than crops, even in areas dominated by corn and soybeans. The pollen comes from residential lawns, home gar-

The most common chemical products found in pollen were fungicides and herbicides, typical crop disease and weed management products. "How long does it take a robin to fledge?" Robin eggs are incubated for about two weeks before hatching and fed in the nest for another two weeks. Young robins jump from nests before they can fly and run on the ground, begging food from parents for an additional two weeks before becoming capable of sustained flight.

Harvey Berg of Waseca said that the cardinals that once nested in his yard are now nesting in his neighbor's yard. Harvey wondered how he might

"Could I raise a turkey vulture to keep as a pet?" By law, a person cannot keep one in captivity. The exceptions are zoos and wildlife rehabilitators that hold permits. Turkey vultures are one of my favorites.

cret of flight from a bird from a magician. After and know what to look for, you see things that you did not notice when you did not know exactly what to look for." Wilbur studied the turkey vulture's dihedral flight to learn how to achieve stability in the design of their first successful airplane. A group of vultures is called a venue.

"Are bird songs instinctive or learned?" Some birds like ducks, geese, hawks and herons hatch knowing what sounds to make. The true singers are passerine species called the oscines--orioles, sparrows, thrushes and warblers. They learn to sing, beginning to learn as nestlings listening to adults.



"Even if the vehicle appears to be running normally, ignoring the warning light could result in more costly repairs," adds White. "At the very least, the light could be alerting you to an engine problem that is negatively impacting fuel economy and costing you money."

Service and Solutions

When scheduling service, make sure the repair shop that examines your vehicle has professional technicians who are trained and certified in OBDII diagnosis and repair. The technician will connect your vehicle's computer system to a diagnostic scan tool, which will provide trouble codes indicating why the check engine light was activated. While the diagnostic tool is connected, the technician can analyze data streams such as the idle speed, throttle response, engine temperature, fuel system pressure, manifold vacuum, exhaust emission levels and many other key indicators. Once the problem is identified and the repair is made, the car's computer is reset.

Conventional wisdom for old cars said oils with higher weight numbers had a thicker viscos- 10W-30 simply because it ity that would make them better for hot weather and hard driving while lighter weight oils were better for cold weather.

The newest engines are often designed to use only one specific oil with a weight number that may be unfamiliar, such as 0W-20 or 0W-40. Doing something like substituting "heavy duty" 20W-50 for 0W-20 in the summer could quickly result in big repair bills.


Oil does much more these days than simply lubricate and cool the engine. Engine oil may act like a hydraulic fluid in entiming, cylinder deactivation or other new systems in the owners manual.

Putting the wrong oil in your engine could cost you much more money down the road. 

Crop conditions mixed across the region

been a battle for some upper Midwest crop producers, as they have tried to get corn and sovbeans planted on a timely basis. Some favorable weather in late May and the first few days of June allowed significant planting progress in the some regions of the Corn Belt; however, a significant amount of planted in Southwest Minnesota, Northwest Iowa, and Southeast South Dakota as well as in portions of the Eastern Corn Belt and Southeastern United States. Heavy rains over in the past couple of weeks have caused further planting delays in these regions, in addition to resulting in drown-out damage in other locations across the Upper Midwest.

Many areas of Minnesota received significant rainfall during late May, with some areas receiving 2-4 inches or more during that period. This has resulted standing water in numerous fields along with some hail damage from severe storms. Farm operators have been monitoring the situation and evaluating plant populations, in order to determine how much replantthe fields dry out. The rainfall has been welcome in areas of the Upper Midwest that had been fairly dry throughout most of the Spring. The expected warmer temperatures in the next couple of weeks, together with adequate soil moisture should lead to some improved grow-

ing conditions. Total rainfall amounts across Minnesota during

and Outreach Center at Waseca recorded only 3.73 inches of rainfall during May, with the largest rainfall event being less than one inch. However many other areas of Southwest, South Central, and Central Minnesota had much higher rainfall totals during May, with many areas receiving 2-3 inches of soybeans remain to be rainfall in a 24-hour period. Based on the May 29th USDA Crop Progress Report, 99 percent of both Minnesota and Iowa's corn was planted, compared to a five-year (2011-2015) average of 92 percent in Minnesota and 96 percent in Iowa. Nationally, 94 percent of the corn was planted by May 29th which is slightly above the five-year average. Seventythe month of May were eight percent of the corn quite variable. The Spring of 2016 has sity of Minnesota Research as of May 29th, which is 4 percent ahead of normal. Nationwide, 72 percent of the corn crop was rated in good to excellent condition, with only 4 percent rated in poor condition.

The May 29th USDA Report showed 95 percent of the soybeans planted in Minnesota, which well ahead of the five-year average of 70 percent planted. Iowa had 88 percent of the intended soybeans planted by May 25th, compared to a five year average of 78 percent. The 2016 soybean planting progress is actually ahead of 2015 planting progress in both States; however most of the area that remains to be planted is in the highly productive area of Southwest Minnepercent Seventy-three of the U.S. soybean crop was planted by May 29th, which is slightly above the five-year average of 66 percent of the soybeans planted by that date.

The Final Planting Date for corn in the southern two-thirds of Minnesota, as well as in all of Iowa, receive full crop insurance coverage for 2016. The Late Planting Period for corn is June 1st-25th, with a reduction in the insurpercent for each day that corn planting is delayed past May 31st. For soybeans, the Final Planting Date is June 10th in Minnesota and June 15th in Iowa, with the Final Planting Date extending for 25 days until July 5th in Minnesota and until July 10th in Iowa. For crops planted after the final dates for the Late Planting Period, crop insurance coverage is set at a maximum of 60 per-

In other research, Laura analyzed rabbit and jackrabbit bones from an 800-year-old archaeological site in Arizona to study the impact traditional agricultural practices had on small mammals.
