

A. L. Ward's Account of Early Martin County Guest Columnist

haps one of the most influential people in Martin County's history in terms of his contributions to the development of both Fairmont and Martin County. Ward spent 67 years in Martin County, during which time he was a farmer, a banker, a lawyer, and a businessman, as well as serving in a number of public offices. He was obviously an entrepreneur well ahead of his time. The following is a synopsis

of his account of pioneer days in Martin County from the August 6, 1926 issue of the Martin County Independent and why he chose to leave New York State to come to Fairmont.

Ward Fairmont in the early 1860s as being on the frontier with a line of forts, called stockades, from the north at Fort Ridgely running south to Fort Dodge, Iowa. Fairmont was the central point between them. These forts were generally made of logs and sod with a detachment of cavalry and infantry being stationed at each.

Cream of Asparagus Soup

Soup in the summer?

I usually think of soup as being a fall and winter dish, but in the last few years, I have seen recipes for cold fruit soups. These soups use fresh fruit, yogurt and juice of some sort and they're served for a brunch or dessert. Then there are vegetable soups served cold using fresh veggies with a tomato juice base and spices. Today I am sharing a recipe that can be served either cold or hot - your choice. It's equally good served either way. I hope that you agree!

Cream of Asparagus Soup:

2 lbs asparagus, trimmed, cut off tips (set aside) and cut stalks into 2 inch chunks

6 Tbsp butter 1 cup coarsely chopped onion 6 Tbsp flour 2 cans chicken broth 2 cups half and half 1 Tbsp dill weed salt and pepper to taste

Steam asparagus tips in small amount of water for 1 minute; cool in ice water, drain and set aside. Melt butter. Add chopped asparagus stalks and onion; cook for 8-10 minutes until onion and asparagus tender, add flour, cook 2-3 minutes, then add broth and cook for 10 minutes. Puree in small batches in blender, then add half and half, return to soup pot, add dill weed, salt and pepper, reheat gently, add cooked asparagus tips. Serve hot or cold.

"Why are grackles pooping on my sidewalk?' You've offended them. Not really. In the Rio Grande Valley of Texas, great-tailed grackles are so numerous that they darken the sky and whiten sidewalks. Their fly-by pooping is a result of a need to go. Everybody goes. At this time of the year, the common grackles aren't bombarding your sidewalk with their own droppings. It's routine nestkeeping. Baby grackles produce waste in mostly white, fecal sacks that the parents carry away from the nest, targeting a specific bombing site, which oddly enough is seldom a Target store. They sell diapers there. The next big thing will be grackle diapers. Grackles want to hide nest locations from predators. Dropping the fecal sacks into water disperses the fecal matter and reduces the smell. Sidewalks might resemble water, especially after a rain. 



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

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Ask A Trooper: DUI **Restrictions** in Canada

by Sgt. Troy Christianson, MN State Patrol

Question: I am planning a fishing trip to Canada and one of my friends was arrested for DUI a few months ago, is he able to get into Canada with a DUI on his record?

Answer: Driving under the influence of alcohol is a serious offence in Canada and the officer can refuse you entry into Canada if you have been convicted of this. This can be fixed via one of two methods depending on the length of time passed since the conviction.

convictions less than 5 years old: An application for a Temporary Resident Permit (TRP) will allow travel into Canada for business and/or pleasure.

Option 2: For DUI Canadian airport and Convictions over 5 years old: A rehabilitation permit may be applied for allowing permanent hassle free travel into Canada.

Regardless of the nature of any conviction whether it be a DUI, misdemeanor or felony, all alcohol related convictions are treated seriously. It is always best to tell the truth when speaking with a Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) officer because if a lie is uncovered you may be refused entry into Canada in the future and they will also do an extensive search on your vehicle.

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

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
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
