

### **Fairmont Community Center update**

It has been several months since the Fairmont Community Center Action Committee last updated the readers of the Photo Press on the progress of the Fairmont Area Community Center. It has been a very busy time for the committee with many exciting developments taking place. Our committee continues to meet every three weeks, and now, we are also using smaller subcommittees to focus on specific projects.

meaningful Our achievements thus far in 2018 include hiring RJM Construction as the contractor on the project. They have been working closely with our hired architect (JLG) to ensure cost estimates for our community center are not just guesses, but rather thoroughly vetted and detailed construction cost estimates. RJM has also partnered with Tech Builders, which ensures local company involvement in the construction of this project.

JLG has also partnered with Bolton & Menk, an-

other local firm who has assisted in site surveying and other civil engineering aspects of the project.

In April we hired Ballard King & Associates, who is a consulting firm specializing in recreation and sports facilities. Ballard King has been meeting with part of our committee to prepare their operational study for the community center project. This field study will give the committee important information about what components and amenities are critical for a functional and sustainable community center. They will also provide detailed information about the demographics of the area so we garner insight into who will use the facility. With this information, we can then tailor our business plan to maximize operational efficiencies while offering a transformational recreational experience for local citizens. We want to build a community center that is economical to operate for many years to come. Ballard King's study will be invaluable

towards that end.

We have also been active in developing partnership opportunities for this project. We've had very productive meetings with the City of Fairmont, the Fairmont School District and Martin County. We are also pleased to announce that we have been working closely with leadership from Mayo Clinic Health System in Fairmont. Specifically, we have identified the open field next to the hospital as our desired site location. We are also reviewing options for Mayo Clinic's to be a health and wellness partner for the community center.

As you can see, a lot is happening. If you would like to speak with our committee about how you could get engaged on this project we would love to hear from you. We will need many more local partners joining the effort before this project is completed. We expect to have a project plan, budget and design to show you by the Martin County Fair! Stay tuned!

### **Tractor Supply breaks** ground in Fairmont

Tractor Supply Company has begun construction on a retail store in Fairmont. Construction on the store, located at 1215 N. State St., began in March with a goal of opening this summer.

With the addition of our new location, we're able to ensure the Fairmont community is fully equipped with the

products they need."

The Fairmont Tractor Supply plans to hire 12 to 15 employees with firsthand knowledge and expertise in caring for pets, livestock and land.

At the store, customers will be able to shop a wide selection of products at a great value including workwear and boots, tractor and trailer parts and accessories, lawn and garden supplies, sprinkler and irrigation parts, power tools, fencing, welding and pump supplies, riding mowers and more. The Fairmont store will also carry a wide variety of food and supplies for pets, equine and livestock, as well as a pet wash station where customers will have access to professional grade wash bays, grooming tables and tools. The Tractor Supply team will also seek to support pet

adoption initiatives, area

4-H clubs and FFA chapters, county fairs and livestock shows.

R.E. Crawford will construct the 25,334-squarefoot retail space. The store plans include a sales floor, external support service area and pet wash station.

The store opening, which is expected to occur in the summer, will kick off with a four-day Grand Opening celebration, during which customers can sign up for Tractor Supply's loyalty program, Neighbor's Club. By registering, customers will receive member-only offers, birthday offers, personal purchase summaries and receipt-free

It is the match-up that counts. If they lose on a regular basis, the joke always comes out that they are going to claim the other dice shakers as dependents on their income taxes. If someone has been ill and in the

hospital, it is a big event for them to come to the cafe for coffee. There is always the WELCOME HOME for them as well as people who have been gone from the community for a period of time, like people that go south for the winter. The hard time that you are given when returning to the coffee shop is a special greeting. It means you were missed and they are happy to have you home and back at it. It is a caring act.

I have been going to coffee in our community for over 40 years. I have seen a number of people operate our local cafe; the Clausens, the Rices, the Strombergs, the Schultzes and now the Jacobsons. The cafe is a very important part of any community like ours. It is the meeting place, a place where many

people go for coffee even though they do not drink coffee. Some people drink tea on a regular basis and our local blacksmith drinks ice tea year round. Can you believe the cold, long walk from his shop on a cold winter day, facing a hard northwest wind, to drink ice tea? Going to the cafe is more than that. It is a part of being alive and being with the flow of the community. To me it is such a compliment for someone to ask you to go for coffee. It means something special. When my family comes home they always want to go to the cafe for coffee. What is it that draws the people to this place? It is the cozy feeling, the belonging, the jokes, and the

friendships. It is special in a

truly country way. We love

it that way!

Mayo Clinic Health System in Fairmont officials expect the transition will take place by December 1st, 2018. The same providers and nurses from the Clinic at Walmart will help staff Urgent Care.

Urgent Care covers the services available at The Clinic at Walmart, such as treatment of allergies, bladder infections, ear and eye infections, strep throat and rashes. However, Urgent Care also handles sameday minor medical treatment for back and muscle pain, cuts and minor burns, ear aches, skin conditions, sprains and joint pain, upper respiratory infections and bronchitis.

Express Care remains available through Mayo Clinic's Patient Online Services portal as a convenient, online care option for 14 common conditions for patients ages 18 months through 75 years.


