



# **Chocolate Fudge Cake**

- 1 chocolate cake mix
- 1 fudge brownie mix
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup oil
- 1 1/4 cups water

Mix all together. Pour into a prepared bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 55-60 minutes.

# The Re-potting plants A potted plant can collect pests such as collect pests such as

scales, aphids, spider mites and mealy bugs as they sit scales, aphids, spider mites outside all summer. To get it ready to come indoors for the winter, slide the plant and rootball from the old pot, and gently wash away all the soil from the roots. Swish the plants and its roots in warm, soapy water to remove pests, checking thoroughly; then rinse. Place the plant into new soil in a clean pot.



# "Book Talk" on World War I at Red Rock Center

The Martin County Historical Society & Red Rock Center for the Arts invites the public to a book talk on the World War I pride and prejudice that divided people across Minnesota, on November 8th. Patriot Hearts: World War I Pride and Prejudice in a Minnesota County was published by the Goodhue County Historical Society in June 2017. Minnesota's turbulent World War I years produced bloody conflict abroad and divisive ethnic and political tensions at home. Famed U.S. Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis, noted Minnesota's "policy of repression" that resulted in the nation's "most serious cases" of civil rights suppression. In his carefully researched study, historian Frederick Johnson retells this largely forgotten 1917-18 Minnesota story in microcosm, using the example of Goodhue, the state's most ethnically and politically polarized county.

Johnson's talk is based on a wide range of primary sourced reports that detail verbal and physical attacks on German Americans and political rivals, nine indictments with four convictions for treason, courtroom impro-

The Martin County Historical Society & Red Rock Center for the Arts invites the public to a book talk on the World War I pride and prejudice that divided people across Minnesota, prieties, coercive Liberty Bond sales, and the use of martial law. After the talk, attendees may purchase copies of Patriot Hearts and have them signed by the author.

Frederick Johnson has to his credit twelve books about Minnesota history along with numerous magazine articles in respected journals including Minnesota History, Aviation History, Minnesota Genealogist, Minn-Post, and MNopedia. The American Association for State and Local History gave his 2008 book Richfield: Minnesota's Oldest Suburb a special award for exceptional scholarship. Johnson's The Big Water (Deep Haven Press, 2013) has been called the "definitive" history of Minnesota's famed Lake Minnetonka.



# Fall harvest season behind normal

started later than normal in most areas of the Upper Midwest in 2017, and has incurred further delays due to wetter than normal weather during October in many areas. Harvest progress picked up in some areas of the region during the latter portions of the month, but remains well behind average progress. The first three weeks October did feature above temperatures. normal which aided in the field dry-down of the corn and soybeans. Some portions of the Midwest received significant rainfall the first half of October, as well as additional rain or snow month, which has greatly delayed harvest progress in many areas.

As of October 23rd, the weekly USDA Crop Progress Report listed 83

The 2017 soybean yields in many areas have not reached the record soybean yield levels that numerous farm operators experienced in 2016; however, 2017 yields have exceeded the expectations of most producers, given the highly variable growing season in 2017. Early reports of 2017

corn yields in Southern Minnesota have been a pleasant surprise in many the corn crop had been areas. a grain temperature of 50 degrees F., can be stored in temporary flat storage for approximately 30 days without damage, provided there is an aeration system in place to move grain temperature of 40 degrees, the allowable storage time increases to approximately 60 days at 22 percent grain moisture content, and to about 140 days at 19 percent moisture. However, the allowable storage time drops to only 12 days at a corn cent moisture and a grain and to 35 days at a temperature of 40 degrees. The allowable safe storage time tion is available.
