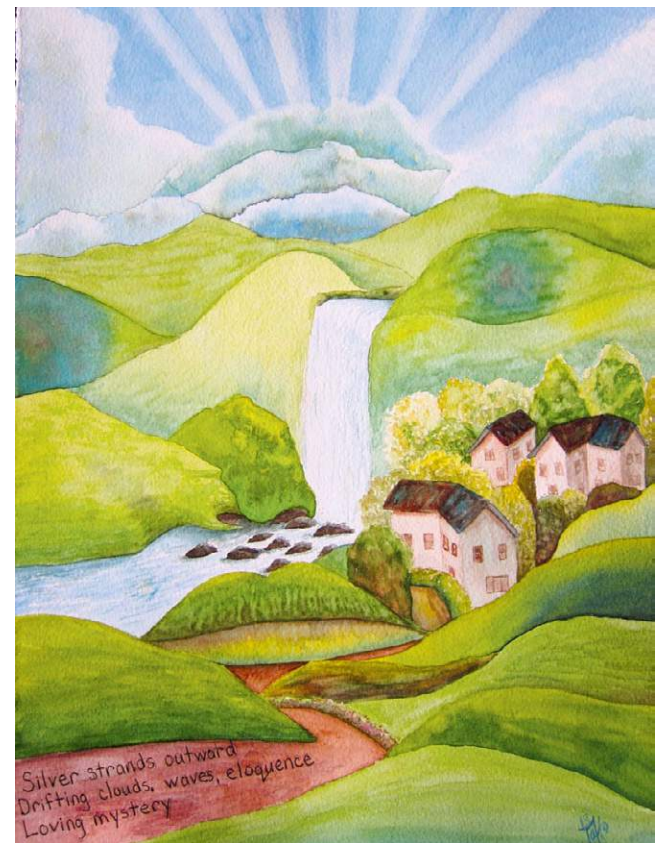
Red Rock's October Artist

Mabel Hall - Ahead of Her Time

In today's society women have opportunities that were unheard of a generation ago. Today, women hold positions in medicine, engineering, business, and government. Although it may still be questioned, legitimately so, that women still don't have equal opportunities to their male counterparts, compared to the past they have made giant strides.

In that respect, there are many individuals that have contributed to the rich heritage of Martin County. If asked to name some of those individuals that have helped to shape Martin County, the names first mentioned will likely be male. However, there have been a number of women that have made very positive contributions to the history of Martin County. One woman that was undoubtedly ahead of her time was Mabel Hall, and her accomplishments well preceded the days of women's lib.

Mabel Hall was born in Fraser Township, Martin County, in 1886. She attended country school and worked for her room and board while attending Fairmont High School and graduating in 1905. Following graduation from high school she taught in a country school for one year. She then took correspondence courses from the University of Minnesota and the University of

Wisconsin before obtaining her teaching certificate from Mankato State Teachers College. Following graduation from college, she taught in a number of country schools in Minnesota and then became a principal in Bricelyn, Minnesota. While in Bricelyn, she organized their first athletic team.

In 1920, she became assistant superintendent of Martin County schools. When the superintendent retired in 1923, she ran for Superintendent of Martin County Schools as this was at that time an elected position. She was elected

and served in that capacity for twelve years. During her tenure as superintendent, she was required by law to visit each of the 125 country schools in the county at least twice annually. She fulfilled her duty, and more, by visiting each country school at least four times annually. Considering road conditions and transportation at that time, that was certainly a feat in and of itself!

Then, in 1935, she assumed the position of

Martin County Clerk of Probate Court. She held that position until she retired in 1973 at the age of 87.



She was also very civic minded playing an instrumental role in the Fairmont chapter of Business and Professional Women remaining active in that organization for thirty-nine years. During that time, she held all local and a number of state offices, including being state president for two years. She was honored on her 100th birthday as being designated National Mabel Hall Day by the National Federation of BPW. She was also a Sunday School Teacher, Superintendent at the Fairmont Congregational Church, and worked with Campfire Girls groups.

Mabel Hall, the last living member of the Fairmont High School Class of 1905, passed away on April 11th, 1991, at the age of 104.

It seems that Mabel Hall never outwardly advocated for women's liberation or equal rights. Rather, she simply modeled what could be accomplished in her day to day life, not allowing any form of "glass ceiling" to limit her achievements. She is but one of many women that have played an important role in the development of Martin County and that have been positive role models for younger women to emulate.

Her medical interests include pediatrics, women's health and caring for entire families. Her personal hobbies are gardening, cooking and spending time at the family cabin.

What's Cooking

Roasted Root Veggies

Love this fall weather!

Pa Lloyd and I spent three hours today getting our yard and flowers ready for winter. The geraniums are trimmed and put in the basement, the flower boxes emptied, some of the flowers are trimmed, the weeds pulled one more time and the Halloween decorations are up.

I love to have the oven on when the cooler weather sets in. My kitchen feels so cozy. I found today's recipe some years ago in the Midwest Living magazine. It's one of my favorites! It reminds me of the recipe I shared with you last week, except this one is just veggies, which we are suppose to eat more of. You can substitute any veggies of your choice. I like the ones that the original recipe used.

Roasted Root Veggies:

4 medium parsnips, peeled, halved lengthwise and cut into 1 inch pieces

4 medium turnips, peeled and cut into 1 inch pieces

3 medium carrots cut lengthwise and cut into 1 inch pieces

1 medium sweet potato peeled and cut into 1 inch pieces

2 medium onions cut in wedges

8 leaves fresh sage, sliced

3 Tbsp olive oil

1 1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp pepper

1/4 cup honey

In large roasting pan combine veggies and sage, combine olive oil, salt and pepper, toss with veggies until coated. Roast uncovered at 425 degrees until veggies are brown and tender. Stir occasionally, drizzle with honey, stir gently, bake another 5-10 minutes, may serve with additional snipped sage. Enjoy our beautiful fall weather. Have a great week!

Ask A Trooper: Bicycle Safety

Question: Does traffic have to wait for someone on a bicycle trying to cross at an intersection?

Answer: Bicyclists and motorists are equally responsible for safety on the road. The number one contributing factor to bicycle-vehicle collisions is failure to yield the right-of-way — by bicyclists and drivers alike.

If the bicyclist is off their bicycle at an intersection and walks across, they have all the rights at the intersection as a pedestrian would. Motorists must stop for crossing pedestrians at every intersection, even those without crosswalks or stoplights. Motorists should stop far enough back so drivers in other lanes can also see the pedestrian in time to stop.

Cyclists must obey all traffic signs and signals.

Bicycle-vehicle collisions are due to a variety of behaviors by the rider, such as disregarding a traffic sign or signal, inattention and distraction.

Each year in Minnesota, approximately 40 pedestrians and 8 bicyclists are killed as a result of collisions with motor vehicles.

• As a group, pedestrians and bicyclists comprise nearly 10 percent of all traffic fatalities each year — 67 percent of these fatal crashes occur in urban areas.

ban areas.

• 40 percent of pedestrians and 21 percent of bicyclists killed had consumed alcohol.

• 19 percent of pedestrians killed were not crossing properly.

Rules of the Road and Safety Tips

• Bicyclists may ride on all Minnesota roads, except where restricted.

• Bicyclists should ride on the road, and must ride in the same direction as traffic.

• Motorists must at all times maintain a three-foot clearance when passing a bicyclist.

• Bicyclists must signal their turns and should ride in a predictable manner.

• Bicyclists must use a headlight and rear reflectors when it's dark. To increase visibility, add a rear flashing light.

• Motorists must drive at safe speeds and be attentive — look for bicyclists and check blind spots.

• Drivers should use caution and look twice for riders when turning.

• Drivers should use caution when opening door upon parking on side of road.

I have seen an increase in bicycles on our roadways, so we all need to be extra cautious to prevent bicycle/pedestrian collisions with vehicles.

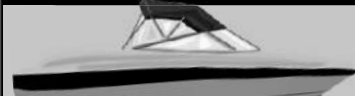

JULIE'S STORY

FROM THE PERSPECTIVE OF A MOM...

Cancer is a horrible, scary disease, but even more so when it's one of your children going through it. Lucky for me, I have one amazing young man who is taking it all in stride, staying positive, and determined to keep his life as normal as possible.

When I first heard the news on October 20, 2014, I just couldn't believe it. How could a happy, active, 9 year old boy get cancer? It was a cold he couldn't shake, how could it be cancer? They had to be wrong, but they were not. The doctors assured us that this would be a "detour" in life and we would get through this journey.

There have definitely been some bumps in the road on this journey. As a parent, it has been a struggle to keep all the

different pieces of life together. I want to spend every minute with Lincoln in the hospital and at his appointments, but there are two other children at home that need my attention, and of course there is my job, and our home. How was I going to get my work done, and I was go-

There have been times that these were daunting and frustrating tasks, but there has always been family and friends eager to lend a helping hand, and my work has been so accommodating. I have had to accept that fact that I just can't do it all, and some things would be missed, and other things just weren't as important as you once thought they were. The new goal has been just to get Lincoln healthy.

I think that the planned doctor visits were manageable, but it was the unplanned bumps in the road that have been the hardest. All of the sudden Lincoln would get a fever,

the evening of the 2nd and got the camper all set up and went off to bed. The next morning he woke up with a temperature of 103 ... that ended up lasting for 21 days. That hospital stay also interrupted another planned trip away to the Wisconsin Dells. Dad and his siblings got to enjoy some waterpark time, while mom and Lincoln stayed at the hospital. As if spending time in the hospital wasn't bad enough, but knowing you brother and sister were having fun camping and at the waterpark was hard. But we had to try to keep things as normal as possible for his siblings as well. They were often times left back home with family or friends when we would have to run off to the hospital and they deserved some time away. We also had planned a Cancun family vacation for last Christmas, and with Lincoln's chemotherapy treatments and the unknown of side effects and how he would be feeling, that got put on hold. Thanks to some help from the social worker at Children's, we were able to get flight vouchers for that trip and will plan to take it this Christmas. We've all learned that schedules have to be flexible.

I am so blessed that Lincoln is such a strong and courageous boy. He

has never "worried" about cancer. It's been something he has fought hard to beat. Had he struggled through the treatment process (lots of needle pokes, procedures, surgeries, side effects to deal with), it would have been much harder on me. We rarely saw any tears from Lincoln, and when we did, we knew it must be really bad, and that was hard to see as a parent.

It was sad to watch him sit on the bench or at the hospital while his teams were out there playing, knowing that he wanted so badly to be out there with them. The hardest part for me has been getting him through the tough stuff like side effects and the long hospital stay in July. As a mom I just wanted to make it all better. There was a night that we both laid in his hospital bed together and he told me with tears in his eyes that he just wanted to go home. He said, mom I have been praying and praying to get better so I can go home. That was tough on mom!

There have been lots and lots of prayers sent Lincoln's way this past year, and they are all working. Lincoln is feeling the best he has so far on this journey. He is getting his speed and energy back for the sports he loves. Now that he has entered the

maintenance phase, his treatments will only be once a month, so side effects should be minimal. We are ready for a more "normal" schedule for this school year and upcoming sports season.

We've said it many times, but we are so grateful for all the support we have gotten through this last year. It's been amazing. For me I think the most tears that have been shed have been tears of joy ... at the incredible acts of kindness that have been shown to Lincoln and our whole family.

If it's at all possible, Lincoln makes fighting cancer look easy, and that has made it an easier journey on the whole family. I'm so proud of how he has tackled it. If he can handle this, he can handle anything thrown his way and is destined to do great things in the future. He is strong and courageous ... he is lincolnstrong.

ing to use all my sick leave and vacation days with hospital stays and doctor appointments. Then of course there was a huge pile of mail at home ... hospital bills on top of normal monthly bills to take care of, and the everyday chores of getting groceries and laundry and picking up around the house.

and then everything else stopped and we would be off to the hospital. This took a toll on family time. On at least three different occasions, Lincoln (and at least one other family member) missed out on bigger planned family outings. Lincoln had looked forward to a holiday camping trip over the 4th of July. We arrived in

Sharing His Story

LINCOLN BECKER

FROM LINCOLN'S PERSPECTIVE:

From the perspective of an active 10 year old ... the biggest way in which having cancer has affected his life has been missing sports. Lincoln is a very active kid, playing hockey, baseball, and soccer during the year. There were several times during the hockey season in which he was not allowed to play because he was in the hospital or his blood counts were just too low. It is the chemotherapies job to destroy the bad cancer cells, but it also kills some of your good cells as well. So when Lincoln's platelets (which affects your bloods ability to clot - risk of internal bleeding or head drama) dropped below 50,000 he could not play any contact sports. Then if his platelets got really low (less than 13K) he had to have a platelet transfusion. He didn't have as much problem with this during baseball or soccer season, but instead his blood counts got so low in July that he picked up numerous infections that landed him in the hospital for 22 days plus two surgeries (one to take out his old port which had a line infection and one to put a new one in). This meant he missed several baseball games and most of the summer soccer season. When you're an active 10 year old sports are your life, so missing these was hard on him. With the help of wonderful friends and FaceTime on his iPad, he

was still able to be in contact with his teams as they played and to cheer them on, but it was hard at times to sit back and just watch.

The other thing Lincoln missed out on was going to school. He missed 32.5 days last school year. Not bad considering he spent a large portion of that in the beginning when he was first diagnosed and had surgery. But then it was the twice per week and then eventually once per week chemotherapy treatments that pulled him out of school. We did our best to plan around holidays off from school and making afternoon appointments to limit the days off. Lincoln worked really hard to stay caught up on his homework, staying in from recess, or doing homework on the way to treatment to keep up. His teachers were awesome helping him with this. His hard work got him on the A honor roll for 2 quarters and the B honor roll for 2 quarters all while going through treatment.

Chemotherapy treatments also took away some of his energy for playing sports. He was not as fast or as strong as he had been and then was challenging for him. He wanted his legs to skate faster, but they just wouldn't go. Instead of being the center on his hockey team, he played a wing and had to play every other shift with his line or he just got too tired. Lincoln was used to being the fastest kid on the ice, at recess and track and field, so that frustrated him at times. Chemotherapy treatments generally affect your ankle strength, so Lincoln did his



physical therapy religiously twice per day to stay as strong as he did throughout the year, and he has continued to work hard and is determined that he will be back up to speed this hockey season.

One of the other things that Lincoln noticed, was that friends/teammates generally were nicer to him. Not that they were mean before, but that they were afraid at first and didn't want to hurt him or make him sick. Lincoln wanted to just be treated the same as he always had ... with no special treatment. Teammates were cautious of him at practices and games. They are a great group of friends though and have been incredibly supportive of him all year long. Lincoln is looking forward to a more "normal" schedule of playing sports starting with hockey season.

He also has had to be very conscious of anyone who is sick. Since his treatments have suppressed his immune system, we have to make sure he stays healthy. This means keeping him away from people that are sick. At school and home we have kept a supply of hand sanitizer and Lincoln has made sure that hand washing is done frequently. During hockey season they were times when we kept him out of the locker room to avoid germs, and when a student at school got chicken pox, Lincoln had to stay home to not be exposed. Another risk was bacteria, which can be found around the farm, so he had to stay out of the barn and away from hay and dust. Lincoln is in 4-H

so he couldn't do any pig chores or get his animals ready for the fair or do any mowing around the farm. The doctors did let him show his pigs at the fair as long as he wore a mask. He had asked the doctors how he was going to get paid if he couldn't mow or do any pig chores. They said he was doing enough "work" fighting cancer.

His brother has had to ease up on him too ... not picking on him as much and no wrestling in the living room ... but Leyton

at his records they expected to find a lethargic kid, but instead they found a walking, talking, little man.

There were only a few times when Lincoln generally did not feel well. He says these times were "BAD." Once was last fall when his medication caused a severe case of constipation which landed him in the hospital for a few days. At the end of winter and beginning of spring, his chemotherapy treatment caused him to get mouth and throat sores

worried about the future, and has focused hard on beating cancer so he can move on to the next things he wants to conquer in life.

There have been some really fun times on this journey as well. Lincoln has been blessed to be a part of some really cool events. He practiced with Gophers men's hockey, Bethany Lutheran Vikings baseball, and Mankato Moon Dogs, got to sit in a suite at the Minnesota Twins and meet Nurdy at the Wild on his birthday, many local Go GREEN events, Relay for Life honorary survivor, and of course the LincolnStrong-athon. He has met some great people, like Seth Ambrose from the Gophers/Blue Jackets, Chad Greenway from the Vikings, and Cole DeVires from the Twins. These have been awesome and Lincoln says they have helped this cancer journey go faster giving him something fun to look forward to. His next incredible adventure will be his Make A Wish trip, which will be to attend the World Series later this month.

says he's saving it up so when Lincoln is back up to full speed and no port, they will go at it again. His sister on the other hand generally was worried and concerned about her little brother. Lincoln has continued to tell her that he is fine.

Lincoln continually amazed his nurses and doctors at Children's. There were numerous occasions when Lincoln would go to the cities for chemotherapy and be on the staff to get going with his treatment so he could get back home in time for a sports practice or another activity. When he was in the hospital in July for that long stay, one of his nurses said that kids have died from what all Lincoln had going on. To look at his chart, they would expect to find a kid laying in bed not doing much of anything during that time, but yet they would walk outside and there would be Lincoln soaking up some sun or doing some physical therapy so he could get back to life. The same was said when he was first diagnosed. The doctors wanted to send him by ambulance up to the hospital. To look

which made it very difficult for him to eat or drink or even talk. He said that mouth sores were "ANNOYING." Then of course there was this July when he got several infections which lead to the 22 day hospital stay.

As far as how has Lincoln felt throughout this whole treatment, he would always tell you "I'm FINE, or "I'm GOOD." It didn't matter if he was sitting in a hospital bed and zapped of all his energy. He hasn't let cancer keep him down. He has always seen the positive in it all. As a 10 year old kid, he didn't have to worry about paying hospital bills, or missing work, or taking care of the rest of the family or getting general stuff done at home. He isn't

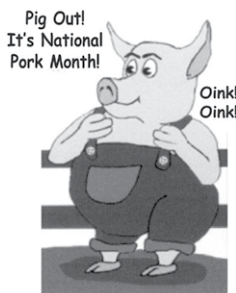

Nature By The Yard

The blue jays of the yard were having a collective cow. A collective noun for those birds is a party. A party of jays is appropriate at times, but this wasn't one of them. Their calls were of outrage. For a few days, the only yard birds were the occasional chickadee or nuthatch



at the feeders and the jays calling from the woods. A trespassing yellow tomcat walked past the house. I yelled at it and it high-tailed it. The jays didn't chase after it. There was something else. Then I saw it, a sharp-shinned hawk flew across the road. It's a small raptor, but terrifying to tiny songbirds.

I remember when we were young kids. We climbed out the upstairs bedroom window and found our way to the ground. The goal was to venture into the nighttime woods. Georgette, my niece, and I are the same age. She called me Uncle Allen only when she wanted to irritate me. She was hesitant about traipsing off into the land of dark trees, but I convinced her by showing her my slick flashlight. It was nothing more than a storage unit for dead batteries. No matter how bright a light it showed indoors, the batteries went dead immediately upon contact with the night.

We walked into a night blacker than the inside of a pants pocket. Clouds made moon shadows dance in our paths. Good eyesight kept us from walking into trees.

Georgette was nervous. I was delighted.

Then we heard loud monkey-like calls.

Georgette deserted me at the speed of a NASCAR winner.

The calls were made by barred owls. They have a distinctive hooting described as "Who cooks for you? Who cooks for you-all?" During courtship, pairs perform a riotous duet of cackles, hoots, caws, gurgles and maniacal laughter. Females have a slightly higher-pitched call. Owlets make hissing sounds. Calling occurs all year, most frequently prior to egg laying and in late summer and fall, corresponding to the dispersal of young. Bill snapping accompanies aggressive interactions.

Georgette ran home

and went in the door instead of shimmying up the drainpipe. She told my mother of her frightening experience. By the time I'd climbed into the bedroom window, my mother was waiting for me.

I told Georgette that barred owls would do her no harm. The thing she needed to fear in the woods was the mosquito.

Our songbirds need to fear accipiters.

Q-and-A

"I heard you talk about scatter hoarding on your radio show. What is that?" Scatter hoarding has nothing to do with collecting rugs. There are two kinds of hoarding-larder hoarding and scatter hoarding. Larder-hoarding animals make and defend central food caches or larders. Scatter hoarders have many different food caches. Gray squirrels hide acorns in many places in the hopes that some endure. In contrast, the red squirrel is a larder hoarder. It caches foods in central locations. Red squirrels pilfer from one another. A study found that 25 percent of stored pinecones changed ownership.

Judy Hargrave of Albert Lea asked if she should feed late-staying hummingbirds. The rule of thumb is that if you haven't seen a hummingbird for two weeks, take the feeder down. The hummingbirds know when to leave. They aren't in a rush as they are in the spring. Adult males leave first, followed by the females and then the juveniles.

"What kinds of birds eat acorns?" Crows, various woodpeckers, blue jays, grackles, brown thrashers, towhees, ruffed grouse, grosbeaks, nuthatches, cardinals, chickadees, titmice and wood ducks are some.

"Why does deer fur change colors?" Deer coats provide thermoregulation and camouflage. Summer coats are thin and reddish to cope with heat stress. In the fall, the coat turns a faded gray or brown with two layers. Outer guard hairs are hollow, stiff and about 2 inches longer than the undercoat. The inner layer is soft and dense, which insulates against the cold weather and snow. Coat color tends to be darker in forested areas and lighter in agricultural areas where deer are exposed to more direct sunlight.

Parents Play a Big Role in Keeping Teen Drivers Safe

(StatePoint) For teens, getting behind a wheel can seem like an exciting taste of freedom. But too much leeway too soon can have dangerous results. Car crashes are the number one killer of teens, and half of all teens will be involved in a car crash before graduating high school, reports the National Safety Council (NSC).

Luckily, states with a Teen Safe Driving Coalition are helping change the game. The Coalitions -- comprised of state and local government, law enforcement, public health agencies, traffic safety and injury prevention organi-

zations, academia, businesses, teens, parents and crash survivors -- were established by NSC and The Allstate Foundation. They have worked at the grassroots level for the last four years to educate parents and teens about the risks of teen driving. Coalitions exist in California, Florida, Maryland, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Texas to offer solutions for parents to help teens be safer.

The results have been effective. Crashes involving 15- to 17-year-old drivers in Coalition states have dropped nearly 34 percent since the Coalitions were



established four years ago, whereas non-coalition states have experienced just a 19.5 percent drop, according to NSC analysis of federal fatality data.

The Coalitions' success is in part because they promote a program that indisputably saves

lives. Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL), a proven method of reducing teen drivers' crash risk by 20 to 40 percent, works by maximizing experience while minimizing common driving risks teens face, such as nighttime driving and carrying teen passengers. This allows new drivers to gain experience with less exposure to high-risk scenarios. All 50 states and D.C. have implemented some form of GDL.

Here are some life-saving tips to families with new drivers:

- Parents should drive with teens regularly even after they receive their li-

cense. A minimum of 30 minutes weekly can help ensure that safe driving skills are being employed.

- Talk with teens about managing distractions, such as phones -- both handheld and hands-free -- the radio, other young passengers, and even beautiful roadside scenery. When teens are driving, they must stay focused on the task at hand.

- Mile for mile, 16 and 17 year-old drivers are about three times as likely to be involved in a fatal car crash at night than during the day, according to "Injury Prevention," a peer review journal. Parents should give teens opportunities to learn nighttime driving skills with an adult supervisor in the car.

- One of the best ways for teens to learn to drive is by example. So practice safe habits always.

Five Tips for Fall Car Care Month

October is Fall Car Care Month. Why not take a little time to be car care aware and make sure your vehicle is ready for the harsh winter weather ahead? Taking a few simple steps now can save you the headaches and cost of an emergency breakdown later, says the Car Care Council.

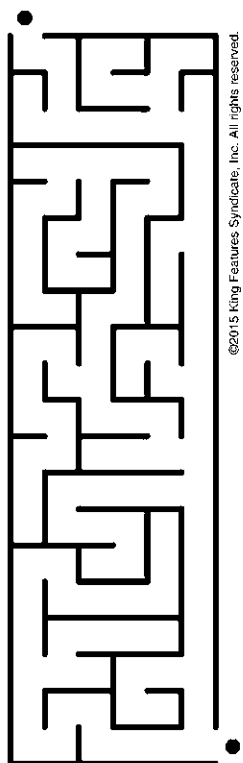

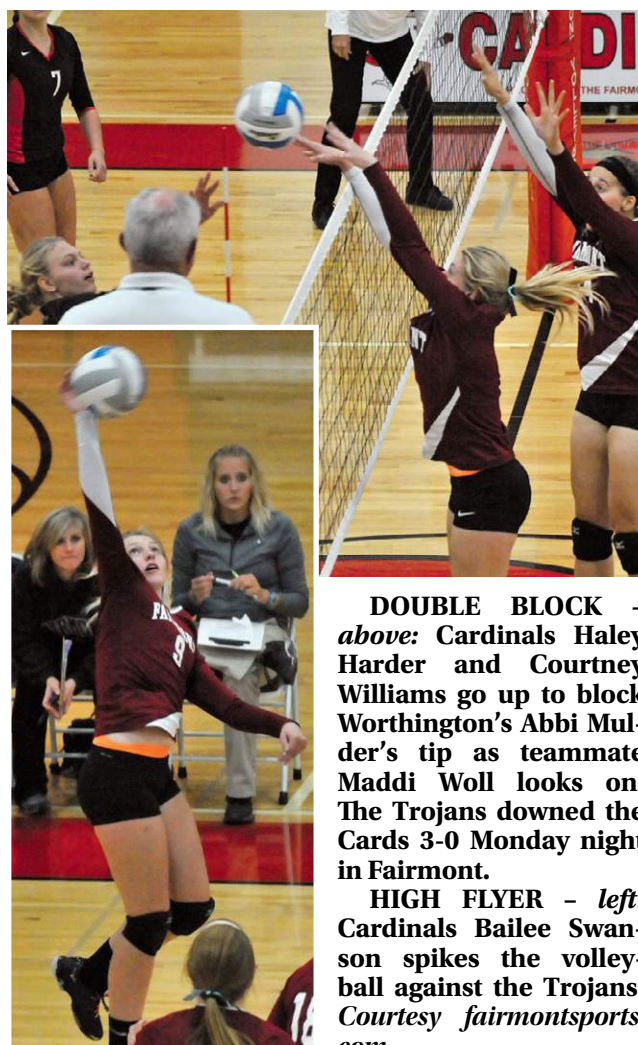
