Conventional False! loans usually do require 20%, for which a purchaser will get a lower interest rate – lower still if you can do 25%. However, if you don't have that much money available, it is possible to put down less, and pay PMI (private mortgage insurance) until you reach the 20/80% mark (once you have 20% invested in the home, it is no longer necessary). Some loans require PMI for the life of the loan. PMI is protection for the lenders in case of foreclosure.

Many potential buyers will put off the purchase of a home because they want to wait until they have saved 20% to avoid paying PMI. However, while they are waiting, home prices are rising and interest rates are creeping up!

True! There are several low-to-no down-payment options available to avoid the traditional loan \$\$\$ requirements and thus enabling you to keep more money in the bank.

A new "Slick-Shorn" quite popular in Texas and division was added to the other Southern States in 4-H Market Beef Show at recent years, including at the Minnesota State Fair major livestock shows in in 2016, and will return for Houston and San Antonio. 2017, according to Kent Thiesse, MN State Fair 4-H Beef Show Coordinator.

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

I drove by a harvested field of sweet corn that had become a field of Canada geese. There was a single common grackle in the field. It was odd to see just one grackle.

Take a good look at a grackle. It really is a beautiful bird. Common grackles are abundant and widespread, though their populations declined by nearly 2 percent per year between 1966 and 2014, resulting in a cumulative decline of 58 percent according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey.

I see them here from early March to late November. They nest in May through July. The young leave the nest in 10 to 17 days. As soon as the breeding season is over and the young birds are well grown, they begin to gather in the summer roosts to form immense flocks. During October and November, these great flocks wander about over the country, often joined by starlings, cowbirds and

other blackbirds, seeking suitable feeding places in grain fields, grasslands and swamps.

Cellar spiders

Cellar spiders are often found in damp locations like basements, crawl spaces and cellars, and are often confused with daddy longlegs, which are not spiders. Some cellar spiders use a sneaky trick to catch food. When food is scarce, they abandon their webs and seek the webs of other spiders. They tap on a web, mimicking the actions of a trapped insect. When the owner of the web comes to catch its prey, the cellar spider captures and eats it. When they are disturbed or when they are under a threat of attack, cellar spiders start vibrating violently in their webs to discourage an enemy. This has earned them the common name of vibrating spiders.

When the hummingbird sees the red handle, it checks it out as a food source. Some folks paint this handle or cover it in tape to discourage hummingbird visits. It may be attracted to other red or orange items in a garage. Hang a hummingbird feeder near the open door of the garage and hope that the bird flies over to feed. 

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

All of these programs require involvement from the membership in both the American Legion Post #36 and the Auxiliary. Fairmont American Legion saw a peak in membership of over 700 members in the late 1970's and early 1980's. Since then the local post (as with many other American Legion posts across the state and the country) has seen declining numbers in membership. Currently Post #36 has a membership of about 240 members, while the Fairmont American Legion Auxiliary has around 176 members. According to both Miller and Ringeisen, the local post, as with many others, has been having a hard time getting young veterans to join their organization to help keep the post strong both financially and in

community involvement.

The Fairmont American Legion will be having a Chicken and Sweet Corn Feed Membership Drive on Saturday, August 26th from 4:30 to 7:00 p.m. at the Blazer Bar (formerly the Fairmont American Legion Hall). August 10 USDA report surprises experts **Guest Columnist**

August 10th USDA Crop Report, due to weather concerns that existed in many of the primary corn and soybean production areas in the United States. Parts of Illinois, Indiana, and the Eastern Corn Belt dealt with very wet conditions and late planting this Spring, and portions of North and South Dakota have been experiencing a major drought during the past couple of months. There has also been a growing dry weather pattern in western Iowa and Nebraska in recent weeks, which has caused some grain marketing analysts to lower their 2017 corn and yield prospects; however, based on crop conditions on August 1st, USDA apparently does not agree with that analysis of U.S. crop conditions.

issued on August 10th estimated the 2017 total U.S. corn production at 14.15 billion bushels, which would be a decrease of 7 percent from the 2016 record U.S. corn production Minnesota's 2017 average of 15.2 billion bushels. The 2017 projected U.S. corn production would be the third highest on record, and would compare to corn production levels of 14.2 billion bushels in 2014, and 13.9 billion bushels per acre in 2015,

USDA is 158 bushels per acre in ticipation leading into estimating 2017 total harvested corn acreage in the U.S. at 83.5 million acres, which is unchanged from June USDA estimates, but is down 4 percent from the 2016 harvested corn acres of 86.7 million acres, and is slightly above the 83.1 million harvested acres in 2014.

The August 10th Crop Report projects the 2017 national average corn yield at 169.5 bushels per acre, which is a decline of 5.1 bushels from the record U.S. average corn yield of 174.6 bushels per acre in 2016, The estimated 2017 U.S. corn yield also trails the average corn yield of 171.0 bushels per acre in 2014, but is slightly higher than the 2015 average yield was 168.4 bushels per acre. The USDA projected average corn yield for 2017 was higher The USDA Crop Report than the highest average yield estimate by any of the grain marketing analysts, who had an average estimated U.S. corn yield of 166 bushels per acre.

USDA is now projecting Iowa's 2017 average corn yield at the record level of 188 bushels per acre, which is well below last year's record State average corn yield of 203 bushels per acre. Other recent average corn yields in Iowa are 192 bushels per acre in 2015, 178 bushels compares to the record per acre in 2014, and 165 bushels per acre in 2013.

The 2017 USDA corn vield estimates for the other major corn producing States are Illinois at 188 bushels per acre, compared to 197 bushels per acre in 2016; Indiana at 173 bushels per acre, which is the same as 2016; and Nebraska at 183 bushels per acre, compared to 178 bushels per acre in 2016. South Dakota's corn yield is estimated at 140 bushels per acre, compared to 161 bushels per acre in 2016, with North Dakota at 121 bushels per acre, compared to 158 bushels per acre in 2016.

The USDA Report on USDA is estimating August 10 estimated total Indiana at 55 bushels per 2017 U.S. soybean production at a record level of 4.38 billion bushels, which would be slightly above the previous record U.S. soybean production in 2016. South Dakota is of 4.31 bushels in 2016. USDA is now estimating total 2017 harvested soy-

bean acreage at a record level of 88.7 million acres. which is up 7 percent from 82.7 million acres in 2016. Some experts feel that this number could be increased in future months, due to the prevented planted acres and drownout acres in portions of the Eastern Corn Belt. USDA projected the

2017 U.S. average soybean vield at 49.4 bushels per acre, which again surprised the grain trading experts, who had projected the 2017 average soybean yield closer to 47.5 bushels per acre. The 2017 estimated soybean yield national average soybean yield of 52.1 bushels per acre in 2016, 48.0 bushels per acre in 2015, and 47.5 bushels per acre in 2014. Minnesota's 2017 average soybean yield is estimated at 49 bushels per acre, which compares to the record State soybean yield of 52.5 bushels per acre in 2016. Iowa is projected to have a soybean yield of 56 bushels per acre in 2017, well below last year's State record soybean yield of 60.5 bushels per acre.
