



Selling Your Home: Never Fear!

You've crossed off a long list of items on your "To Do" list and prepared your home to sell. You've repaired, painted, organized, cleaned, and emotionally prepared to sell. Now it's time to call a licensed Realtor to guide you through the final stages before turning over the keys to the new owners. Here's what you can ex-

1. You and your Realtor will sign the listing agreement. The listing agreement is a contract with you, and your Realtor's Broker, to sell your home during an agreed upon length of time. Your Realtor will discuss the listing agreement with you and all your options. Most homes will sell before the listing agreement expires. The national average length of time a house is listed before it sells is approximately 65 days.

2. Once the agreement is signed, your Realtor will need a day or two to gather the data on your house (room measurements, type of roof and siding, etc.) and take interior and exterior pictures. Once they have everything they need to create a complete listing, your Realtor will list it on the Multiple Listing Service (MLS).

Tip: Make sure your Realtor is connected to the MLS. If your agent isn't connected to an MLS, your home will not show to other real estate agents in the MLS and will take longer to sell. The MLS also provides the listings buyers see on reputable real estate websites such as www.Realtor.com.

3. Your home now is listed and your Realtor will serve as the contact person to receive requests for showings for your property from other real estate agents. It's one less item for you to take time to arrange and that's our job as Realtors!

4. Once you have accepted an offer, you will wait to close the sale. How long you wait depends on how the buyer is paying for the purchase of your home. If your offer is a cash offer, the closing will be 2-4 weeks on average. If your offer is contingent on financing, closing will generally be 60 days or sooner. Every lender's process is a little bit different and time spent on your buyer's loan will vary. Common closing locations include title companies, banks, and lawyer's offices, just to name a few.

Tip: Always remember the closing date is a moving target, especially with financing.







I am told that the eyes almost smile as the horse looks back at you. These are the eyes that we want in our horses! They are like looking into the eyes of a friend.

> If the horse's eyes show a lot of the white, if their eyes

are always moving from side to side in a wild-eyed type of action, they advertise to the experienced horseman what they are like. It is their eye movements that sometimes show wildness. My mentor tells me that if the horse has a wild eye, it is a horse that you let someone else own.

I have learned when a horse has a SOFT EYE and what it means. I have passed the test on horses in this school of the horse barn. What has always amazed me is that this lesson of so long ago is true. Look at the eyes of horses and people. They tell a lot!

hearing that would make me a great weatherman. I can hear both thunder and lightning miles away. I love the sound of rolling thunder. Ma always told me that it was the sound of angels bowling. Pop said that it was the sound of an old potato wagon traveling across a bridge. He said that it was piloted by an old man who caused lightning when sparks flew from his corncob pipe and that rain came from the old geezer's tears when he wept over the low price of potatoes. My parents believed that you simplify to amplify. I even took a class on meteorology at the local college. When I took a test in that class, I knew the answers like the palm of my hand. That's how I flunked that class. I was caught with the answers written on the palm of my hand.'

I saw a barred owl on a bridge railing along rural road. A kestrel fed on a vole as the tiny falcon perched on a utility wire. Three deer ran into St. Aidan's Cemetery. I tend to use cemetery and graveyard interchangeably, but to be precise, a cemetery is a burial place for the dead that is usually located far from the church, while a graveyard is a burial place located near or beside the church or churchyard.

Lilacs bloomed. Edward Bunyard said that lilacs were "the very heart and soul of memory.' Louise Beebe Wilder said "my foolish heart clings to the old fashioned single purple and white, for no flower seems to me to so truly express the fullness their heads in the sand of spring." Lilacs smell like spring.

Q-and-A

"How can I build a nest for bees?" About 30 percent of our native bee species make their nests in beetle tunnels in snags or similar locations. The female bee builds dividing walls across the tunnel to make a line of brood cells. Mason bee nesting blocks can be made by drilling nesting holes between and three-eights inch in diameter into the side of a block of lumber that hasn't been treated. The holes should be smooth

inside and closed at one end (not drilled all the way through). Holes less than one-quarter inch in diameter should be 3-4 inches deep. For holes ¼ inch or larger, drill them 5-6 inches deep. Logs and snags make great bee houses. Place them in a sunny area, some of them upright to ensure the habitat stays dry with holes on the southeast side of each log. Stem or tube bundles can be created from plant matter or paper. Bamboo, reeds and Joe-Pye weeds have naturally hollow stems. Elder stems can be hollowed. Cut the stems in 6-8 inch lengths, cutting one end close to the stem node to create a closed end. Fifteen to 20 stem pieces tied into a horizontal bundle with the closed ends of the stems together makes a fine nest. Or make a wooden frame with a back to hold the stems. Paper tubes work well, but make sure they stay dry. Inside the tubes, each cell is provisioned with pollen and nectar by the mother bee and a tiny egg is laid. Some species of small solitary wasps may take up residence. They furnish their cells with paralyzed live prey instead of pollen. Neither of these bees or wasps are prone to sting people. You could cover the holes with chicken wire to help keep birds away from the bee house.

"Do penguins fall over backward when they look up at airplanes?" They don't topple like dominoes in the presence of flying aircraft. Penguins are perfectly capable of maintaining their footing.

"What do barn owls have to do with grapes?" Vineyard owners have to maintain constant vigilance over their crops. They can't control the weather, but they can prevent some pests like rodents from damaging the plants. Some farmers use rodenticides to rid their fields of the grape-eating critters, but they are filled with harmful chemicals. Some Napa Valley proprietors use barn owls as a natural pest control strat-





No changes in estimated 2016 ARC-CO payments **Guest Columnist**

As farm operators are doing their mid-year cash flow planning, they are wondering if there have been any changes in estimates for the 2016 ARC-CO payments, which would be paid in October, 2017. Most crop producers in the Upper Midwest are enrolled in the county yield-based Ag Risk Coverage (ARC-CO) farm program choice on their corn and soybean base acres for the 2014 to 2018 crop years. Many producers earned significant 2014 and 2015 corn ARC-CO payments, while farm operators in some counties also earned some ARC-CO paymentson soybean base acres. For the 2016 crop year, ARC-CO payments for corn will occur in fewer counties and in lower amounts, compared to 2014 and 2015, and soybean ARC-CO payments are not likely in most counties.

The 2016 market year average (MYA) price is the national average corn or soybean price from September 1st, 2016 to August 31st, 2017, which will be finalized September 30th, 2017. The MYA price is the 12-month national average price for a commodity, based on the average market price received by farm operators across the United States,

the end of the year, based on the volume of bushels sold in each month. As of May 1st, 2017, USDA is estimating the 2016 MYA prices at \$3.40 per bushel for corn, and \$9.55 for soybeans.

2016 ARC-CO payments for a given crop are paid when the actual 2016 County revenue for the crop falls below the 2016 County benchmark (BM) revenue guarantee. The actual County revenue is the final 2016 County FSA yield times the final MYA price for 2016. The benchmark prices for corn and soybeans for the 2016 crop year are \$4.79 per bushel for corn and \$11.87 for soybeans, which is down from \$5.29 per bushel for corn and \$12.27 for soybeans in both 2014 and 2015. The BM prices are adjusted each year, using the USDA market-year average (MYA) price for the preceding five years, then dropping the high and low MYA price, and averaging the other three MYA prices.

The benchmark County yields for 2016 were calculated by taking the average County yields for the previous five years, dropping high and low yield, and then averaging the other three yields. The 2016 County benchmark (BM) revenue for a given crop is the County BM yield times the 2016 BM price, which is then multiplied by 86 percent to calculate the "County Revenue Guarantee". The current 2016 ARC-CO payment estimates are

which is then "weighted" at based on USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) 2016 estimated County average yields for corn, soybeans and other crops. The NASS yields may be adjusted slightly by USDA to arrive at final 2016 County FSA yields, which are used to calculate the 2016 ARC-CO payments. This would increase the likelihood or payment level for 2016 ARC-CO payments, especially for corn. The 2016 NASS County yields are available on the NASS web site: nass.usda.gov/

The relationship between the final 2016 County yield and the 2016 County benchmark yields is extremely important in calculating potential 2016 ARC-CO payments for corn and soybeans. Expressing the 2016 County yield as a "% of BM Yield" is actually more important than the final County yield in determining estimated ARC-CO payments. Any County that has a corn "% of BM yield" of less than 107% will likely realize the maximum estimated 2016 corn ARC-CO payment for that county, and counties with a "% of BM yield" of 121% or higher will likely not receive a 2016 corn ARC-CO payment. For soybeans, counties with a "% of BM yield" of 107% or higher will likely not receive a 2016 ARC-CO payment.

There will likely be a large difference in the 2016 corn ARC-CO payments from county to county, depending on final 2016 County yield. It appears that most counties in South Central and Southeastern Minnesota, as well as many counties in Northern Iowa, will get a partial 2016 corn ARC-CO payment; however very few will get the maximum payment. Counties receiving higher payment levels had 2016 corn yields that were lower or very similar to 2015 corn yields. Except for a few isolated counties. most counties in Southwest and West Central Minnesota will not receive a 2016 corn ARC-CO payment, due to the very high 2016 corn yields compared to the BM yields in 2016. No counties in the Upper Midwest will likely receive a 2016 soybean ARC-CO payment, as a result of very strong 2016 soybean yields, and the increase in the estimated soybean 2016 MYA price, compared to 2015.

The current 2016 corn and soybean ARC-CO payment estimates are based on the 2016 NASS County yields and the current MYA prices. As we get closer to the end of the 2016 MYA year, the likelihood for significant changes in the 2016 MYA prices diminish, so we are not likely to see major shifts in the current 2016 ARC-CO payment estimates. There will likely be a 6.8 percent Federal sequestration reduction on all 2016 ARC-CO payments paid in October, 2017, similar to the 2014 and 2015 ARC-CO payments.


