What's Cooking

Simple Lentil Soup

Cool weather calls for soup!

I love soup! There is nothing more comforting to warm one up on a cool fall day than a steaming bowl of homemade soup! Once your get the ingredients assembled in the soup kettle, your meal is pretty much done. Then you can curl up with a book until meal time!

Lentils are high in protein and good for you, so some years ago I tried a lentil soup. We didn't care for it so I decided I didn't like lentils. It turns out I just didn't have the right recipe!

I belong to a book club with my church and and as a group we were reading a book entitled, "Eating with Joy." Each chapter includes a recipe, so when my turn came to read a chapter and give a review, I decided to cook the recipe from that chapter and share with my friends. The recipe happened to be for lentil soup. The author stated that with so many people in our world hungry, we should try to cook some of meals more simply. This soup is about as simple and inexpensive as recipes get...and it's good! Be sure to follow all the rinsing of the lentils as the recipe calls for. That must be what makes the difference.

Simple lentil soup:

- 1 lb lentils
- 1/4 cup olive oil no substitutes
- 1-2 large yellow onions, finally chopped
- 1 Tbsp garlic, minced
- 1 Tbsp ground cumin
- 1 quart cold water
- 2 tsp salt

black pepper to taste juice from 1 lemon

Start by rinsing and soaking one pound of lentils in fresh water to cover. Soak at least 1 hour, then drain and rinse again. Cover with fresh water, bring to boil, then simmer for 1 hour.

Meanwhile, heat a soup pot over medium heat and cover the bottom with the olive oil. Add onions and garlic. Cook for 10 minutes, stirring constantly; add the cooked, drained lentils and cumin. Stir for 1 minute more, then add a quart or so of cold water. Bring to a boil; simmer for 45 minutes, adding salt and fresh black pepper. Stir in lemon juice and taste to adjust for saltiness and acidity. Remove from heat; you can drizzle in a bit more olive oil. Serve in bowls with some hearty bread.

I made the recipe exactly as printed. I was tempted to use chicken broth instead of the water but I didn't and we really enjoyed it and I have made it several times! Enjoy our beautiful fall weather!



Ask A Trooper: Two License Plates Required?

Ouestion: display one? Can I disanyway?

Answer: This is what Minnesota State Statute (M.S.S.) 169.79 says about license plates:

ate, drive, or park a motor vehicle on any highway unless the vehicle is registered in accordance with the laws of this state and has the number plates or permit confirming that license plates? First and valid registration or operating authority has been obtained..."

There are some vehicles that are allowed to display only one license plate: motorcycles; a dealer's vehicle or vehicle in-transit; run vehicle information a collector's vehicle with a pioneer, classic car, colleca vehicle that is of model year 1972 or earlier (not registered as a collector vehicle), and is used for general transportation purpose.

License plates cannot be displayed in the front windshield or the rear window, they must be displayed on the front and rear of the vehicle. All plates must be securely fastened so as to prevent them from swinging, displayed horizontally with the identifying numbers and letters facing outward from the vehicle, and mounted in the upright position. 

Nature by the yard

It flew low overhead. A beast with soundless wings. A bird. An owl. A messenger of wonder. A great horned owl had been rousted from its daytime roosting place by blue jays and crows.

White snakeroot bloomed profusely. It's commonly found at wood-



land edges, with pure white flowers appearing in flattopped clusters on 2 to 4 foot stems in late summer and fall. It contains a toxin responsible for milk sickness, which caused problems for the livestock of early European settlers and allegedly killed Abraham Lincoln's mother.

Green cloverworm moths flitted about. They have conspicuous snouts and wingspans of an inch to an inch and a half. The charcoal gray, brown and silver moths hold their wings in a triangular-shape when at rest. The larvae feed on a wide variety of plants, including alfalfa, bean, clover, elm, hackberry, ragweed, raspberry, soybean, strawberry and willow. They don't survive Minnesota winters.

A twisting procession of what appeared to be mostly red-winged blackbirds and common grackles moved over a cornfield. A flock of Canada geese flew far above them. They could be geese that summered here or geese that left here and flew as far north as Canada in a molt migration. By mid-June, nonbreeders and unsuccessful breeders fly north to a secure molting location. In September and October, with some local variation, they make their second migration of the year into Minnesota.

I saw cedar waxwings with plumages so sleek they appeared to not be made of feathers. I chopped burdock. Velcro

A decision made in Farm Safety and Health the heat of the moment may lead to an injury that may not only impact this harvest, but your ability to farm in the future. If you have people working with you during harvest, take

time to communicate with them about the plans for getting crops from fields to bins and where the trouble spots may be. "Most farmers know where the washouts are in their fields and what hills give them trouble," said Hartgers, who also farms with her husband. "They know what size of load those hills can hold and what they can't. Share those details with your farm workers."

Rest

You and your farm workers will put in longer days during harvest and you may get less rest. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, a lack of sleep can lead

decreased alertness, and increased risk for injuries. "You need time to recharge your batteries and rejuvenate yourself," said Hartgers. "Don't let yourself get so run down you cannot think clearly." One way to prevent farm accidents is to get enough rest each night. Guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend that most teens get at least nine hours of sleep and most adults get at least seven hours. In addition, try to maintain a bedtime routine to help you relax and signal to your body that it is time to sleep.

Take a break

The long days and late nights of harvest can lead you to push your limits to get crops out. However, research from the CDC reveals that breaks can help increase concentration and alertness. If you can't take yourself away from the field, your family can bring the break to you. "Get out of the tractor, get out of the combine," said Hartgers. "Take five minutes to eat a hamburger on the tailgate of the pickup with your kids. It will recharge your batteries and help you think clearly again."

Three ways to make the farm a safer for play

recommendations keep your children playing safe during harvest. See your farm through the eyes of your kids.

"The kids that don't don't know the risks," said Farm Claims Manager Vicky Hartgers. "Kids will find their way to the barn chasing a cat or whatever the case may be. It's not unusual to hear about a child run over by a piece of farm equipment by a family member. You need to be aware of where children are at all times." The Committee on Agricultural Safety and Health Research and Extension found crash fatalities in rural counties were nearly twice as high as urban counties.

Whatever and wherever you drive, show courtesy to all the vehicles sharing the road with you.

Inspect farm equipment, farmers.

Before taking farm equipment on public roads, farmers should inspect their equipment to make sure motorists can easily see it.

"Make sure each piece of farm equipment has a slow moving vehicle sign and working lights," said Walton.

The Iowa Center for Agricultural Safety and Health recommends adding reflectors and reflective tape to farm equipment as well as mirrors that allow drivers to see traffic behind them.


There are certain situa-

"Have someone precede or follow to create a buffer for the farm equipment," said Walton.

Caution and courtesy can prevent an accident

"An accident is the last thing farmers want. It's the last thing drivers want," said Walton. "In this time when everyone is busy and going places in a hurry, take that little bit of caution. It could save a lot of heartache in the long run."





Handling grain safely can prevent accidents

2009 was a record crop for many farmers. However, high moisture levels in the harvested grain led to a record number of entrapments in 2010. The 2013 grain harvest also had higher than average moisture levels, potentially creating a situation known as grain bridging where grain clumps together to form a crust with an open space below it. Unknowingly, workers may enter the bin and break through the bridge. "Make every effort to eliminate grain bridging before you enter a grain bin," said Gallagher. "Poles and extension devices can

to entrap a grown person bin to try to dislodge the grain."

> If grain is attached to the sidewall of the bin, Gallagher recommends trying to dislodge it from outside the bin. This may be accomplished through the use of an extension pole through the top manhole cover or by striking the exterior wall of the bin in the area where the grain is adhering to the bin walls. Tool selection is important when attempting to free the grain using this second option. 




